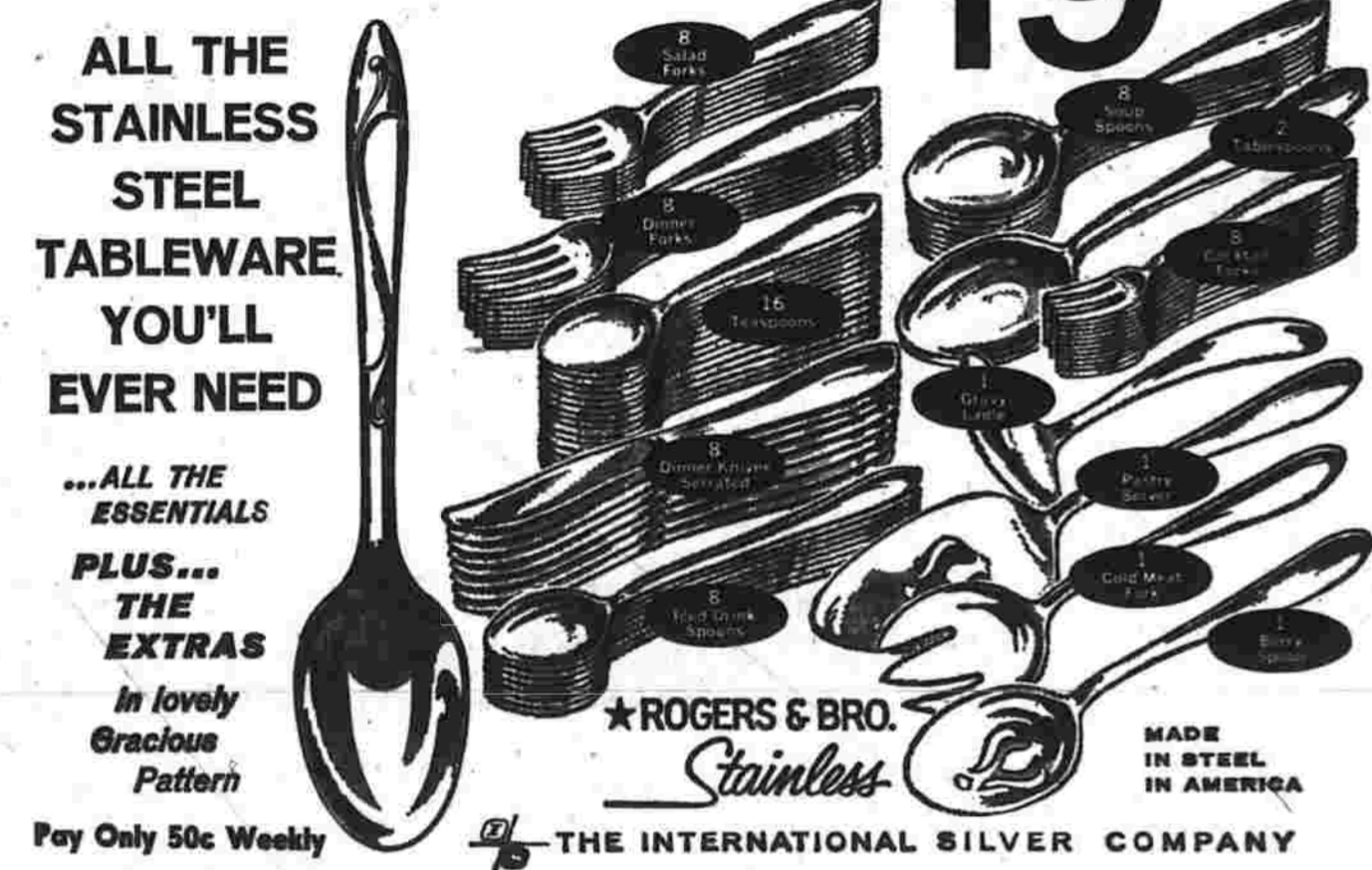

Police Make 271 Arrests in July

The Manchester Police Department's Consolidated Daily Report for July noted a total of 271 arrests, numerous and notices, nine more than the previous month's figure.

Charges on the criminal side included 1 for murder, 14 for breaking and entering, 10 for larceny, 16 for intoxication, 5 for breach of the peace, 2 for violation of liquor laws, 2 for other assaults and 1 for inflicting serious family and children.

Motor vehicle charges included the issuance of 189 tickets for parking violations, 25 for violation of the road and driving laws, 4 for traffic and motor vehicle laws, and 2 for other offenses.

A traffic analysis noted motor-vehicle arrests included charges of speeding (5), reckless driving (1), failure to obey a stop light or stop sign (4), improper license or registration (2), and other minor traffic counts (21).

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Manure But Possible
 It would be the normal assumption of most of us that the departure of the last Russian troop from Cuba would be good news. All of us would welcome such news, including some of us who do not always share the pro-American attitude of the majority of our countrymen. But we live in topsy-turvy times. Things are not always what they seem, or as simple as they seem. And although there is something inside us which would like to think that simple common sense which keeps saying no, we at least have to take a look at a fantastic possibility.

This fantastic possibility would be that it is to our best interests, and to the best interests of the world, that the last Russian troops remain in Cuba.

Let the case which should argue, in our opinion, be dismissed merely because it seems fantastic — be presented in a dispatch by Donald Grant, reporter for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, after a recent trip to Cuba.

This American reporter found that Castro was heading down the coast of the United States, and that he seemed to be returning. Instead, ideas of following his own lead he is in the atmosphere of the island.

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World News In Brief

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Communist guerrillas raided a hamlet of Montagnards—mountain tribesmen—in the central highlands Tuesday and captured 21 tribesmen, the Vietnamese government reported today.

The government said 20 Montagnards returned to the fortified hamlet, one of many established under a U.S. Vietnamese program to swing primitive tribes to President Ngo Dinh Diem's government.

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Automation to Lighten Load In Figuring Your Car Tax

Buyers — next year you'll find some changes when you get your motor vehicle tax assessment. Your bill may not be any larger, but it will be more efficient and easier to understand.

These changes will be made as a result of a new law which will be far more efficient. Instead of the familiar property tax sheet telling where, when, how much you have to pay, the new law will provide information which will be more efficient.

Automation is making its debut in the tax assessor's office with the job of making out motor vehicle tax assessment's lightened next winter an electronic brain help shoulder the burden of the month-long process.

Tax assessor Joseph Murphy says the work load of his staff will be eased considerably as data processing machines help with the chore of calculating the tax, billing and record keeping. The new system will save many hours of manual labor.

Murphy's department has been used \$3,000 of the state's money to set up the automated system, and he said that this will, in effect, be a pilot study of the use of computers in the tax assessor's office.

The Data Processing Corporation of Hartford, which is doing the work, has been selected to do the job.

Basically, what will happen is that computers will put together a record of all the motor vehicles in the state, and from that the tax assessor will be able to get a "working list" of motor ve-

Bunche, American negotiator who is an undersecretary of the United Nations, says "representatives of the Negro people of the United States" because the basic image of the United States is that of a Democratic nation leading the cause of world freedom.

During the summit meeting of African leaders in Addis Ababa, the U. S. racial crisis was widely discussed. Milton Obote, prime minister of Uganda, said: "The key to the successful projection of the United States image in Africa lies more in a solution of the Negro problem than in foreign aid."

The Ethiopian Herald was more critical. It referred to the U. S. government as "backbeated" with "ingenuities" to act against discrimination and said: "The United States is campaigning on a pro world slogan and is condemning the racist government of South Africa while practicing its own version of Apartheid. What happened in Birmingham showed the United States in its true light."

No African leader has sought to put the United States in the category with South Africa, which has been hailed before the United Nations repeatedly because of its racial policy of racial segregation.

The London Daily Telegraph pointed out the distinction. In the United States, it said, "the law of the black man's side" while in South Africa, the law of the white man's side. The newspaper said that the United States is in the category of the "hypocrite" of U. S. claims to world leadership.

In the United Nations a few weeks ago, Soviet delegate Platon D. Mironov told a committee the "unbridled racism" in the United States has proved there is "no moral basis" to claims that the United States is the defender of human rights in the world. This idea was brought up by the Soviets two years ago after African delegations received a scurrilous, unsigned letter threatening their safety. Some Africans were angered by the letter, but Stevenson soothed them by disavowing the senders and stating that the FBI was making a thorough inquiry.

Discrimination in housing and restaurants, however, continues to cause ill-feeling both in Washington and New York where large numbers of nonwhite diplomats are concentrated.

One African diplomat, Ambassador Gershon R. O. Collier of Sierra Leone, put it this way: "Your American Negroes under stand this kind of behavior and are used to it. We are not."

"There are a number of risks involved that I don't like to see us take as a nation," he said. "But if the Joint Chiefs of Staff say that, it is acceptable and I believe they will—we won't have any choice but to support it to what he called the 'mottled vote.' He said that he feared that nuclear fallout might result in the deaths of children and he believed the treaty may eliminate this danger."

As a result, the senator said, after extensive hearings beginning Monday he expected to vote in support of the treaty.

Democratic leaders have said they are confident of getting the necessary support of two-thirds of those in the Senate to ratify the treaty. Republican support is also expected to be strong.

Dr. Dirksen told a news conference Tuesday he had the Senate Republican Policy Committee staff used four main themes in exploiting the treaty: 1. Racism and American capitalism. 2. Reaction by the government is tantamount to the support of the treaty. 3. Racial incidents have exposed the "hypocrisy" of U. S. claims to world leadership. 4. The attitude toward Negroes in the United States is indicative of the attitude toward colored peoples everywhere.

Harriman, who was chief U. S. negotiator for the treaty, said Soviet Premier Khrushchev considers the pact a step toward limiting Soviet defense expenditures.

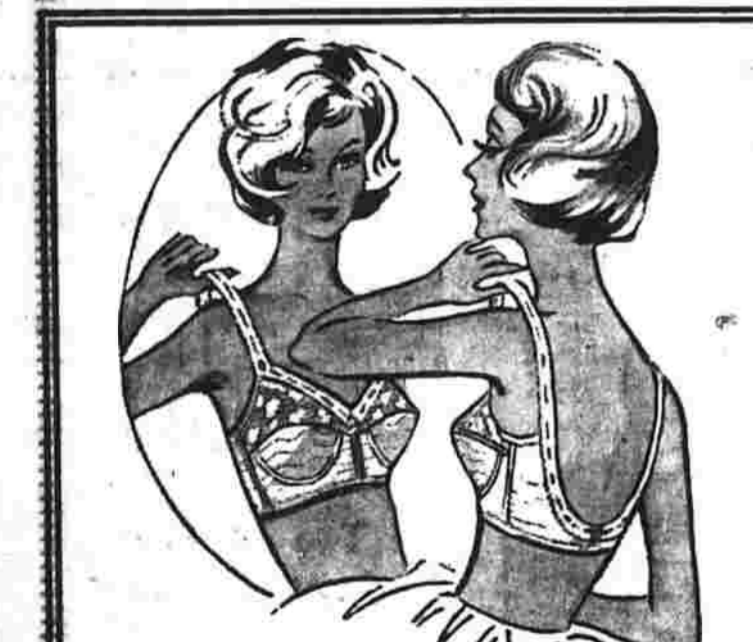
