

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

Rybczyk thought that the renewal project would require a 12-inch pipe to the Robertson School, to provide fire projection. provide fire protection. But no answer is yet available for the cost split on sewer im provements, he said, "If it were a town sewer, provements would be paid from the project cost; since the district s not part of the town, we don't have a ready answer, but are get sing a ruling from the Urban Re

ewal Administration." "We can see no need for new sewer service as a result of this project," Rybosyk said. "Residential density in the area will be about the same; the additional load from the increase school population (up from about 250 to about 500) will come during the day when sewer loads are normally light,"

But Hutchinson was still diseatisfied, and wondered what would happen if the district did need improved facilities—such as a larger treatment plant—to handle increased sewage loads. Could the MRA spend money to improve public facilities like the treatment.

Economy Fine; **Experts Differ** On '64 Status

NEW YORK (AP)—Times are
good now but how much longer
can that last? President Kennedy
posed the question at his news
conference Tuesday. Business
economists and stock market chart
followers have been asking the
same thing. same thing.

They are mindful that the cur They are mindful that the current upturn in the economy is some 30 months old. By past records that brings it close to the elassification of senior citizen.

The President's precise evaluation of the economy today is:

"Good, slightly better than was estimited in January. What we must be concerned about always, of course, is the future."

Most of the statistics on which business and financial economists base their stock-taking show the economy healthy. In fact, it is healthier than many had expected only a few months back when the long upturn showed signs of slowing down. And most of the indicators to which economists look in predicting the future still point to a further upturn in the next few months. The soothsayers defer, however, on their outlook for 1984. The President says that cutting federal income taxes for individuals and corporations could make the next year even better than 1963.

Many business economists agree—if for different reasons. They hold that the cuts themselves might lose much of their immediate effect through higher state. might lose much of their immediate effect through higher state and local taxes and through payment of outstanding debts. But they do expect federal tax cuts to lift consumer and business confidence, making for more readiness to spend and, more important perhaps, willingness to go into debt for new plants and equipment or more consumer items for the home or personal pleasure.

Except for concern over the age of the upturn from the 1960-61 recession, the economy today gives a good basis for confidence.

Industrial production is at a new high, It is expected to go higher when the auto industry gets rolling with new model produc-

Employment holds at or near record levels, despite the still un-solved problem of stubborn unemployment.
Personal incomes rose to a fift 5 holes or 2 holes.....29 Personal incomes rose to a fifth straight monthly record in July with an annual rate of \$464.3 hillion. Factory payrolls, seasonally adjusted for vacation shutdowns, just topped \$99 billion.

Factory sales of durable goods hit a \$17.6 billion record in July, \$ per cent above a year ago.

As an indicator of still better days shead new orders for durables. Barbie Plastic Pencil

As an indicator of still better days ahead new orders for durable goods rose slightly in July. Most cheer was taken from the increase in orders for industrial machinery. This could indicate that corporations are going ahead with announced intentions to spend more for updating plants and replacing obsolete equipment. A still further increase in business spending for equipment and July came to more than a billion, nicely ahead of a year ago, and following a still better outlay in June which was fattened by an extra dividend by General Motors. Stockholder hopes are high that the final half of 1963 will see dividend increases by a number of other top corporations.

That's the picture as summer heads into its final weeks. Whether it's the final flush of a long upturn or a firm basis for still better times, a lot of people, in addition to the President, would like to know.
