earings and an equal time of enate debate. With a two-thirds vote of the enate required for approval, the esolution went through on a 80-11 I call.

The treaty was signed Aug. 5 t Moscow by the United States, he Soviet Union and Great President Kennedy sent it to the

# Appeal Lost **By** American Football Loop


BALTIMORE (AP)-The American Football League has lost its appeal of a \$10 million damage suit against the National Football League. The U.S. Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled Monday that a federal district court was correct in holding that the older NFL

In holding that the older NFL neither had a monopoly on profes-sional football nor used its pres-lige to impede formation of the rival loop in 1960. "The district court's finding that National did not have the power to monopolize the relevant market appears plainly correct." the ap-pellate judges said in rejecting the AFL's anti-trust suit. The appeals court held that in a way the AFL had helped defeat its own case. It said:

its own case. It said: "In deed, the fact that he Amer-ican League was successfully launched, could stage a full sched-ule of games in 1960, has compet-ed very successfully for outstand-ing players, and has obtained ad-ing players, and has obtained advantageous contracts for national television coverage, strongly sup-ports the district court's finding that National did not have the

power to prevent, or impede, the formation of the new league." The AFL had argued that the NFL deliberately expanded to Dal-las and Minneapolis-St. Paul to hcad off the new league. 
