



ASSURES FINANCE AIDES WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy assured the world's finance ministers today that the United States, in determinedly bringing its international payments into balance, will support any needed measures to avoid damaging its trading partners around the globe. The President won a standing evation from the boards of governors of the World Bank and International Monetary Fund at the opening of their five-day annual meeting. He made his address an occasion also for indirectly nudging the Senate to pass his \$11-billion tax cut program, which the House has approved. He said the tax cut is "the most important action Con-gress can take" to solve the gold-dollar problem.

SURVEYS FAVOR BARRY NEW YORK (AP) -Surveys by news magazines today found that Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona is the front contender for the Republican presidential nomination—and that he could give President Kennedy a tight race. 




