





## Stock Probes, High Profits In '63 Business Headlines

(AP)-A Callfornian considered one of the nation's foremost trial lawyers will head the defense staff at the murder trial of Jack Ruby, who killed the accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy. Melvin Belli — pronounced Bell-eye — of Los Angeles and San Francisco, said Tuesday night he was undertaking Ruby's defense "and I'm going


