Terror A School For Order?

One can gain either of two impressions from the latest news from the new nation of Kenya.

Either this is an age in which cycles accomplish themselves at almost breathtaking speed.

Or it is an age in which we seem compelled to keep trying the impossible, and to keep failing at it.

The cycle-if it works,-would be that of one brand of violence progressing to power and order and the mastery of some new brand of violence.

The failure, if it has to be labeled that, is the penalty for thinking-even though it is impossible to rationalize any other choice-that we can produce order from terror.

Take, for irony, the language and complaint of the official statement with which the government of the new nation, then all of 13 days old, proclaimed an emergency in the northeastern region of Kenya, up near the Somali border.

The population there, it said, was being terrorized by raiders who "steal cattle, beat women, threaten to murder tribal chiefs and others."

This is a statement from the governor of Prime Minister Jomo Kenyatta, ho was seen, on his insugural day, with his arm over the shoulder of the erstwhile leader of the Mau Mau, who never merely threatened their terrorism when they were at war against civilization.

To add to the irony, one finds, in the news from Kenva, the suggestion that the Mau Mau terrorists who are now being offered amnesty if they come out of the jungle should be sworn in as "freedom fighters" to go into the field against these raiders along the Somali frontier.

The new nation of Kenya affords, perhaps, the world's most extreme example of the jungle come to responsibility and power and being confronted immediately with the need to be able to control the jungle. But the Congo has been essentially the same story.

The horrible question always is: Can those who have prepared for power through murder maintain their power and rule, when they get it, by methods short of murder?

A rather kindly summation might say that after about 40 years of evolution in power, the Russian Revolution got to the point where it was able to stop murdering people for their own good. And that was a new order being run by intellectuals and bookworms, not by jungle primitives.

The Perils Of Folksiness

Often, in fact, that formula which, as it first shows its bubbled hues, seems likely to be a big winner proves, after it has been looked at for a half hour longer, to be something one never wants to mix again.

Something a little slower, and a lot less dramatic, and nevertheless definite enough to draw comment, now seems to be happening, or to be about to happen, with the image President Johnson has been presenting to his countrymen.

Back on the night of the funeral greeting the foreign diplomats, back on Thanksgiving, projecting his warm heart and his warm thoughts into the living rooms of America, the new President seemed just the right presence to reassure the world and the nation, and, in fact, invite people to lean their thoughts on him.

As later on, he began to direct some of his personal friendliness and persuasion on various members of Congress, this also seemed most welcome as a possible demonstration of an approach toward legislative success which no President since Franklin D. Roosevelt had begun to know how to make. And when the new President flew up to New York to pay public tribute to a ormer colleague by attending services

for former Senator Herbert Lehman this was a big and gracious act on the part of a President.

Since then, however, one has been compelled to ask how short the distance might be between such seemingly perfect honeymoon raptures and the feeling that perhaps the friendly approach was becoming folksy, the warmth, alas that one should ever say such a thing, to routine, the disposal of the Presidential presence perhaps too generous and too neighborly for the preservation

of surviving force and dignity. There is, always, the old bromide about there being too much even of a good thing.

There is, always, the saving instinct for the thing called proportion, or, if there is not the instinct, the deliberate adherence to some of its rules.

One hates, almost more than anything in this rather cruel world of ours, to see good people turned into losers because they lack some subtle warning sense which tells them not to give themselves too frequently or persistently. One hates to see nice guys come in last because their niceness begins to cloy, or even make people begin to look for somebody who can be afistere and gruff, and create a mood refreshingly different from that of sheer folksiness

It may be that the President of the United States should, for his own protection and service to his own future, manage to keep some of his own very human and very appealing and warmest qualities under some kind of cynical hermostat control which would apread their comfort and cheer and political benefit out a little more evenly, and lastingly

Barzun's Lament

A fellow named Dr. Jacques Barzun, dean of faculties and provost of Columbis University, went to a convocation at Hofstra University the other day, and had himself a high old time pronouncing a funeral oration over, something to

which most educators are still giving traditional lip service. . The "liberal arts tradition," said Dr. Barzun, "is dead or dying."

It is dying, especially, he said, in the liberal arts colleges.

He found it ironic that this should be happening inside the liberal arts colleges themselves at a time when the outside world has discovered that it is the general, rounded inteiligence which really pays off.

Inside the colleges, he said, both teachers and students are "impatient with everything that is not directed at the development of talent into compe-

"Nowadays," he added, "the only true believers in the liberal arts tradition are prefer general intelligence, literacy and adaptability."

Dr. Barzun drew an unattractive picture of college life today, which he characterized as one of "frantic" acceleration because #one sheepskin to one sheep is no longer enough."

"Anxious preoccupation" was his phrase for the mood of present day life under the elms.

"Students" he said, "are married, employed, going to or returning from a conference, apprehensive about examinations, ruled by the clock like the most harried executive. They are not in cloistered walls but in the midst of lifewhich is why so many are also in the midst of psychiatric treatment."

Fellows like this Barzun fellow always find ways of making things seem just a little bit worse than they are. Otherwise, how can they begin to stir people up to keep things as good as they are? But many of us, perhaps, had aiready begun to share the same impression and the same regret-that there is a little too much work and involvement and activity in the modern college life, and not quite enough drifting and dreaming.
