The United Nations Charter is a magnificently designed basic non-ag-For anybody who really wants to generate peace and survival on earth, there is a relatively simple formula. Support those peace-keeping actions, those smotherings of the potential use of aggressive force, which the United Nations has performed in the past.

Help build the authority and power and force for the United Nations to exercise its peace-keeping mandate even more automatically in the future. And then, eventually, and the sooner the better, prepare to accept an actual state of world affairs in which the United Nations has an international police

force, loyal only to itself, which is stronger than the internal police forces retained by any individual state or by any combination of states. It is time to stop renewing pledges,

creating new pacts, signing new alliances, all to strengthen the peace, and begin strengthening, instead, the one best and basic pledge for peace which is in existence, the United Nations Char-

For it is the only such pledge, pact, or treaty which has the slightest chance of

And this positive, alternative response to the new Moscow note remains the response that should be given no matter how honorable, how trustworthy, how ungimmicked a special arrangement the Moscow note may seem to propose. If it is any good at all, it can be done better through the United Na-

He had visited in this country, been greeted with some discourteous charges that he was secretly a Communist, and behaved rather mysteriously himself. The only particular friend he seemed to claim on the international scene was the station of Venezuela, whose experience in socialistic revolution he made a great

public point of revering. He had reneged on his own promise of free elections to his own people. He had revealed a barbaric taste for the execution of his po-Castro had also, by that time, begun

to display in public the disorganized ganglia of his own crowded and confused mind. The most prevalent doubt about him was that he had any of the talent it might take to convert his romantic revolution into a working governmental

The most natural fear about him was that, with his scatterbrained mind, his romantic diversions, he might fall prey to Communist plotters. Later, when the Communist hand did take over and show itself plainly in Cuba, even Castro himself created credence for the idea that it had always been there.

Keeping America beautiful, quiet and healthful is a continuing battle—one that made little headway in 1963. Legislation that would have provided National Wilderness Preservation Sy tem, protecting virginal lands against exploitation, is tied up in the House Interior Committee. Mining and timber interests have been able to keep it from the House floor, though the Senate has passed it twice since 1961.

There are other areas, with more sig-nificance to the average citizen, in which nificance to the average citizen, in which regard for natural beauty has been pushed into the background. The jungles of neon that crowd the borders of many of the nation's highways have not diminished, but are becoming broader and thicker. The serious effects go farther than the aesthetic shortcomings of these signs. Not only do they tend to confuse motorists and thereby constito confuse motorists and thereby consti-tute a traffic hazard, but every new one tute a traffic hazard, but every new one means there is another reason for cars to enter and leave the traffic stream.

Billboards, which have dotted the nation's thoroughfares almost since the Duryea brothers of Springfield worked on the first gasoline automobile, threaten to multiply in the years shead. According to the Bureau of Public Roads, only 20 of the states have agreed to limit the use of such signs along the inonly 20 of the states have agreed to limit the use of such signs along the interstate highway system in return for federal cash bonuses. It is rather shocking that some states have to be bribed to keep their landscapes free of hillboards and that others still won't de it.—SPRINGSTELD UNION.
