Banners Fly In Rome for Homecoming

ROME (AP) - Pope Paul VI returned tonight from his "unforgettable pilgrimage" to the Holy Land, where he took steps along the path toward Christian unity.

In a speech from Bethlehem where Christ was born, Pope Paul appealed to world leaders to keep the peace and called on Christians to unite.

Then he returned to Jerusalem for a second historic meet-ing with Patriarch Athenagoras spiritual leader of world Orthodoxy. There they issued a joint communique praying that their meetings will be "a prelude of things to come for the glory of God.

The ruler of 550 million Ronan Catholics took off for home from Amman, capital of Moslem Jordan, to the cheers of crowds shouting "Baba! Baba!"—the Arab equivalent of

"Pope."
Rome arranged a colorful reception for the 66-year-old Pope, home after three days amid the shrines of the life and passion f Jesus Christ.

Banners fluttered along the Pope's route into the city and torches lighted the way.

Despite the fanfare and the iomecoming fever, the Pope's trip retained its aspect of a pilgrimage to the last.

His chartered American-built DC8 jet brought him down at Ciampino military field, alongside the ancient Applan Way. Vatican sources said the Pope chose that airfield for his return because of its historic symbolism. Through the centuries millions of European Christians returned from Holy Land pilgrimages over the Apfrom the heel of the Italian boot. the Appian Way when he came o Rome from the Holy Land. Pope Paul had taken off from Rome's seaside commercial airport, on his departure Saturday.

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
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

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The Danger Of A 1912

The fateful question which lies just beyond the formal declaration of Senator Barry Goldwater of his candidacy for the Republican nomination for President

Can the passionate emotions which must now battle for control of the Republican party stop short of the third party disaster? Not only the character of the rivalries inside the Republican party, but

the character of the times itself, create the forboding that the party may not be able to halt itself short of a repeition of the events of 1912. Then, as now, the party found itself divided between liberal and conservative

Now, as then, at least one of the two party wings seems likely to claim to have God as its real standard bearer. In 1912, it happened to be the liberal wing which had the emotional crusading semi-religious fervor.

Then it was Theodore Roosevelt who stood before his fellow Republicans and proclaimed "We stand at Armageddon and we battle for the Lord."

Today, it would be the conservative wing which would make some similar claim and pronouncement. Senator Goldwater, in his announcement last Friday, Then, as now, there were two Re-

publican party factions, each claiming it alone could win, each claiming that it alone represented the real popular sentiment of the greater number of Republicans in the country.

After the two factions had split and taken their rival claims to the voters. they both lost. And neither really won the argument, either, about how it really stood with the regular voters of the party.

Roosevelt's Bull Moose third party liberal ticket took 4,000,000 votes in the country, as compared to William Moward Taft's 3,500,000 on the regular Republican ticket.

What this proved was that neither party wing could win without the other. Woodrow Wilson got 6,000,000 votes. In the Connecticut of 1912, incidentally, the liberal Republicans didn't do so well. Wilson carried the state with 74.561 votes to 68,324 for Taft to only 34,129 for Roosevelt.

And in Manchester, Taft got 823 votes to 579 for Roosevelt and 573 for Wilson. Such were the voting results in 1912. But, so powerful and compelling were the emotional feelings of the time inside the Republican party, so sharp the mutual feelings of betrayal, treachery and double-cross, so extreme the loyalties of men and cliques, that it was quite likely no knowledge of the prospective vote results would have deterred the party from its split.

Yet, as we look back, and then look at our present day political stage as it is setting itself, we have to face the fearful possibility that both the liberal insurgent and the conservative Republican wings of that day were moderate and responsible compared to what the conservative wing could become today, should some of the more extreme rightist elements in the national life succeed in giving it their coloration, their pathological brand of pseudo-religious hate. Any other fateful parallels, or frightening differences?

Theodore Roosevelt succeeded to the Presidency in the first place because of

an assassin's bullet. And, in the campaign of 1912, making a campaign speech in Milwaukee, Rooseveit was shot and wounded, but not seriously, in the chest, by someone later proclaimed to be a fanatic and insane. Such are the thought and questions which lie beyond the formal announcenent which has now been made, which s that Senator Goldwater will lead the right wing forces of the Republican party into the San Francisco convenon. Can the struggle which has now me insvitable, along lines which acthe invite and demand extremism, becommared that the San Francisco Con-vention does not repeat the fateful but cotless experiment of 1912? ably, not that the words were not spok-en but that the Government wants them taken as unsaid. — MANCHESTER GUARDIAN.

On a sunny, breezy day when there



Cambodian Mysteries

Prince Norodom Sihanouk, the Cambodian Head of State, has suddenly decided to close his embassies in London and Washington. Those looking in on Cambodian politics only occasionally, and unused to the spontaneity of the Prince's style, may well be bewildered. He is said to be upset because of a United States complaint (with which he says, Britain was associated) about reference to the death of Pres Kennedy. The passage occurred in an Information Department communique giving particulars of arrangements (open-air concerts, time off for civil servants, &c), to celebrate the death of the Prime Minister of Siam. The BBC monitors heard these words: "The enemies of Cambodia are suffering ut-ter destruction, Ngo Dinh Diem and Ngo Dinh Nhu were killed by bullets, Their friend, Sarit Thanarat, who ill-treated Cambodia incessantly, has just met with sudden death.
