The Battle Of Flags

A flag is, among other things, a certain area of cloth, not necessarily very large. But flag incidents are never really small incidents. For that area of cloth slways stands for something symbolic, to which people devote affection and pride; it means country; it means the equality of one country with another; it always means, to many people, that one country can also be better than any

Today, flags have caused trouble, including too much violence, too much shooting, and too many deaths, down in the nation of Panama, which includes in its territorial outlines a Zone which is ruled by the United States.

We rule this Zone for the protection and operation of the Panama Canal. Even our own history books, in this enlightened age, give us some frank analysis of the rough power politics maneuvers by which we got this Zone in the first place. And, in the era following World War II, the era of increasing freedom and awakening nationalisms everywhere-the era, also, of Egypt's successful nationalization of the Sues Canal-the people of Panama have been increasingly aware of this infringement upon their own full and free sovereignty. and have been driven or lured, by sheer emotionalism, into recurrent agitation about it.

This has been, within limits, a very civilized period for the United States, in which we have sometimes even managed to see ourselves as others see us. Consequently, there began, with President Eisenhower and his administration, an enlightened and generous effort to prove our relations with the people and the politicians and with the national pride of Panama by giving certain recognition to the basic residual Panamanian sovereignty even in the Canal Zone we occupy and govern. And one of the tokens of this symbolic concession to Panama became our agreement, last year, that henceforth the two flags, that of the United States, and that of Panama, would fly together in the Canal Zone

This basic agreement has been But, for one reason or another, our

governor there, Robert J. Fleming, Jr., designated certain precise locations where both flags would be flown regularly, and did not include the American chools in the Canal Zone.

This left an opening for a display of ow some young Americans felt about their flag, and their country's claim to the land on which they live. And so, for he past three days, American students American schools in the Canal Zone d been raising the American flag and had not been raising any flag of Panana alongside it.

This display of patriotiam on the part American students thus ignored the high agreement between the United itates and Panama. Our authorities rertedly remonstrated gently with our ients, and appealed to them, but aprently did not halt the practice.

So, eventually, some Panamanian udents gathered flags of their own ation and marched toward and into the Canal Zone with the object of trying to raise their flag alongside ours, as per he high level agreement. Somebody ired, the Panamanian students fell back, eaving six dead. such a demand as you mentioned will develop," he answered the inevitable question about a "draft." "It would be presumptuous to assume that it will. However, if it should, like any other concerned American, I would have a duty to accept. To do anything else would be an effrontery."

Somehow, we have trouble understanding how a potential candidate for any office manages to think that it would be audacity, boldness, brass, hardihood, impudence, insolence, or shamelessness, all good synonyms for effrontery, not to take the nominat & Usually, if it ever does come within reach, the best of them reach for it, bold as brass.

Paternal, Or Puritan?

This is the worst of all possible times to express cynicism regarding the motives of any campaign against the delightful sin and vice and the undoubted -ly deleterious practice of amoking.

But we'll bet two unsmoked packs of Murads against any carton of tips that the management of that Long Island bank which has just prohibited its employes from smoking is more a Puritani-I than a solicitous management.

The management claims that its new rule, which forbids smoking on the job except out in washrooms or cafeterias, is designed to keep its employes healthier and happier and on the job more regularly, thus saying an estimated \$100,000 a year in sick leave.

This is a very good story.

And scratch beneath it and we'll bet here emerges some cold Puritan anger, omewhere in the management, over the idea of mere employes daring to have a moment's comfort and relaxation during the time for which they have been hired. This is not the tender care of the paternal institution, but the whip of the overseer, the whip left over from days when working was a privilege conferred by the employer, not a contracting from the employer for something he too needed. We sense more of a war on laziness than on tobacco, and even more of a love of egulating other people than a love of

What if, at the end of the first year of no-smoking, employe morale is low, the office dispirited and tired and wan, and the sick leave statistics double what they were when a quick smoke, even at the desk, acted as a psychological safety valve?

Going To Court?

Legislature may have slightly overzealous. Under the phrase, "implied consent," the 1963 Legislature decreed that anyone holding a driver's license agrees, if re-quested by a law enforcement official, to submit himself to a chemical breath or blood test to determine the content alcohol in his bloodstream. Present interpretations put on the law indicated that the innocent conceivabl could be punished nearly as severely as the guilty. If a man refuses to submit to the tests, the motor vehicle commission ar will suspend his driver's license for aix months even if he is later found not guilty in court.

Plainly this provision was designed to keep suspected drunken drivers from avoiding chemical evidence of their guilt. And the Legislature would never guilt. And the Legislature would never have enacted so sweeping a measure if it wasn't guided by the concept that a driver's license is a privilege, not a right. But if a citizen of Connecticut is going to be deprived of a privilege in public courts, the rights he enjoys once he is brought to trial should not be violated. The law enacted by the 1963 session of the General Assembly says, in effect, that a man is no longer presumed to be innocent until proven guilty. It says exactly the contrary: A man is guilty until found not guilty by a court; and even then, if he refused to take a chem-ical test when arrested, he will be punical test when arrested, he will be pun-ished by a department of the State of Connecticut for his refusal.

The common argument heard is that only the guilty would have any reason to refuse to submit to a chemical breath or blood test, but this is an assumption, and it does not follow that those who refuse have violated the law of the state. It seems clear that the law will be put to a test in the courts. One of these days a driver will be told he must take days a driver will be told he must take a chamical test. He may be drunk, he may be a tee-totaler, he may be in an emotionally disturbed state. He will re-fuse to offer evidence to incriminate himself—which is his right under the U. S. Constitution. His lawyer will argue that the chemical test is similar to the lie detactor test which nona is bound to submit to; and the state will go to court. Such a test case would at least eliminate nome of the present confusion over the new isw. — WATERBURY REPUBLI-CAN


