



According to the railroads, it costs them about \$200 per year for every commuter they haul into the Grand Cenral Station. To suggest that the commuter should pay his own way, by raising fares \$17 per month, would not solve the problem. Commuter fares are at the point of diminishing return. Raised fares would so cut passenger use that receipts would be reduced. They would also put an intolerable burden on our highway traffic system because the commuter who is distraught if the train is late can take traffic jams with equa-This week the Institute of Public Ad-

ministration reported, after a two year study made under a grant from the Ford Foundation. This report recom-mends the formation of a New York-Connecticut Agency which would take over all passenger train service to the suburbs between the City and Westcheser and Fairfield counties.

Governor Dempsey has stated that Connecticut would be willing to pick up its share of some sort of subsidy to keep the commuter service running. The agency plan would be a method of conating that part of the rail service which is suffering the greatest loss. At the same time, the transport agency built in weaknesses.
