




Special Care Unit Starts in Pediatrics

Two changes have been instituted in the pediatrics wing at Manchester Memorial Hospital which should result both in better care and a happier time for the children. A unique pediatrics special care unit opened for the first time yesterday, and achildren's playroom—a first at MMH—began operation a few days ago.

According to Charles Markel, administrative assistant at the hospital, a pediatrics special care unit is something that "as far as we know, does not generally exist in many community hospitals."

He said the unit is based on the hospital's special care units for adults, which have proved very successful. The hospital's now world famous system of progressive patient care has been widely adopted elsewhere. ### Like The West, But More Lawless

Every time a certain brand of crime is committed with what seems like at east a temporary brand of success, the publicity given it probably inspires its repetition or imitation by somebody else. For many months now there has seemed to be, in Connecticut, a growing mpression that it is not too difficult a matter to put a mild, quick tap on the counter money of small suburban branch banks. The amounts gained, when measured against today's cost of living, have been ridiculously small. Yeserday's masked bandit in Berlin, for instance, got away with \$3,300. That wouldn't do more than purchase the car he needs for his criminal profes-

Fortunately, the bank bandits have, o far, been fairly careful characters. They have not used the weapons they carry, or pretend to carry.

But the frequency with which they perate is appalling. Last year, they hit branch banks 12 times in Connecticut. And already this year three more have

The result is that if a Connecticut citizen wants to spend an evening in something approaching an atmosphere of law and order he turns face down turns on one of television's western dramas, where crime is relatively rare and the criminal, thank goodness, always gets caught.

But it is, of course, a certain physical similarity to the circumstances of the old west which encourages this particular brand of crime. A branch bank is often a relatively isolated building, often staffed with a small number of employes, and frequently situated so that anybody watching can know whether or not any customers are in the bank. As it has turned out, the convenience of the modern kind of customer, who likes to drive to his banking in a place where there is clear and open parking space, has also become the convenience of the would-be bank bandit.

We wonder how much it would cost to have an automatic camera, located up in the bank ceiling, take a cheap snapshot every time a branch bank door is opened.

### When Hush-Hush Speaks Out Loud

Everybody rejects the idea that it was in any way a normal thing for our famous cloak-and-dagger outfit, the CIA, to hold a press conference on anything. and so there are any number of theories about the special motivations which led the agency to entertain the press the other day and provide it with reports showing that one more once famed Russian bugaboo—the presumed growth of Russia's gross national product at a rate much faster than ours has apparently turned into a Russian deficit.

One theory is that the CIA was trying to recoup its own public image. When anything goes wrong anywhere in the world, it is getting to be a habit to infer that CIA mis-maneuver, or CIA misinformation, may have been responsible. So the CIA wanted to show how smart and expert it could be in this field.

Another theory is that somebody, perhaps in the White House, the State Department, or perhaps merely in the CIA itself, wanted to alert not only americans but our friends in Europe to he possibility that the Russians are on he ropes, economically speaking, and should not be carelessly or needlessly sescued, therefore, by any extension e long term economic credits.

There can be such analysis and doubt as to the motivation for the CIA press conference, but there is not much variation in the response the new CIA policy

It has been one part criticism of the CLA, the hush-hush outfit, for seeming to try to wage foreign policy openly and an equal part of expert questionin of the accuracy of the CIA report, or, at least, the wisdom of making it an offi-The experts on Russia who quarrel

most with the CIA finding of a rather sensational decline in the growth rate of the Russian GNP base their quarrel on the guess that most of the current decline comes from bad weather and severe agricultural failure. Quite conceivably, other factors in the Russian economy have been zooming ahead. If this is so, a simple blessing of good agricultural weather next year could make the general Russian statistic jump upward in sensational fashion-and, to anybody who insists on imagining stakes of survival in this war of production and statistics—in frightening fashion.

With such a battle of statistics so fascinating an affair, and with the economic race with Russia so lively a topic especially in presidential election years, one feels almost naive to suggest that, long range, we might be smart to wish prosperity to Russia, on the theory that such prosperity as it has already enjoyed has done more to weaken both Communist theory and Communist religious zeal than any outside attack or internal

We have seen it work too often

everywhere there is human nature, to doubt its eventual success inside Russia too. To make a capitalist, give a man a chance to reach for a little capital, give him a stake in a more prosperous life, We find it very difficult to consider Russian prosperity bad news, especially since much of it when it occurs is already in compromise away from pure Communist theory, or to consider Russian economic failure good news, when it can quite conceivably result in intensified

### Still 20,000 Voting Minds Away

Once again, the people of a Southern state, offered a choice between candidates in the matter of their stands on the racial issue, have gone to the polls and voted victory to the man who made the most direct appeal to segregationist

This was not, perhaps, the whole issue in Louisiana, Conceivably, to some sections of the state, former Mayor deLesseps Morrison of New Orleans was not merely a fellow with liberal ideas on race relations, but a city slicker as well. And perhaps there were other matters besides race on which the successful runner in the weekend Democratic primary, John J. McKeithen was more successful in gaining the ear of Louisiana's voters.

But some day the vote 'will come in which the moderate on racial issues defeats the candidate who stakes his campaign on seeming less moderate. When that vote comes, there will be a new experience in tangible and satisfying evidence that things are beginning to change, down deep inside people, down deep in the South.

But in Louisiana the other day, the vote ran some 492,000 for the segregationist, 451,000 for the moderate, or still some 20,000 voting minds away from that result which would be hailed as a sign of progress.

### Maybe One Hour A Day?

The Senate at Washington the other day shelved, probably for another good long time, a proposed reform in its rules of debate. Normally, one tries to appreciate the customs and traditions of the Senate, and realize that such popular targets as the filibuster are in reality potential protection of minority views and emotions, and that it might do far more harm to true democracy, in the long run, to abolish the fillbuster than It does to continue to suffer with the occasional abuse of it.

But the reform proposed, and shelved, the other day has its attractions, and might be amended to become most rea-

Senator John Pastore, the able and respected Democrat of Rhode Island. wanted the Senate to require itself to spend at least three hours of its business session each day on the business it was supposed to be considering that day. This is the proposed rule of germane-


