It would have been nice-it would still be a wonderful thing to have happen-to be able to get out of the crisis n Panama by some series of silken compromises and understandings which would leave everybody's "face" intact.

The situation has been, and perhaps still is, close to this kind of a quietus. Under such a possible settlement, the United States and Panama would both agree to two things, the one procedures for keeping immediate order in the territory they both share, and the other the future institution of talks between the two nations which would, obviously enough, lead to some kind of adjustment in the present arrangements governing our operation of the Canal Zone.

The seal of our present agreement on these two main things would be Panama's restoration of diplomatic recognition of the United States. The prospects of getting this vary

almost from hour to hour. At this moment, they seem to hinge on whether or not the United States has undertaken, in return for such prospective return of recognition, to "renegotiate" the 1903 treaty, or merely to "discuss" the possibility of renegotiating the treaty.

One can also guess, that, at this very moment, the joint diplomacy of the United States and Panama would be gliding right over this question of semantics and of intent and getting a quick su face restoration of normalcy between the two nations were it not for the nationalist hot-bloods on either side. They threaten to make it impossible

for diplomacy to slide over the troublesome details of restoring peace. They threaten to force a point-blank consideration of the real underlying issue—the issue probably neither the United States nor Panama really wants to have to face to any finality at

The hot-bloods in Panama are in outery against any resumption of diplomatic relations with the United States which does not include a virtual guarantee that the United States will concede that the Panama Canal, or its Zone, at least, really belongs to Panama, and to for Panama to rule.

The hot-bloods in this country—such leaders as former President Truman in his morning walk wisdoms, or Senator Goldwater in his rallying of the far right -are either advising or demanding that this country do absolutely nothing which would be in the nature of a consession away from our absolute and perpetual exercise of sovereignty in the Canal Zone. They stand ready to accuse President Johnson of softness and apsement if he even adheres to the ymbolic concession made by President Eisenhower and implemented under raident Kennedy—the concession to the effect that the residual sovereignty

in the Canal Zone is that of Panama, while we, under the 1903 treaty and its subsequent revisions, have privileges there equivalent to those of sovereignty, out not actually sovereignty itself. Freedom has many facets. It in-The hot-bloods on both sides, then,



School Smoking Ban

The recent report of the U.S. Surgeon General on smoking and disease has had its impact on the members of the board of education, who last night voted 6 to 1 to ban student smoking at Manchester High School and at the same time emphasize smoking education.

A long discussion of the smoking problem at a meeting Dec. 4 ended in the tabiling of a motion by Dr. Waiter Schardt to rescind the board's long-standing policy of allowing students to smoke after lunch provided they had parental permission.

Smoking was permitted in a designated patio area adjacent to the student cafeteria, but only after lunch. At other times and places both on the school grounds and within the building, it was prohibited.

The new ban prohibiting all smoking by students will take effect Jan. 27, the beginning of the second semester.




