How To Win Without Primaries

The importance the New Hampshir Republican primary held back in 1952, when it gave Dwight D. Eisenhower the first real boost toward the Presidency over Robert Taft, and the subsequent importance primaries had on the Democratic side of things in 1960, when John F. Kennedy felt compelled to seek his nomination by the hardest possible route, and just barely survived in Wisconsin before he shifted into high gear in West Virginia such importance for presidential primaries in the past should not

mislead smart money in 1964. This year it is almost a sure proposition that the one nomination up for grabs—the Republican—will go to an individual who keeps himself out of all the primaries shaping up.

Others may go in and fight the primaries, and kill each other off, but that mutual slaughter will be the biggest reward left to any of them, at the end. This prospect, if it is valid, means that such willing workers as Senator Gold-water and Governor Rockefeller, each required to be a primary contender because to refrain might be to bow the other into a real lead for the nomination, are merely putting on the exhibition preliminary, while the real main bout will take place at San Francisco, after all the primaries have been held. The way the party situation is shaping up, there will be two candidates at

San Francisco who will not have been their participation in primaries. One will be former Vice President Richard Nixon, the best known of what might be called the big four potentials. The other will be Governor William

Scranton of Pennsylvania, least known of the four, and therefore, perhaps, the most immediately appealing of them all. Staying out of primaries is almost as obligatory for Nixon and Scranton, in the positions they hold, as getting into them is obligatory for Goldwater and Nixon cannot play much more of a game than keep himself available.

as an experienced and willing choice for his party in case it gets desperate with some controversial lack of other choice. Governor Scranton has a lot more he and his friends can be doing, in the short time now left before San Francisco. The things that can be done by or for Scranton include, on the one hand, a tactful reach toward delegations not subject to primaries and seeking some comfortable haven from party storms, and, on the other hand, those delicate operations designed to build up and establish an image pleasing to the general public. and therefore appealing in turn to the practical politicians.

The image which suggests itself for Governor Scranton, if it has not already suggested itself to him and his backers, is that of the young wealthy patrician, smoother and closer to the memory of John F. Kennedy than to the competition of Rockefeller, and one of the new generation of ambitious men who, although they can't quite be trusted not to be spending some of their own great inherited wealth in the quest of political position and honor, can be more reliably trusted not to be caught ever converting their political success or position into any new nourishment of their own already adequate fortunes.

Precisely because he is least known, least shopworn, and most romantic in his possibilities, Governor Scranton has to be rated the favorite of the moment. That is not as much compliment to him as it is comment on the calibre and appeal of the opposition. This negative advantage, however, is not likely to carry him all the way. He will be meeting tests, some of them inevitably revealing, almost every day between now and conrention time, even if he maintains an official position reluctant enough to jusy his abstention from every primary.
