

Montenegro means Black Mountain, and at the time of World War I consisted of 3,700 square miles with a population of less than 3,000, half of whom knew each other by sight and were connected by ties of blood and other relationships. Any immigrant from the Balkans had to be adopted into one of the existing units of blood brotherhood.

The men of Montenegro have all the characteristics of other inhabitants of the Balkans raised to the boiling point. In the ed to the boiling point. In the first episode in January 1916, during the Orthodox Christmas, during the Orthodox Christmas, the Army fights gallantly in the mountain passes against Austria-Hungary. cept Madame Nhu and her American thusiasts thought that the Diem regime in South Vietnam had to fall before that country could ever begin winning its war against Communist rebels. Now Defense Secretary Robert S. Mc-Namara gives an appraisal of events in South Vietnam which admits that, when the Diem regime did fall, the immediate result was one of considerable gain for the Communists. Or, to put it more ensationally than the Defense Secretary would put it, we have been losing in South Vistnam, as most correspond-

ents have been reporting. From this admission, Secretary Mclamara goes ahead to offer hope of a fferent story in the future, His hope and comfort lie in the possibility that the new regime in South Vietnam, havng staged its revolution, has now berun to face up to some of the responsibilities of its power, and begun to get back into the field against the Communist jungle fighters, the way our experts have been trying to teach them to. 





Historical Canterbury Church Fire Evokes

When in the early morning of Dec. 22, 1963 a fire burned to the ground the beatiful, early nineteenth century First Congregational Church in Canterbury a link in 252 years of Connecticut history went up in smoke.

Two other churches stood on the same site, and a new one will be built there. The four churches will have covered this long span of time since the congregation was forward in 1711.

Prudence, a Quaker, started the consecticut School for Girls in the fall of 1832 in the Elisha Payne house which still stands a few hundred feet from the church. She had admitted a Negro girl student, Sara Harris, a member of a local family. Reaction to this brought withdrawal of white girls from the school by their parents.

In answer to this boycott Miss Crandall said, "I could not refuse any person the benefit of education on the basis of color alone and live thereafter with my conscience."

She then advertised for serviction and five for acquittal. She was tried a second time and convicted. In an appeal to the Supreme Court of Errors, the charges against Prudence were dismissed on a technicality. The court refused to act on the constitutionality of the law under which she had been convicted because of the agitation and civil unrest over the slavery question.

But Canterbury's citizens were still up in arms. It has been recorded that they tried to raze her home, refused to sell her food, poisoned her well,
