





Our Uncertain Indignation

American plane over East Germany on Tuesday makes the ninth instance, in some 15 years of cold war, in which the Russians have shot at or shot down an American plane. In all instances they doing this over their own territory, or that of puppets or allies.

In this same period, there is no record of American action shooting down any Russian plane. The absence of such record is not the result of any known American policy of not shooting down Russian planes if they appear over our territory anywhere. It seems to be a result of the fact that Russian planes have never been detected over territory

For a time, all Americans took this record with a natural one way assumption that planes of ours which got into such trouble were the victims of navigational troubles, or storms, plus Russian

The Russian brutality can still stand, but we Americans have long since been deprived of our automatic confidence in our own blamelesaness in such incidents. We could wish the Russians would be more civilized. Perhaps we wish, too, that if the opportunity to shoot somebody down came our way, we would be civilized ourselves. But we also have to wish that our planes would somehow develop the ability to stay inside their own borders.



But there is one neutral verdict rendered every time something like this happens. It is that somehow, some day, before we do succeed in blowing each other up and our world with us, we and the Russians have to back off from each other far enough so we aren't looking directly into each other's small artillery. Here are three fine young Amerieans dead, in circumstances which make it impossible, so far, for any of us or our government to make our protest anything more than automatic. This, in its way, is almost as intolerable as it would be to know that the Russians had shot this plane down over our own territory.
