LOS ANGELES (AP) — The discovery that Mars' atmosphere is even thinner than believed, forcing redesign of vehicles planned for landing on the planet, was reported today by a space scientist.

The discovery is not expected to affect two Mars spacecraft scheduled for launching next November—they are designed to fly past Mars with television cameras but not to land.

It could cause redesign of other Mars craft.

A deduction is available for damage to your personal automobile resulting from a collision with another vehicle.

You can deduct only your loss in any case. Therefore, you must reduce the damage by any insurance payment you received.

Bit by Bit, They Chart The World

TURKISH AIR FORCE BASE, Inc. (ATP) — Moving the Grand Bahama Island could be listed as one accomplishment for the year of the 1970's.

The shift was done on maps after the Atlantic Missile Range was surveyed by the 1370th Photo Mapping Wing of the Air Photographic and Charting Service.

This project, born of need to meet precise guidance requirements of missiles, sharpened considerably the accuracy of the Atlantic range by uncovering mapping errors.

They found Grand Bahama six miles out of position on maps then in use; Cuba misplaced by six-tenths of a mile and other points erroneously located on maps.

One major survey of the 1370th was charting of the North Atlantic to link accurately the North American and European continents. Covering 2,000 miles, it was accurate within 34 feet.

"It provides the basic geographic link for our missile strategy," said Col. Kendall S. Young, commander of the 1370th.

From polar loops to describe peaks in South America; from New Guinea jungles to barren Pacific atolls — the men of the 1370th measure the world, bit by bit.

Sometimes it's lonely.

"For five months I saw only one bird," said Sgt. Thomas Fenton telling of his experiences on Greenland's lonely ground crews of three men usually spend about three months at a station, living in tents.

Sometimes there's too much company.

The natives tribe of natives, painted and armed with spears, bows and arrows, surrounded our three-man station on an island near New Guinea," Col. Hugh W. Bell said.

They were obviously disturbed about something.

So were the three Air Force crewmen.

"To keep the tribesmen from exploding, the ground crew gave away nearly all their food," Bell said.

The natives usually are friendly. It is the elements, insects, snakes and other animals that usually bother the ground crewmen.

In Brazil, the snakes were a menace. In the South Pacific, it was the birds. A new project in Biologia has a proposed ground station on a 10,000-foot peak.

"Down breathing might be the problem," said Sgt. Donald S. Rider.

Much of the 1370th's work is done to help other countries find out what they look like. Aerial survey teams are working in Colombia, Panama, Costa Rica, Honduras, British Guiana, Nicaragua, Guatemala and New Guinea.

Projects have been completed in and around Brazil, the Hawaiian Islands, Alaska, the Aleutians, Iceland, Greenland, the Philippines, Greece, Spain, Italy and Norway.

The men of the 1370th still have plenty of work ahead. Only about 40 per cent of the globe has been mapped.

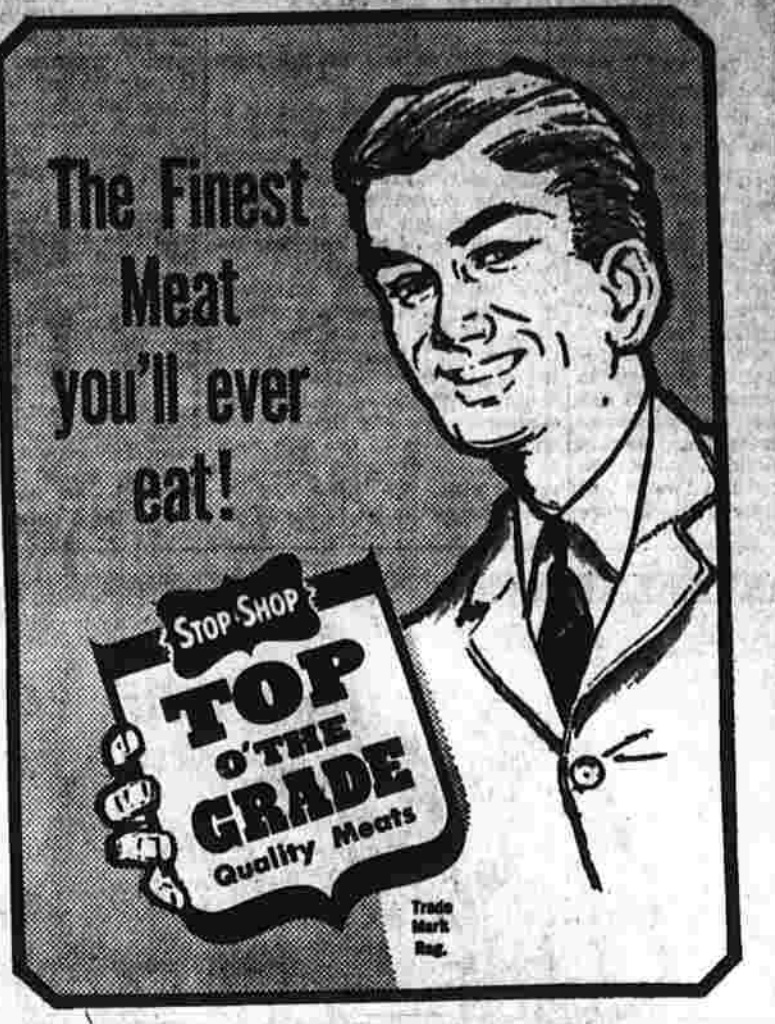

\$43,000 Cuts Asked For School Budget

The finance committee of the board of education has recommended paring nearly \$43,000 from the public school operating budget being requested for 1964-65 by the superintendent of schools.

It voted by the board of education to reduce the budget early next month, the cuts would drop the amount being asked to run the schools from the \$2,278,414 requested by Supt. of Schools William H. Curtis to the \$2,235,414 recommended last night by the board's finance committee.

Reporting last night to the board on the results of the finance committee's deliberations, its chairman, Belmont Schaffer, recommended cuts in several areas.

The major portions of the cuts, Schaffer said, were effected by reducing the amount for administration by \$5,127, for operation of plant, by \$15,000. Only one area, maintenance of plant, was increased—by \$331.

Schaffer said that the board of education should be notified of the cuts by the board of education by Feb. 5 or 12. He went on to note that the cuts were made in line with what seemed to be the needs of the board majority at the recent series of workshops on the budget.

As outlined by Schaffer, the features of the major budget changes are that: 1) Provide \$255,498 for principal salaries; 2) Provide some \$40,000 for teachers and department heads for extra-curricular duties; 3) Provide for the creation of a data processing center; 4) Add to the budget request the provision for an elementary school librarian; 5) Delete the request for an additional assistant superintendent of school operations; 6) Retain intact the recommended salaries for teachers as agreed upon by teacher committees and the personnel policies committee of the board.

Though there is no provision in the capital improvements budget for renovating the 60-year-old heating plant at Belmont Junior High School, Supt. Curtis reminded board members that the system "is so antiquated it could break down at any time. It was given permission to engage a heating engineer to study the problem and will report the results to the board."

China Source of Anxiety To Kremlin, White House

By WILLIAM L. RYAN

It is those undeveloped areas of the world where Peking seems to feel it can make the most progress.

The Red Chinese are making some headway, too, and this likely is a source of alarm not only to the United States but to the West in general. The Soviet Union and the United States closer together as the powers with the greatest responsibility for the world's peace.

Dead Fliers Returned to West Berlin

BERLIN (AP)—The bodies of three U.S. Air Force officers shot down over Communist East Germany were brought to West Berlin today. A brief ceremony was held at West Berlin's Tempelhof Airport before the bodies were loaded aboard an Air Force transport to be flown to Wiesbaden, West Germany. The fliers were stationed at Wiesbaden and their widows and children live there. Ambassador George McGhee, ranking U.S. official in Germany, said: "This is indeed a sad day for our nation. The shooting down of these brave men was a shocking and horrible affair, entirely unnecessary. Our hearts go out to their loved ones." There was an honor guard of 40 officers, McGhee and Maj. Gen. James H. Polk, the U.S. commandant in Berlin, stood in front of them. A second honor guard was composed of 15 Air Force. Four enlisted men carried the flag-draped coffins to the C130 transport. There was no band.

Mother Accused In Babies' Deaths

State's Atty. Joel H. Reed II is expected to move today in Tolland County Superior Court for a bench warrant against a 29-year-old mother of three in the death of her two infant daughters while she lived in Rockville. State Police Major Samuel Rome said today he will ask the court to lodge a charge of manslaughter against Mrs. Nora E. Rogers of 1 Jandot Dr., Enfield. The Rogers lived on Union St. in Rockville until a short time ago. Investigation is continuing in the death of an 11-month-old son, James, who died in Enfield last December. Mrs. Rogers was arrested yesterday on a warrant issued by Tolland County Coroner Bernard J. Ackerman charging her with the death of one daughter, Barbara Ann, seven months. Maj. Rome said Mrs. Rogers admitted last night that she threw the baby into a crib on Jan. 28, 1960. Mrs. Rogers took the baby to Rockville City Hospital after it became ill but the child was dead on arrival, police said. The other daughter, Theresa, four months, died on April 27, 1957. Police said she suffocated to death. (See Page Eight)

Atom Freeze Bid Explained by U.S.

GENEVA (AP)—The United States called on the Soviet Union today to join in freezing all development of military rockets and other means of delivering nuclear arms. U.S. Delegate William C. Foster explained the American proposal at the 17-nation disarmament conference. It is one of several suggestions President Johnson made when the conference resumed on Jan. 21. Foster said a freeze of nuclear weapons carriers "would be an accomplishment far beyond any 'confidence building' measure in significance, yet one that could be achieved in a reasonable period of time." U.S. Hopes Viet Boss To Press War Effort

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Ranking U.S. officials expressed hope today the South Viet Nam coup will lead to a stronger war effort against the Communists. Some believed the new military strong man, Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh, a tough field commander, would bring badly needed unity and discipline to the fight against the Viet Cong guerrillas. American officials long have believed only a strong, stable regime backed by popular support can campaign successfully against the Communists. In his only comment on the coup, U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge disclaimed the United States had any hand in Khanh's seizure of power. Lodge said he learned of the developments only the night before the revolt. He said he urged Khanh to avoid bloodshed. Americans who would comment asked that their names be withheld. Those with optimism noted the government upheaval took place without bloodshed. This was in contrast to the severe fighting Nov. 1-2 that overthrew French to neutralize South Viet Nam as a preliminary move to pulling together the government and army and nipping potential coups. Most Americans in Saigon interpreted the upheaval as a power struggle among generals. They discounted Khanh's charges that members of the old junta were plotting with the French to neutralize South Viet Nam as a preliminary move to pulling together the country with North Viet Nam and ending the war. Centenarian Publisher Retires

By TENNEY GRIFFIN VALDOSTA, Ga. (AP)—Maybe it's the smell of printer's ink or his interest in everything, but E. L. Turner intends to keep an eye on his newspaper as he retires at 100. The title of publisher emeritus gives him the right to do just that. As for the years ahead, he says, "I'll let them take care of themselves." Turner will be 101 on March 8. "After 75 memorable years, time has taken its toll," he told the board of directors this week as he retired from active management of the Valdosta Daily Times. He stepped down as publisher and turned his job over to another Turner, his son E. Mann Turner, who at 76 is following his father's example of longevity. The elder Turner came to Valdosta in 1889 as a 40-a-month printer. He nurtured the newspaper with heart and wit from a tiny weekly to a daily with a circulation of 14,500. His dry humor and astute observations are remembered by many. On his birthday last March, his employees and directors staged a birthday party for "Poppa." That's what they all called him. 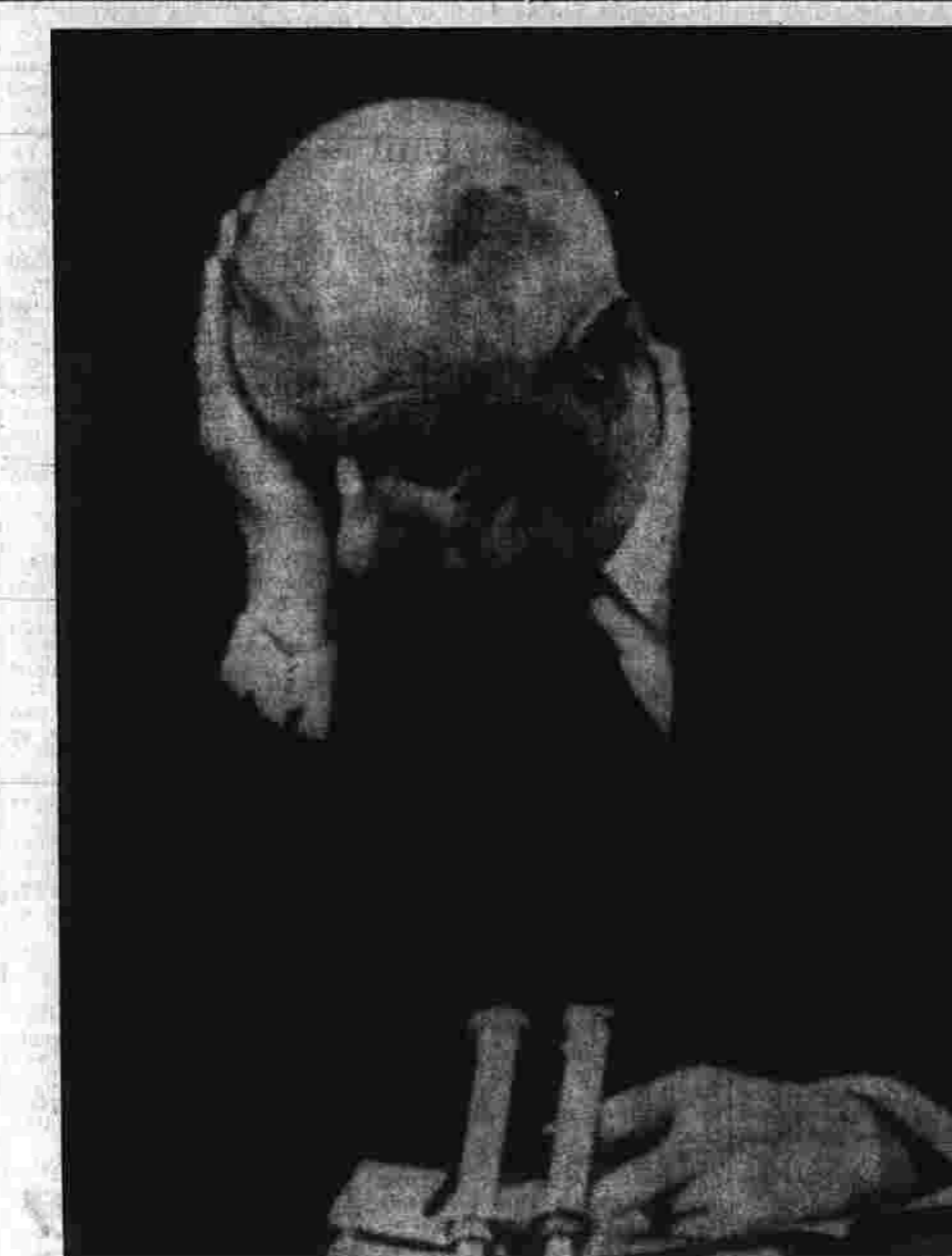

Keney Golf Club Admits 1st Negro

HARTFORD (AP)—The first Negro has been admitted to the all-white Keney Park Men's Golf Club. Councilman Thomas H. Corrigan made the announcement today after a month's negotiations with the club on behalf of Gerard M. Peterson of 188 Cleveland Ave. The decision reverses two previous rejections of membership for Peterson and came the day before the city was set to impose sanctions against the club which plays on the city-owned course at Keney Park. Corrigan quoted the club's president, George Potts, saying "It was indeed unfortunate that inference of discrimination... had been attached to the club's actions. Potts maintained that the Keney group has had good relations with the Midway Golf Club, an all-Negro group which also plays the Keney course. Peterson is president of Midway. Potts said a large number of the Keney club's membership had voted to accept Peterson in two previous ballots. The refusal of admission, Potts said, had been based on the club's belief that: Peterson's activity as president of the Midway Club would preclude active participation in the Keney group's affairs. His reason for seeking membership was only to get a state handicap and not for active participation.

Asks Revival Of Portion of Brannan Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson told Congress today the government should extend a bigger helping hand to the nation's farmers. He called for broader federal payments and urged efforts for reducing rural poverty. The President sent his views to Capitol Hill in a special farm message. In taking a firm stand in support of federal intervention in agriculture, he may well have laid down the line for his party's election-year battle on the farm issue. He asked for revival of part of the controversial Brannan Plan. Many Republicans and some farm groups want the government to make a gradual withdrawal from government price, production and marketing control programs for agriculture. Johnson's proposals for commodity programs contained no surprises for farm leaders. They were in line with those advanced last year by the late President John F. Kennedy and by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman. Changes in the commodity programs for cotton, wheat, milk and potatoes. The revisions are aimed at improving the income of the producers of these products and at strengthening the family farm. A five-year extension of the Food for Peace program and an expansion of the domestic food stamp program. More than \$12 billion in farm surpluses have moved to needy countries under the Food for Peace plan. The stamp plan enables needy persons to buy increased quantities of food at regular grocery stores. Greater use of human and material resources in rural America under programs aimed at combating poverty, largely through greater emphasis on the agriculture department's rural areas development program. He said he would be more specific in a later message on poverty, but as a starter recommended enlarged watershed and flood prevention programs under federal aid. How much would his farm program cost? Johnson gave the figures 10 days ago in his budget message. He asked \$5.8 billion for overall farm program spending in the year starting next July 1, \$1.1 billion below this year's total. Of the new total, about \$1.7 billion would be spent for farm aid programs—compared with \$1.9 billion this year. The rest would be spent on research, Food for Peace and other programs not providing direct payments to farmers. An administration spokesman said the recommendations for broadened payments to increase farm income would not add to the cost of farm programs. The payments would come, he said, from savings that would result through a planned reduction in surpluses. "The agricultural commodity programs developed during the past 30 years have served us well," Johnson said in the message. "They are now an indispensable backbone of our agricultural economy. Without them our food supply would be much less secure than it is today." The President said some of these programs needed improve. (See Page Eight)

Neutral-Asia Policy Aim of French Chief

PARIS (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle today advocated the neutralization of Southeast Asia and said relations with Red China are necessary to achieve it. Speaking at a crowded news conference, De Gaulle defended his decision earlier this week to establish diplomatic relations with the Chinese Communist regime. He declined to comment on the two-China issue that is recognizing both the Chinese. (See Page Eight)

Cypriots Refuse NATO Peace Unit

LONDON (AP)—Greek and Turkish Cypriots today rejected plans for an international peace force—including U.S. troops—to police the torn island. The development came after a diplomatic meeting had raised hopes that a break in the Cyprus deadlock was in sight. The Cyprus Turks told Duncan Sandys, British Commonwealth secretary, that the joint force proposal was unacceptable. Diplomatic sources said the proposal also was rejected by the Greek Cypriots who favor a U.N.-controlled peace force. Representatives of the Greek and Turkish governments also raised objections to the international peace force plan, composed of about 10,000, including 1,000-2,000 U.S. troops. The chief obstacle was Archbishop Makarios, Greek Cypriot president of Cyprus, who gave every indication of vetoing the plan unless the force is answerable to the United Nations. The allies are not likely to approve this because it would involve the Soviet Union. Diplomatic sources said the archbishop's objections might be overcome if U.N. Secretary-General U Thant endorsed the NATO force. Whether Thant would run the risk of Soviet anger by doing this was questionable. British Foreign Secretary R. A. Butler, Commonwealth Secretary Duncan Sandys and U.S. Ambassador David Bruce outlined the plan at a Marlborough conference table to the Greek and Turkish foreign ministers. (See Page Eight)

Red Teacher Takes Speed Skating Event

INNSBRUCK, Austria (AP)—Lidia Skoblikova of the Soviet Union won the 1,500-meter speed skating event today with a record performance and became the first double gold medal winner of the Olympics. The American team again was shut out at the winter games. The Soviet Union's forces now have won three gold medals and added one silver and three bronzes. The U.S. squad still is looking for its first medal. The American team made its strongest showing in the first runs of the two-man bobsled competition. A pair of dark-horse Britons grabbed the lead from the favored Italians. The British slidders, Antony Nash and Robin Dixon, went down the 1,640-yard bobsled run in 1 minute, 5.58 seconds on their first try and followed with a 1:05.10 clocking for an overall time of 2:10.63. Italy's No. 2 sled, driven by Sergio Zardini, had a time of 2:10.76 and the No. 1 sled, piloted by Eugenio Monti, had (See Page Seven)

Stock Options Assailed Bonus System Hailed For Boosting Profits

EDITOR'S NOTE—The nation's corporations are reporting earnings higher than ever before. Various reasons are given, including cost-cutting, automation, new products, increased demand. In many instances, however, management gives chief credit to executive incentives, such as bonuses and stock options. Here is a report on the bonus system. By ROGER LANE AP Business News Writer NEW YORK (AP)—Cash bonuses, stock options and other special incentives to executives play a role in generating record corporate profits like those now being reported. Practically every big company offers incentive compensation to lure and hold able managers. Rewards under most plans are geared to profits. For top executives, the incentive often is tailored to overcome the federal income tax rates on high bracket salaries. General Motors Corp. awarded more than \$100 million bonuses at the start of 1963 based on employee performance in 1962. Last Monday, GM reported 1963 earnings of \$1,592,000,000 more money than any business has ever made in a year. Stock options granted to Lynn Townsend, president, and six other officers of Chrysler Corp., a GM rival, stirred a demand by Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., to outlaw such privileges. (See Page Eleven)
