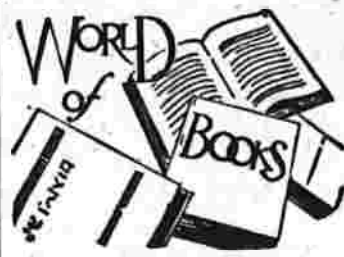

Changes in Charter

The board of directors, last night, set the date of Monday, Feb. 24 for a public hearing on 32 proposed charter changes, and scheduled two informal meetings with the Charter Revision Commission (CRC), "to study the proposals thoroughly, without putting them in the State House Rule Act, the public hearing must be held within 30 days of receipt of the CRC report. The board will have 15 days, after the public hearing, in which to accept the proposed changes, or any part of them, or to recommend changes. The board will then set a date for a referendum, presently indicated as being held in May.

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Board Votes Enlarged CAC, Hears Globe Hollow Report

The town directors last night approved a plan to enlarge the Citizens Advisory Committee, to assist the town with its urban renewal projects, in place of the informally appointed 15 man committee that now exists.

Enlargement of the CAC, and the appointment of its members to serve overlapping three year terms, was asked by Director Theodore Powell and seconded by Republican director Hattie Taylor. Both members of the directors' subcommittee on urban renewal.

During the meeting time allotted to public discussion of the items on the agenda, Mrs. Helen F. Frisvold, Dr. A. B. Moran both questioned whether the proposal would make the CAC more of a political plan than a working committee.

General Manager Martin replied that the ordinance will not change the structure of the committee or its relationship to the town government, but simply enlarge and formally establish the group.

Speaking as head of the directors renewal subcommittee, Powell reported that the final cost estimate of the North End project is not yet available, but should be released soon.

General Manager Martin reported to the board that final approval of the proposed Globe Hollow bath house, to replace the present structure, is available by the end of this month.

Since the design work has been done by Town Engineer Walter Puse and Building Inspector Thomas Monahan, most of the amount appropriated to the project remains unencumbered, he said.

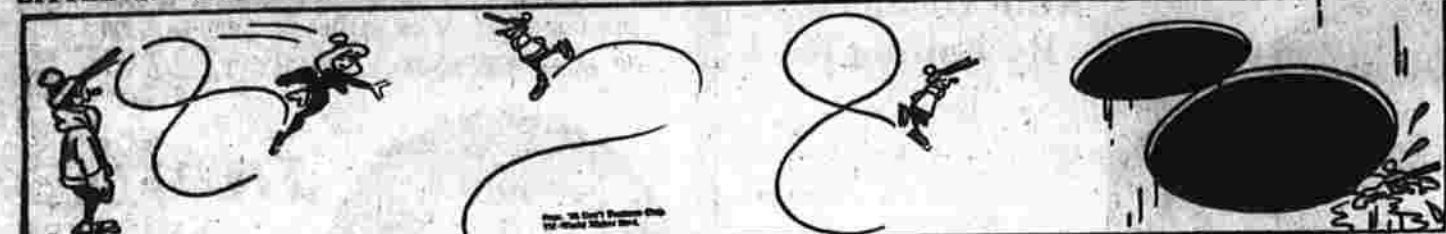

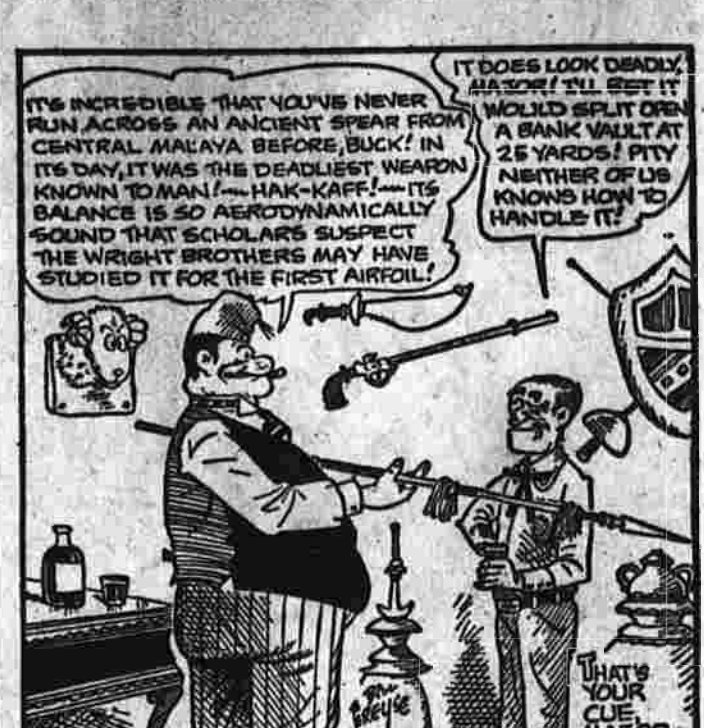

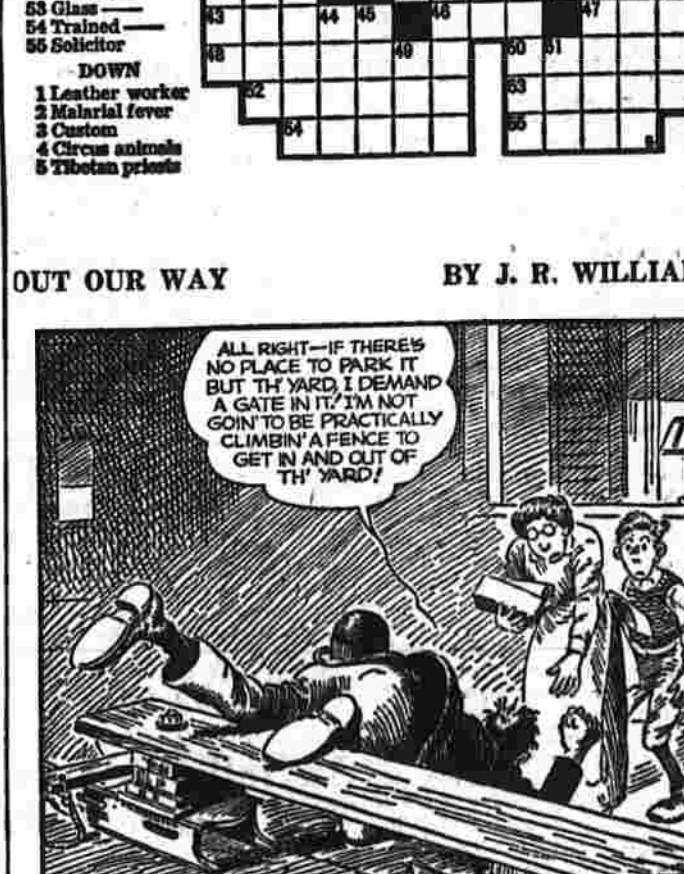
