But some increase there should be. And then starts the real family discussion: "How shall we spend that pay raise?"

#### The Freedom Not Taken

Abraham Lincoln would consider the racists of today even more pitiable and degraded in their living than the Negroes before Emancipation. And Abraham Lincoln, in his attitude toward Emancipation, had a double-

barreled objective. One was to give freedom, from the obvious chains of the forms and the legalities of the institution of slavery, to the people who were being held as slaves. This was his solicitude for the direct

victims of the institution of slavery. His second solicitude was for all those Americans who rather automatically considered themselves "free," but who were, in Lincoln's wisdom, themselves captive to the ugliness and the degradation of basing their own living on the subjugation, the mastery, of other hu-

In Lincoln's book, the masters, too, were tragic victims of the barbarism of the system in which they lived. In his policy, then, Lincoln hoped to free both components of that system. "In giving freedom to the slave," he told his Congress, "we assure freedom

to the free."

In all the years since he said those words and performed the act they decribed, the gift has not yet been made perfect, and the assurance has not always been welcome to those for whom it was intended. As the news illustrates every day of our own lives, this nation has to keep educating itself to the understanding of what true freedom and equality must come to mean for all its

And, as the news illustrates every day of our own lives, there are still the many among us who insist on trying to keep themselves chained to that pretense of mastery, that tyranny of prejudice, that presumption of privilege and superiority which, to Lincoln, seemed almost as tragic as the more tangible

degradation of the slave. And they are still perhaps the most pitiable among us-those who, calling and fancying themselves to be free, and American, are still unable to strike the blemish and the poison out of their own living, and thus realize, at last, the Emancipation Abraham Lincoln intended for them too.

#### War Can Be Beautiful

Not only the good red-blooded people in Soviet Russia who believe in the practicability and possibility of war should be glad that Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky, the Soviet Defense Minister, has called in Russian cultural leaders and admonished them against letting too much concentration on the horror, futility, or treachery of war creep into their,

Believers everywhere in the necessity of an occasional war should also be heartened. In these times of trouble and doubt

for the institution of war, when a good many people everywhere have some instinct to question whether any more wars can really be afforded, it has been an invaluable rebuttal to be able to point to the full-blown, unimpaired survival of the military spirit inside Russia, and, pointing to that, find in it that absolute compulsion which requires other people to accept the practicability of war too.

For Russia to weaken and change, for Russia to go civilized and pacifist, such a development might undermine the future prospects of war everywhere. There will be good cheer, then, in

military circles in other nations, that Marshal Malinovsky has called in the Russian creative artists and warned them against producing anything which might, in some sickly and sophisticated way, or even in some supposedly humane way, take the glory and heroism

Some of the rules Marshal Malinovsk would apply to treatment of the subjeof war might be considered elsewhere.
"The artist," said the Marshal, "cannot confine himself to a position of abarmet about the lofty objectives of the

Deeds of heroism, the Marshal warned, must not be portrayed as if they just happened out of the blue, or out of the impulse of some undisciplined char-

Such an approach, the Marshal said, "falsely suggests that one need not be prepared inwardly and physically to perform such a deed, and thus minimizes the necessity for all the work we do to form the new man."

In summary, the Marshal warned the Russian writers and painters and film producers, even when they look on the seamy side of war they "must do so from a positive viewpoint and must understand that it is expected to strengthen, and not to weaken, our ideological posi-

And he warned the Russian people against the importation of writings by lacking in admiration for "genuine heroism." He wants them to read less of such books as "All Quiet On the Western Front," which committed the sin of making war seem unattractive even before dive bombers and nuclear bombs were invented.

If Soviet Russia should ever go soft and pacifist there would still remain, of course, Communist China, which has, as yet, shown very few signs of growing soft, civilized or pacifist. And, as another resource, even beyond China, there are certain jungle fastnesses in Africa. One doesn't have to worry, too soon, about the whole world turning against war. Still, Marshal Malinovsky is right: unless somebody calls people in and gives them a good stiff talking to who will ever know how far the thing is spread-

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Braillist, Perfectionist with Heart Town Studies

"Two-thirds heart and onethird perfectionist" is how Mrs.
Bernard Ellovich of West Hartford, braille instructor, describes the perfect braillist.
"She should also be willing to
give her time freely to benefit
others," the teacher added,
"without thought of personal
gain." gain."
Invented in 1852 by Louis Invented in 1852 by Louis Braille, a French teacher of the blind, braille is a system of swriting for the blind that uses chartoters made up of raised dots in a six-dot cell arranged in two vertical columns, and that has been adopted for writing various languages and for transcribing music, mathematics and scientific symbols.

A class in braille transcription is conducted each Thurstion is conducted each Thursday from noon to 2:30 p.m. at Temple Beth Sholom. It is sponsored by the Connecticut Branch of the National Women's League of the United Synagogue in America. Seven women are currently enrolled in the class.

Mrs. Eliovich is assisted by Mrs. Vernon E. Smith of 19 Penn Rd., Manchester, who has been certified by the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C. Also assisting in the program is Mrs. Donald W. Morrison, who is currently brailling a 50-page manuscript which is required by the Library of Congress for certification of a braillist. The main purpose of the class is to teach students to transcribe into braille text books for blind children now enrolled in regular classes with sighted children. Requests for adults wishing to have books transcribed are also taken carre of, if braillists are available.

f braillists are available. Classes started in Hartford, Bridgeport and New Haven in 1956, but the Manchester class is the only one currently being conducted. It was the first such conducted. It was the first such class to be held in Manchester and started Oct. 16, 1963, and will continue for about one year. "Because it takes a particular type of person to become a braillist, the mortality rate a high," Mrs. Smith said, adding that the Manchester class originally had about 20 members.

Students are taught to transcribe by hand, with a stylus, and with the aid of a braille template. A sheet of moderately stiff paper is placed on a wooden backing or braille slate, and the dots are pressed through the guide. The braillist must make the dots in exactly the right places or the letters will be incorrect. Because the opening in the template casts a shadow, classes are usually held in the daytime in atrong light. Specially placed lights can, be used to dissipate shadows for night classes.

ly. These are much faster than transcribing by hand, and rea-sonably simple to learn to oper-ate, but not, because of their cost, too many are available to he class at this time. The "one-third perfect qualification set forth by Mrs. Ellovich is literally true in a good braillist as there is no margin for error. A slight mis-take would change the true meaning of a word. Patience should also be stressed as they must be painstaking and conbecoming an adept braillist.

When the volunteer has transcribed the 50-page manuscript and become certified by the Library of Congress she is then qualified to accent requests




