Dwight Perry's Geometry

Sooner or later, students in Dwight P. Perry's geometry classes at Manchester High School—the news story of his prospective retirement—the other night estimated there had been some 4,000 students in those classes during his 34 years in Manchester teaching—sooner or later Dwight Perry's geometry classes would encounter the strange juxtaposition of Shakespeare and Pythagoras.

The passage that Mr. Perry would sometimes quote to his students came from "Midsummer Night's Dream" and it was sometimes a moment or two afterward, sometimes half a lifetime afterward, that the student might really glimpse for himself the Shakespearean with his talk of "the lunatic, the lover, and the poet," was also talking about the essence of something called geometry.

"The lunatic, the lover, and the poet," was the passage:

"Are of imagination all compact: 'One sees more devils than well woe can hold; 'That in the madman's brain, all his faculties are mad; 'The poet's eye, in a fine frenzy rolling, Doth glance from heaven to earth, from earth to heaven."

"And, as imagination bodies forth The forms of things unknown to the imagination; 'Turns them to shapes, and gives to airy nothing A local habitation and a name."

"That the essential spirit and processes of poetry and geometry were so much the same was something more than an interpretation of this quotation. It was a key to the way Mr. Perry himself lived in his subject, and succeeded in making it live, as well for more than any routine percentage of his students.

Low Points For Rusk, For Union

Secretary of State Dean Rusk and the International Longshoremen's Association both hit low points of public appeal and logic over the weekend. That can happen to anybody trying to straddle his own inconsistencies.

With the Secretary of State, his trouble was that he believes in selling wheat to Communist Russia but in not selling to Communist-affiliated Cuba. And his trouble further was that, in the diplomacy of the week just past, he and President Johnson had not been able to persuade our friends, the British, to cease their peaceful trade with Cuba.

So Secretary Rusk, out of his inconsistency and his apparent chagrin, came up with the suggestion that perhaps American consent would make it a point to discriminate against any foreign firms that insisted on doing business with Cuba. Such a suggestion betrayed a little amateurish anger that not everybody else succeeds in negotiating Cuba into the outrage, the insult, and the insult that it means to us, right in our own front yard. The British, whose hair-ours are sometimes a bit thick, simply can't get it through their heads that there is a big difference between trading with Russia and trading with Cuba.

The Longshoremen, bless their perspicacity, seem to understand what the British do not. They seem to take the position that, if we merely reverse the order of consideration, it is just as bad to send wheat to Russia as it would be to give to Cuba the equipment for raising the legal drinking age of 21.

Prosecuting The Prosecutor

Ever since the days of Senator McCarthy, his one-time star assistant, one Roy Cohn, has been known exactly the kind of career which might have been predicted by those who learned to dislike him while he was McCarthy's deputy prosecutor.

It has been a career written up more on the financial pages than on the political pages. But the story, as it has been written up, suggests that there hasn't been too much difference between the way the young man played stocks and options and the way he played politics.

In one particular phase of this career, the boy wonder has come into some conflict with the law. He is, in fact, under indictment for perjury for some of the things he said before a grand jury investigating the United Dry and Chemical Corp. stock swindle, and for conspiring to obstruct justice by, in his role as lawyer, attempting to prevent indictments against the characters in that swindle.

Cohn has been waging a furious battle, legal and otherwise, against the attorney who finds the legal machinery of the United States government operating against Roy Cohn. He has alleged that somebody in the federal attorney's office has been out to "get" him, and has quite a long list of names which might substantiate his claim.

And now, in his latest attempt to prove himself innocent, he has submitted to the federal court an exhibit purporting to be a confidential special Post Office Department report on the subject, and succeeded in making it live, as well for more than any routine percentage of his students.

PARTNERSHIP LANGUAGE NEEDED BY DEFENDERS. For Alfred Sheinwold, defendants must use partnership language to help them understand the nature of the deal and when to switch to a new suit. This information is conveyed by the nature of the card led or played.

West opens the seven of diamonds and East wins with the ace. East may consider continuing diamonds, but let's suppose he switches to a deuce of spades.

West wins with the queen of spades and wonders if it is safe to return a spade. Perhaps South has the ace of spades. If so, a spade return may cost a trick.

Now for a word of warning about partnership language. Don't rely on it unless you are confident that your partner knows it. Many experienced players will lead a nine when he should lead a deuce, to make sure that you both speak the same language.

Daily Question. Both partner and one spade, and the next player bids two clubs. You're Spades, K-Q-6-4; Hearts, 5-4-3; Diamonds, 7-6; Clubs, 10-9-8-7. Answer: Bid two spades. This will show your only cheap chance to show the fine spade support. A raise to three spades promises good trump support but just about nothing else.

State officials. It says in part, "For the purpose of evidence, the owner may enter any and all places in his country."

The law has gone unamended over the years largely because of legal precedent which held, in state courts at any rate, that evidence which is otherwise valid is admissible in court even if there is question about the legality of procedures under which it was obtained.

In the Darwin case, however, defense counsel John F. Shea is at the helm. He has brought before the court a new law, Public Act 652, which became effective Oct. 1. It provides for suppression of evidence illegally obtained. This is apparently the first use of this law in Connecticut state courts of that nature.

Special assistant state's attorney Etalo Gant argued at the hearing Thursday on the motion to suppress that Darwin in effect consented to the search in that he raised no objection to it.

Darwin testified that he did not object because he felt he was not in a position to do so. The judge ruled that there was no consent on Darwin's part.

Atty. Gant also argued that 652 concerning illegal search does not apply to the office of the coroner.

Darwin's trial is scheduled to start Feb. 25.

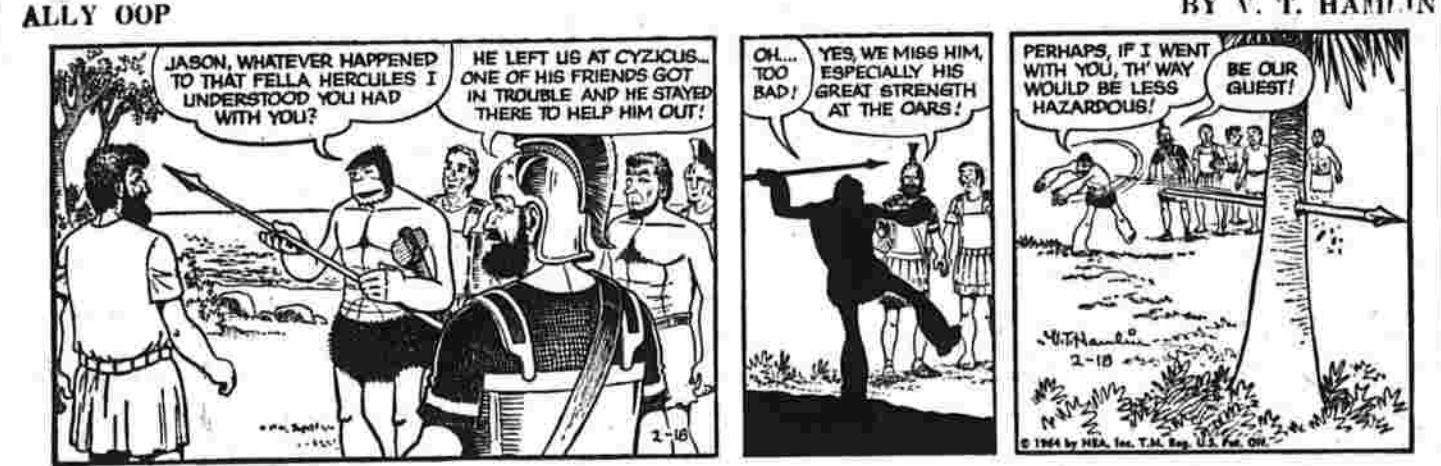

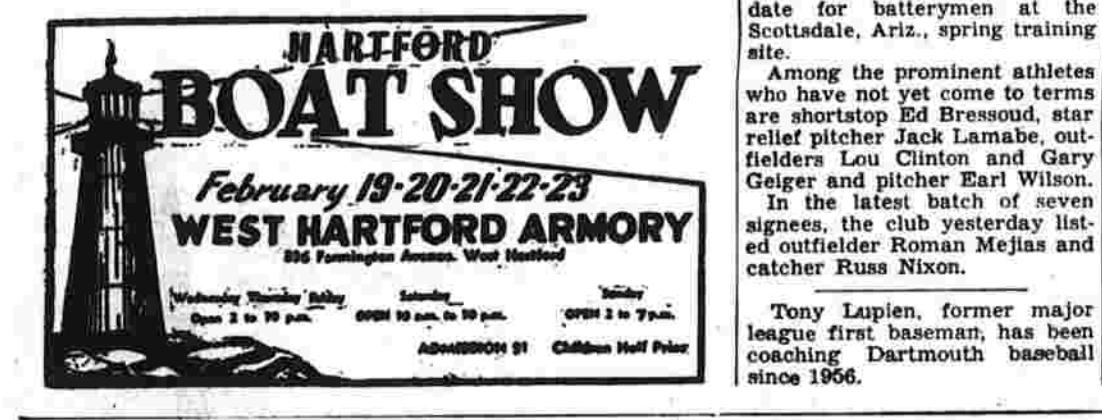
