A Famous Part of The Road

Governor William Scranton, that inweasingly impressive non - candidate from Pennsylvania, continues to build the kind of non-platform and that brand of non-seeking which may finally decree the end of his status as a non-

At the moment, some of the things he said on "Meet the Press" are lending comfort and cheer to Republicans of all except the more extreme stripes. When Governor Scranton was challenged to locate himself politically, for instance, he took his stand rather squarely but intangibly with such Republican heroes as Dwight Eisenhower

and Abraham Lincoln. "I have said." said Governor Scranton "that I think I am quite liberal on civil rights and quite conservative on fiscal olicy and moderate on most other hings. That is a great generalization, but that is as clear as I can make it." The specific performances Eisenhower and Lincoln gave, on the basis of similar generalizations, have a fair standing in

Governor Scranton had something to say which was a sort of generalized summing up of the history of his party, and perhaps, as well, some sort of phiosophical balm to Republicans who contemplate the alternating personality of their party with real uneasiness and anguish and, perhaps, something of a simple, straightforward mould which would confuse nobody, and perhaps, in the end, attract nobody.

What Governor Scranton had to say "May I say that when we lead, which

s when you are running for the presidency and when we are actually in power, I think the Republican Party has been very progressive, as with Lincoln and Eisenhower and Theodore Roose-

"It is only when we are in opposition that we have difficulty, I think, showing the kind of progressive party we are." There may be some who will object to such a philosophical comfort pad, placed over the open wound of ideological division the Republican party is usually ex-Nor is it any defense of what is mere-

by to describe it, calmly, as it is. But the Democratic party, to take a look at what is supposed to be the opposite side of our political spectrum, has a sort of matching division. It has a habit of being most liberal when it is not running for office and when it is not in power; when it is after the presidency and when it does hold the presidency, it is likely to be showing how conservative it can be.

The answer, or analysis, is simple. Each party rather habitually talks a certain brand of game, which often sounds as if it were far off-center in one direction or the other. But each party finds, when it really wants the votes of the people, and when it really has to make responsible decisions, that it gravitates toward the center,

What's wrong with the center? Nothing whatsoever when one considers all the successful politics, all the fruitful and lasting public accomplishment, that has been funneled down the middle road. The main discontent with middle road politics, middle road philosophy, middle road strategy, and middle road pace and quantity of accomplishment comes from those who suffer from some particularly high emotional approach, and who usually want everything accomplished in totality all at once down one or the other of the extreme fringes of the road.

It is strange how often these extreme fringes of the road turn out to be gutter, rolling up with language, strategy, igliness, principles, and ultimate accomment all also typical of the gutter.

This time, on Feb. 7, 1964, five of the 12 jurors took the broader view of what the conscience of Mississippl should be. So doing, they surprised everybody.

What everybody expected was that the vote on the jury would be unanimous for acquittal, no matter what the weight of the evidence, no matter how perfured some of the defense testimony

That would be the routine expectation, if it is always going to be yester-

But it is going to be tomorrow, some day, even in Mississippi.

What Isn't In A Name

North Branford held a town meeting the other night. It decided, 505 to 223, to take the name of John F. Kennedy High School off the new high school the town is building. Instead, it will be named North Branford High School, as it was going to be named in the first

At a special town meeting Dec. 2, on motion of a Republican state legislator, there was a vote, 56 to 55, in favor of giving the new high school the name of the recently martyred President. This was the action now rescinded.

This sequence of events, the closeness of the first vote, and the decisive character of the second vote ought to be evaluated as having almost nothing to do with the late President, or with the way the good people of North Branford evaluate him or want him to be remem-

There is a question of taste and proportion and propriety involved. A great majority of the early proposals for memorials to President Kennedy violated such standards. In the first few days of grief, everybody was naming everything after him. In most instances this was a valid demonstration of an emotional feeling. In some instances, it was somebody's way of seeking the easiest pub-

The people of North Branford had sense enough and courage enough to revoke the publicity-styled brand of memorial. So doing, they did not in the least diminish their real respect for the late President. That will be something and deeds, and will not discharge by a piece of nomenclature.

Dewey Didn't Decline

New York newspapers were urging former Governor Thomas E. Dewey to decline, with gracious thanks, the vote of the state legislature to name the New York Thruway the Gov. Thomas E. Dewey Thruway.

If Mr. Dewey himself would decline the honor, that would make it possible for Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller to veto the bill and thus save everybody a lot of trouble.

But Mr. Dewey never peeped a word that he didn't want this great honor nobody really wanted him to have. In the absence of any protest from Mr. Dewey, Governor Rockefeller, having waited to the very last day for legal action, signed the bill. He, for his part, did not choose to take away from Mr.

Dewey an honor the Legislature had voted for him. So he signed the bill, noting, in his memorandum for the occasion, that Governor Dewey's administration had been notable, not only for 'leadership and perseverance" about the Thruway, but also for "the enactment of the first state law barring discrimination in employment and the creation of the State University."

All of which made it sound as somebody, perhaps Dewey, or perhaps somebody who wanted to make a bid for his support, might be running for some kind

BOSTON (AP) — Bille It was the opening game be-eart became a baseball umpire tween the Boston Braves and the Cleveland Indians. The game was scoreless in the bottom of the eighth inning at only native American ever to coach a National Hockey League team.

He won the Stanley Cup his first year, but was fired the following year. That was the way lowing year. That was the way his sports career went in about 50-years-up and down.


