The truth is that neither of us dares disarm to the other, or to any mere agreement between ourselves.

Nor will that kind of day ever come. The only way either of us will ever se able to disarm will be to disarm not to each other, but to the United Nations, the organization under whose aus-pices we conduct our present 19 year d game of eluding agreement. And we will never be able to disarm
