





Education, Not Jobless Statistics

There is little question what was the main consideration in the mind of Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz when, the other day, he proposed that compulsory education be extended to the age of 18 and that free public education be provided two years beyond high school. He was thinking of some way to get about 2,000,000 people out of the national labor force, and thus cut down on our

memployment statistic. That is what some people have been thinking, too, when they have been campaigning against the "drop out" or in fafor of longer free education.

They have been thinking of at least one way of keeping people from looking Always, of course, there is a much

prettier subsequent thought. What they really have in mind, it develops, is not so much the business of reeping these young people out of jobs right now, but the business of educating and preparing them so that they can fill better jobs and earn higher salaries when they do get ready to go to work. But that is the afterthought. That is the pretense. The prime object is not to help people get better jobs for themselves, but to keep them out of the ranks of the jobseekers for as long as

And this is just about the cheapest, most cynical argument ever used in favor of education.

For all of that, it is an argument being used more and more freely these days. Ironically, also, it is an argument which comes straight up against two other theories about the educational process which are prominent in our time, and which at least have the decency and sincerity to address themselves the problem of education itself rather than to the problem of unemployment.

One of these somewhat contrary process arises among educators themselves and reflects their sense of professional futility in trying to give schooling to those who neither want it nor know how to assimilate it. They resent, such educators, having to spend their time and debase their curriculum in order to take care of everybody up to the age of 16. And rather than extend the computsory age to 18, the instinct of some of these educators would be to cut it to 14, in many individual cases.

The second opposite direction though comes from a number of people, both in and out of the educational field who are concerned with the quality of American education in relation to that of Europe, and who think we should head toward the European system of really advanced education only for those who have won the right to it and shown the capacity for it in the basic elemental years of their schooling.

Here again, the recommendation most likely to come from those who approach the educational problem from this angle would not be in favor of keeping more people in school longer, but in favor of debunking the very popular American idea that the mere expenditure of hours and years in a supposed posture of school attendance means very much. There should be some great priority in the educational process, such theorists are likely to claim, for the real education

of the truly educable. Not much of any of these theories, either way, is going to get into practice. We are going to continue to worship at the shrine of mass education, but we are not going to make it compulsory beyoud the age of 16. We are going to begin providing two years free education seyond high school for those who want it, and, at the same time, we are going to take increased pains to see, as Europs sees almost automatically, that those students of real talent have the doors of really high learning wide open

But let us at least try to keep all this an educational policy, first, last and all the time, designed to provide the finest and fullest and longest possible lucational opportunity to those who want and deserve it, but never, we hope, esigned to keep people in school purely ecause to let them out would make them another unemployment statistic.
