



The South Windsor Cooper-ative Kindergarten, now in its eleventh year, has an enrollment dieventh year, has an enrollment of 140 pupils, according to Mrs. Harry Richards, president.

The kindergarten was organised in 1953 by a group of mothers who felt public kindergartens would be many years coming to South Windsor. The first class enrolled 15 to 17 pupils and met at the Wapping Community House with Mrs. Paul Hull as instructor.

In 1956, the enrollment increased enough for two sessions and in 1959 there were 80 children enrolled. The highest enrollment was accomplished this year.

This year the kindergarten has six classes meeting at the Wapping Professional Center and one at the Wapping Community House. The faculty is trained in teaching and child development. trained in teaching and child development.

In 1961 the co-op incorporated a curriculum guide in its program. To facilitate closer unity within the kindergarten, frequent teachers meetings are held to discuss new ideas and teaching methods. The kindergarten has also been working in close cooperation with the elementary program of the South Windsor schools. Through the use of a child's newspaper and simple science charts showing weather and animal life studies, the children are acquainted with numbers and letters in a reading readiness letters in a reading readiness program. To enrich the pro-gram, field trips are also taken, This year the children have

To enrich the program, field trips are also taken, This year the children have visited the Lutz Junior Museum in Manchester, the Sadd Memorial Library in town when a town constable aided the children in crossing the road to the library, and the South Windsor Fire Department brought one of its trucks to the school during Fire Prevention Week.



ecessity Awaiting Volunteers The world, of its own sheer necessity or survival, continues to call upon the United Nations to perform duties beond its own automatic and unquestion-

We have to make it work like a world policeman, without ever seeing to it, as ret, that it has a police force for the ob, or money to pay the salaries of the colicemen it gets to put on the blue and vhite emblem for it.

We have to make it do the jobs of omething like a limited world government without writing the requisite powers and facilities into its charter. It is supposed to rescue the world, every time the world has to be rescued, but to do it without assured manpower

It has no power to recruit or commandoor or even own military force. It has no special tax all its own it can collect to give itself a budget independent of the whims of its individual members.

All this came down to concrete instance this week, as, with a Security Council vote on record directing the Secretary General to get about the business of restoring law and order on the island of Cyprus, Mr. Thant found himself acking two rather significant detailsmen to send to Cyprus, and money to

For days, while Secretary General ant has been waiting for men and for money, the situation on Cyprus itself has been like a terrible time bomb. While the United Nations arrival on he scene with its international force

and authority was delayed, other forces were not so laggard or hard to get. Greece and Turkey were moving men oward the possibility of conflict. Russian warships appeared on the prowl in the Eastern Mediterranean. British and United States fleet units were there to match and watch that Russian prowl. Around the Mediterranean rim, no one sould know what armies might be ready to start their tank motors and loose their second hand jets toward some pet

objectives of their own. Yesterday, somebody began to see to it that the United Nations began to have its chance of arriving on the scene too. The United States volunteered to pay \$2,000,000 of the cost of sending a UN police force to Cyprus. Britain offered of as much, and these two contributions are enough to get the project moving. Yesterday Canada offered to provide 1,000 men for the proposed police force, thus, by contribution and exam-ple, easing Mr. Thant's recruitment

Now, if things on Cyprus itself can se held still enough for a few more sours, there is a prospect that the United Nations can get there in time and that one more piece of necessary inter-tional improvisation has preserved, for the whole world, its chance of life.

Each improvisation builds custom and tradition and acceptance, so that next time, theoretically, the thing should beome a little easier. But can there be any real argument that the thing that must be done is to begin to make real and open progress toward putting this func-tioning of the United Nations on a formal legal basis, so that there need not be any period of doubt as to whether the world organization is going to have the manpower and the money to keep the peace where the vote of one of its gislative bodies has ordered it to keep

Francition Accomplished

It has to be admitted that an triang-eral city in which soldiers and police-men were stationed everywhers, with all private traffic forbidden the streets, may not have seemed a very joyous or carefree setting for the event.

But it will be a long time again be fore even the United States itself feels able to dispense with such cautions. And, in Caracas, Venesuels Wednesday, these precautions stood guard over the security of a kind of political miracle.

For the first time in the history of that country, a democratically elected presi-tent had filled his own term and handed was his office to a successor who was ad by due and demogratic legal

Because he had fought and pioneered for this chance of life for democracy i his country, this moment, the moment in which he himself was surrendering power to Raul Leoni, a successor about whom he had never been over-enthusiastic, was nevertheless the moment of greatest triumph of all in the turbulent career of Romulo Betancourt. There were many times when the odds

against this moment ever arriving must save seemed overwhelming. In Venezuela, politics can be turbulent enough, without outside meddling.

But Fidel Castro, who had once said he revered the kind of democratic revolution Betancourt had led for Venezuela, had decided that Betancourt's precarious democracy offered his own brand of revolution its easiest hemisphere target, and had accordingly been mixing in, trying to substitute bullets for ballots, manifesto for constitution, plot for legislation, assassination for legality. Nevertheless, an election was held, a victor was declared, and, on Wednesday,

a precarious old regime. That almost sounds more like an alarming than a reassuring prospect, but democracy has to learn to keep things in balance. It is a method of government which is never secure anywhere by much more than a few percentage points for much more than a few moments at a time.

Post mortems on the New Hampshire primary are themselves perhaps quite as dangerous and unreliable, in the face of potential future trends of behavior and reaction, as the advance estimates of that primary proved to be.

But, standing still in the moment after the New Hampshire results, the prime verdict regarding Senator Goldwater and his followers has to be that, having employed an argument which had a sudden death commitment in it, an argument which obligated them to score the first time they had the ball or lose the game, they did go into New Hampshire and lose. Only 23 per cent of the New Hampshire Republicans voting that day wanted Barry, after all. And this was after a rather intensive experience in getting to know him. At one time, before he had begun his actual campaigning, he was presumed, by foolish polisters and experta, to be the overwhelming favorite with the New Hampshire Republicans,

That, of course, he never was. For Governor Rockefeller the New Hampshire result was something different. He lost, in New Hampshire, not because of votes which went to Goldwater. but because of votes which went to Lodge and Nixon. If, in a pinch, these Lodge and Nixon votes had had to be redistributed so that they could go only to either Goldwater or Rockefeller, it would have been the New York Goverchance of picking them up, or at least

Furthermore, Rocketfeller posed as the underdog, and was rated the underdog, and was supposedly doing well if he merely scored something above any sweeping discrimination against him because of his private life. So Rockefeller, although he himself got only 20.6 per cent of the vote, escaped from New Hampshire in somewhat healthier position than Goldwater, even though Goldwater ran slightly ahead of him. For what kind of life, what real goal, does Rockefeller possess his partial es-

Quite a while ago there was at least one national interpretation of Rockefeller's purpose and commitment which said that, recognizing that he had abandoned his own front running position by his divorce and remarriage and thus opened the door to Goldwater, he had pledged his fortune and his honor to stay in the omination race at least to the point where he had made sure that Goldwater was not to become the party nominee. y this theory, Rockefeller was not in the race really thinking to get the nomination for himself, but merely to make sure that no personal life decision of his own should have the result of handing Goldwater an uncontested nomination. We don't know whether to believe this Arthurian, perhaps Quixotic legend

or not. It is a rather nice legend to have going about, since it makes one look noble even when losing, and since, if any new opportunity or vitality for an effort really to win should appear, it could then be gracefully shuffled off in favor of some "higher" mission. At any rate, Rockefeller can go on from New Hampshire in a somewhat healthier state than Goldwater can, and if his continuance is really gauged to the task of fighting Goldwater into a stalemate neither can win or break, his chances of that much success can be judged to be reasonable.
