But what was once upon a time is no longer so, because general war is impossible. In a matter of moments you can wipe out from 50 to 100 million of our adversaries or they can, in the same amount of time, wipe out 50 or 100 million of our people, taking half of our land, half f our population in a matter of an hour.

"So general war is impossible, and some alternatives are essential. "The people of the world, I think, pre-

fer reasoned agreement to ready attack. . . .

"In this nuclear world-in this world of 100 new nations-we must offer the outstretched arm that tries to help instead of an arm-length sword that helps to kill.

"In every trouble spot in the world this hope for reasoned agreement instead of rash retallation can bear truit. . . .

"We, the most powerful nation in the world, can afford to be patient. . . . Let's be reminded that power brings obligations. . . .

"The people of this country and th world expect more from their leaders than just a show of brute force. And so our hope and our purpose is to employ reasoned agreement instead of ready aggression, to preserve our honor without a world in ruins, to substitute if we can understanding for retaliation.

"My most fervent prayer is to be a President who can make it possible for every boy in this land to grow to manhood by loving his country-instead of dying for it."

So there was President Johnson talking up, at last, on the level of the nuclear age.

And as if the Stevenson and Johnson oratory weren't enough for one week, there, the next day, was Senator Fulbright taking his look at the world and, holding less responsibility than either the Ambassador or the President, proving more daring and controversial than either. Fulbright will take another day.

Buchwald's Disease

As has been observed almost from the beginning of language, there are times when jest speaks truth. And Herald Tribune Columnist Art Buchwald hit on such a jest the other day when he pretended he had knowledge of a top secret medical report in the files of the Surgeon General at Washington, to the effect that prejudice is a killer.

Buchwald had a typically gay time citing alleged statistics showing that prejudiced people die earlier and more often than those without prejudice, showing that prejudice causes cancer. heart disease, and liver trouble as well as raising hob with the nervous system. He went on to quote alleged medical opinion that people who have three prejudices about race, color or eligion in a day are far more affected than people who hold themselves down to one a day, and he quoted a physician expert on the problem who counseled at least an effort toward moderation, even if one feels incapable of giving up prejudice altogether.

We doubt that any such fast and firm statistics exist anywhere.

We doubt that even the unprejudiced members of the present generation will live long enough to see the Buchwald theory sustained by what can be considered valid medical evidence.

But his jest contains a hunch which will get a nod from many a practitioner who has observed what kind of living and thinking and feeling wears and weakens the mortal structure most

Then, on the other hand, there is the ccasional human being who seems to be sustained and held out of the grave by the sheer will power of some good strong hate.

The Highway Scandal



HARRISBURG, Pa.-At one point last week when Gov. Wil-Ham Scranton feared he was losing his fight to reform Pennsylvania's unemployment com-pensation laws, he turned to one of his closest political advisors and said:

"Well, once this bill is defeated, you and everybody else can forget this nonsense about run-ning me for President."

As it turned out, the legisl ture approved the bill last Friday night (March 20) - a re-markable victory over solid opposition from the Democrats and organized labor. But Seras ton was guite correct in recog nising the intimate relationship between the bill's fate and h Presidential possibilities.

From a negative standpoint, the defeat of Scranton's most audacious legislative proposal would have duiled his growing national reputation as a winner (which is precisely why many reluctant Republican legislators backed the politically dangerous

More important is the positive impact on Scranton himself. Now that his most important item of unfinished state busi-ness is disposed of, he may soften his denials of any inter-est in the Preisdency. Some of his sides even hope he will per-mention to the set of sonally take command and bring some order to the bucket shop Scranton-for-President op eration which has grown up h hind his back in the state capi-

Despite periodic admonitions from the Governor to stick to the business of running th Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Scranton's aides are the har-ried proprietors of the Prasiden-tial bucket shop. They keep in touch with Republican politicians from coast to coast, in cluding recent unpublicized con tacts with two famous old pro from New York, Thomas I Dewey and Herbert Brownell. At the grass roots, Scranton-for-President clubs have popped up in a dozen states from Cali-

formin to Connecticut. Richard Peet, a seasoned party worker who was a Nixon field man in 1960, now is trying to establi a Washington-based clearing house for these state groups. He tentatively plans a national grass roots meeting in Wash-ington April 4. But this is not enough, Even

if Scranton doesn't assume personal command, at least his tacit nod of approval is needed urgently - and desperately. Many big name Republicans simply will not crawl out upo a Soranton limb without as surance that the Hmb won't b sawed off.

Then there is the lack of a high command. A Republican politician who telephones Har-risburg these days can talk to any one of four top Scranto aides and hear any one of fou different brands of strategy. Moreover, there are waryin degrees of nervousness amon Scranton's assistants as th convention nears.
