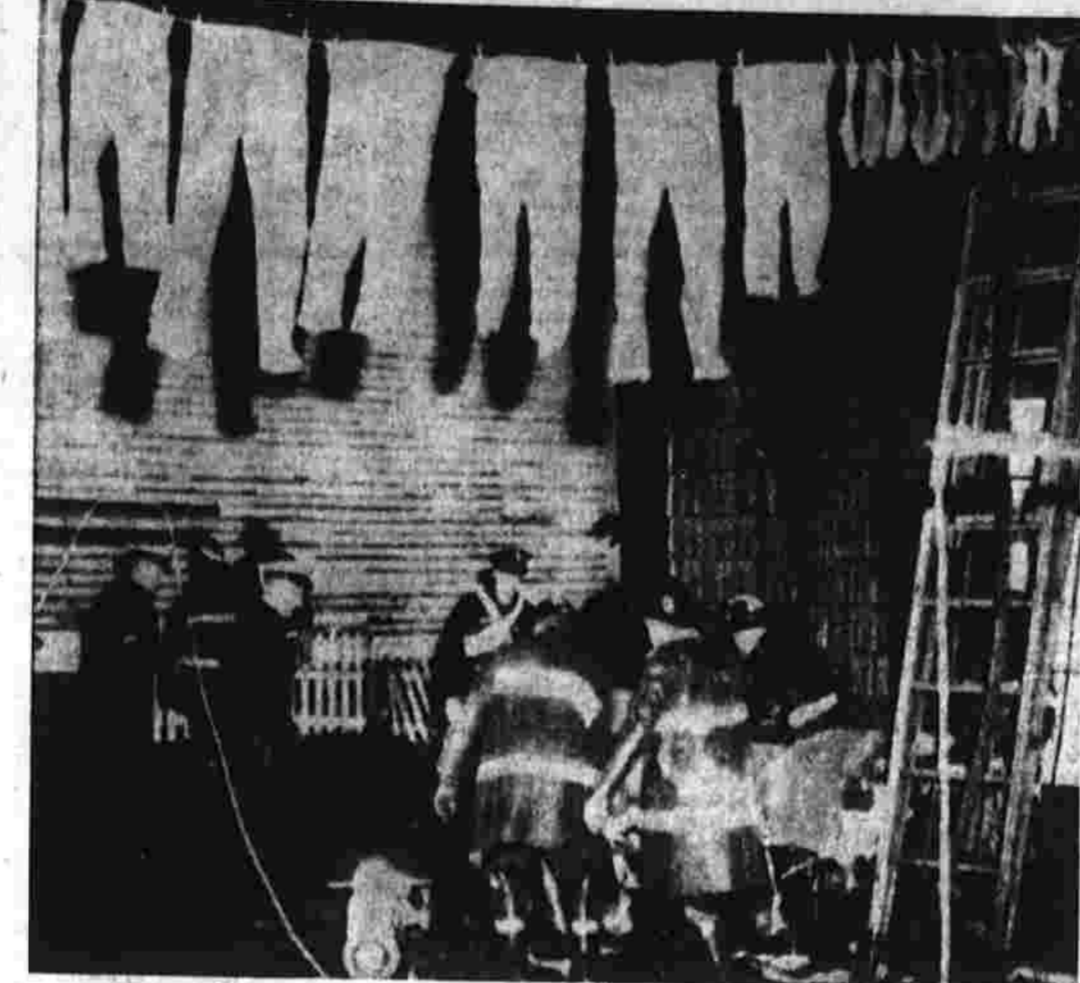

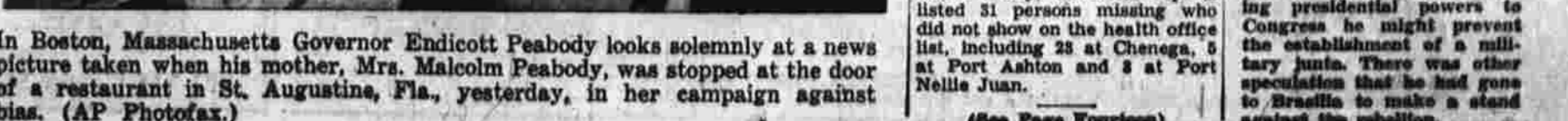

Rebellion in Brazil Gathers Strength

(Continued from Page One)

The government announced it was sending loyal forces out of Rio to meet the rebel column. The government-controlled national radio network kept up a continual broadcast saying Goulart still held control of the armed forces throughout the country except in the state of Minas Gerais, where Juscelino Kubitschek and his cabinet are located. It was in those cities that the uprising began Tuesday.

The Goulart government asserted it controlled the 1st Army based in Rio, the 3rd Army at Porto Alegre and the 4th Army at Recife.

The force heading south to meet Kruel's rebels was led by Gen. Rizzato Sacramento. The latest area to join the revolt, a rebel spokesman said, was the 8th Military Region which includes all the state of Parana southwest of Rio.

Sao Paulo, with 13 million population, is the country's largest city. It is the second largest, with about 7 million. The three states constitute more than one-third of the nation's population.

In Belo Horizonte, capital of Minas Gerais, radio broadcasts announced that Vice-Governor Clóvis Salgado had called for men to go to the front to volunteer for service against Goulart.

Gov. Magalhães Pinto of Minas Gerais in a broadcast declared: "We will finish only with a victory of democracy."

An anti-Goulart government took over civil functions Tuesday in Minas Gerais.

A correspondent at Sao Paulo said post office and national telegraph headquarters there were taken over by state government officials this morning.

The chief leader of the revolt, Gen. Goulart, was reported to have fled to Rio de Janeiro. He was seen by a reporter at the presidential palace in Rio, surrounded by loyal military tanks.

A coup political force, Gov. Carlos Lacerda of Guanabara, state which includes Rio—remained in the government. Lacerda, surrounded by his civil militia, with his cabinet members, issued a general call for support of his government and urged his military and police forces to remain loyal to the government.

Gen. Humberto Castello Branco, chief of the army general staff, also remained in the government. He was reported to have signed a proclamation announcing their switch declared that Goulart "placed himself in an open illegality through successive attempts against the just practice of the democratic regime."

Rio's transport and many other commercial operations were paralyzed by a general strike, as members of the Communist-dominated General Confederation of Workers walked out in support of Goulart.

As the general strike tightened in Rio, backed up by commercial airline employees who quit work, streets were cleared of all buses.

Thousands of motorists tried to get by, but were stopped. Some food stores were cleaned out of supplies. There were long lines in front of stores.

Government trains operating out of Rio were stopped and alternate buses were halted.

The 1st Army headquarters at Aviators Union went on a commercial aviation to urge pilots, navigators and other commercial aviation employees to stay off the job today.

International wireless companies continued operating.

The Merchant Marine Union, dock workers and other maritime workers joined the strike in Rio. A spokesman for the union said all merchant ships had been placed at Goulart's disposal.

The newspaper Correo de Maná said War Minister Jair Dantas Ribeiro, convalescing from a kidney operation, suffered a hemorrhage during the night and was in a critical condition. Earlier he had issued a bedside communique saying he was returning to his post in support of Goulart.

In a statement to the nation, Goulart called for the most vehement repudiation of those who seek to install disorder and social regression in the country.

In an attempt to avert bloodshed, the rebel "Liberty" station broadcast an offer by the rebel leaders to "talk to the other side."

"There will be neither victory nor vanquished," the broadcast said.

Goulart's government announced a three-day nationwide school holiday.

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP)—The Westchester Rockland group newspaper, nine New York daily papers and one weekly with a combined circulation of some 200,000, were sold today to the Gannett newspaper group.

Valentine E. Macy Jr., president, and J. Noel Macy, chairman, of Westchester County Publishers, Inc., and Paul Miller, president of Gannett Co. Inc., made the announcement.

Miller said no changes in staff or in basic employment policies were planned for the 11 papers.

George W. Helm Jr., who has been vice president of the Macgregor, will become vice president and general manager.

The amount of money involved in the sale was not disclosed.

Included in the Gannett group are 15 daily newspapers in New York, Connecticut, New Jersey and Illinois. Headquarters is in White Plains, N.Y.

Macy said his firm was purchasing the chain to "save the newspaper from the Red yoke."

Events School Science Planning Lacking, Says Speaker

Planning of school science curriculum is still being done "in bits and pieces" with no coordinated program for kindergarten through grade 12, thus leading to gaps and overlapping between the subject matter learned in the various grades, a speaker said.

This was the charge made yesterday by Ralph E. Kierulff, consultant on science education for the Connecticut State Department of Education, in a talk before a Manchester Teachers College audience.

It was the fourth and final curriculum meeting of the year for the town's school personnel, and held at Keeney St. School.

The answer to gaps in the students' knowledge from level to level—as well as the dual problem of overlapping through repetition of the same material—was the speaker's suggestion that a program be put together "a coordinated course from kindergarten through the senior high school," Kierulff said.

He acknowledged that it could only be carried out in a monumental task, but he urged that a group similar to the one he was addressing—"People yourselves working together must do the job," Kierulff said. But he charged that it cannot be done in the "one-and-a-half hour" meetings provided in the school curriculum committee meetings.

Mass meetings earlier in the year were held for mathematics, social studies, and English teachers. Schools were on half-day sessions with students dismissed so teachers could attend the meetings.

Each curriculum group must submit a summary of its accomplishments during the year to the assistant superintendent of schools early next month.

Secondary teachers of subjects other than science and all teachers of special subjects had been invited to the various school year work and for a report to the board of education.
