The "Unthinkables" A Week Later

It has taken a few days for the inevitable and the very welcome debate on senator Fulbright's "unthinkables" to ret into full voice. But as of the moment, the debate is doing beautifully, with some interesting new counties being heard from

First in the field, of course, were two comments which were actually quite routine. There was Secretary of State Rusk, bearing the burden of official policy spokesmanship as Senator Fulbright had not. When baited by the sometimes moronic questioning of a Washington press conference, Secretary Rusk, naturally and necessarily enough had to give answers which moronic interpretation could twist into point-blank disagreement with Fulbright.

Second in the field was Congressman William Miller, who doubles in the role of Republican National Chairman. That kind of role, in either party, requires a ready capacity for the statement which ncludes its own moronity. Chairman Miller found, almost the very instant one of his writers could get to a typewriter, that Senator Fulbright was another Chamberlain, calling us all to get together under a new umbrella ef ap-

Here in these columns, we thought the prime welcome to the Fulbright speech might come from ordinary averhave been waiting a long long time for somebody who dared talk realities and common sense and sanity and say out loud what ordinary people had known and had been thinking all along. The only thing that had ever sustained the myths Senator Fulbright talked about, we guessed here, had been a sort of mutual pretense on the part of the politicians, the polltakers, the consensus staters, the supposed leaders of thought.

It has been rather a pleasant surprise, then, since the Fulbright speech, to find that it has fared not badly at all among quite a few editors and commentators who apparently aspire to some of the wisdom and maturity of the average American, even though, to date, it has been rather difficult to find a politician who dares call Fulbright's "unthinkables" thinkable.

Otherwise, however, the pattern of reaction has still been almost predictable. One can imagine the eagerness and joy with which Senator Goldwater even condescended to call in his speechwriters for this one. As so often happens with what speechwriters think is a wide open opportunity, they were a little dazzled and stunned by this one, and really didn't rise to it as magnificently as they might. We will bet on the Senator himself to do better, when he gets to slashing it in his own impromptu way.

The first thing the Goldwater speechwriters came up with, anyway, was some heavy-handed insistence that the "root assumptions of the Fulbright statement are the root assumptions of the administration's foreign policy" and the judgment that what Fulbright was really doing was to substitute for his alleged "myths" the "reality of a Munich." Yes, Barry will do better, as he warms to his

One of the things that will help him warm to his theme came about the same time he was delivering this speech out in San Francisco. Way over in Geneva, at the United

Nations Conference on Trade and Development, one Major Ernesto Che Guevara, who is Minister of Industry in Castro's cabinet down in Cubs, and who is often considered the Communist strong man of the Cuban regime, hovered near the Fulbright statement with the routine kiss of death,

He made haste to agree with his own interpretations of the Fulbright speech, which were that "Cuba is here to stay" and that the U.S. economic blockade of Cuba is causing "more trouble for the United States, fighting with its allies, than for us." Then, quite naturally, he took the tack opposite to that of Senator Goldwater. The Fulbright speech was not, of course, the administration policy. The administration policy, as repsented by the Rusk statements, was still wicked and still demanding the nonexistence of our Government" as a prior condition to any improvement in elations with Cuba.

Where, in such a tide of comment from various sources, does our supposed intelligence and superior judgment, that of the average American, continue to find its moorings?

Well, if he is as intelligent as we think he is, the average American is taking it all in stride. He knows Secretary Rusk, from his official position, can't think out loud the way Fulbright did. He knows the automatic reaction of the professional gladiators of the political ring has to be to slash at such a speech from the Republican side, and be afraid to touch it, from the Democratic side. He knows that Senator Goldwater, the leading myth-maker of our times, himself almost a living myth, would lash out from one extreme and that it also has to be par for the course for somebody from the other extreme, like a gentleman from Cuba, to pretend the Fulbright speech was at once more conciliatory and less responsible than it

An American who thinks for himself knows what other brands of thought are always on the market. And even as he reaches for one Fulbright speech, he knows it may be some time before he gets another.

Revolution We Like?

When you play for a country as immense as Brazil, you may be playing for a whole continent. That is why our State Department at Washington must be watching events in Brazil with an agonizing amount of

So far, the "good guya" seem to be winning, against the perhaps well-intentioned President Goulart who has been committing the sin of lending aid and comfort to the "villains."

The good guys are the military forces, joined with rightist and conservative politicians, and with some moderate and intellectual supporters of democracy too, and so far the good guys are proving themselves good guys not only by their movement against Goulart, but by their relatively restrained action in permitting at least a psuedo-legal parliamentary process of designating his successor to take place.

And what the good guys in Brazil are averting, if they keep on winning, is the possibility that Goulart, overwhelmed by the various kinds of chaos he himself has helped create and has in any case failed to resolve or conquer, might be about ready to reach for totalitarian formulas which would wind up making him the figurehead for some Communist-style dictatorship.

If what were going on in Brazil today were a revolution from the left, or a Communist-affiliated left, we would all be speculating as to how much of a role Havana or Moscow might be playing in

When a revolution comes from the right, as it once did in Guatemala, for instance, speculation heads toward the question of whether Washington had anything to do with it.

It seems fairly obvious, at the moment, that Washington is not in the least displeased about the way things seem to be going in Brazil. And, since what is happening there seems at least to have a chance of preserving the big country's slim hold on democratic habits and principles, at a moment when this hold seemed about to slip off entirely, there seems every good reason to share Washington's view and Washington's

The uneasiness which persists is unavoidable and logical. It's a rare revolution, any time in history, which succeeds in adhering to its own professed
