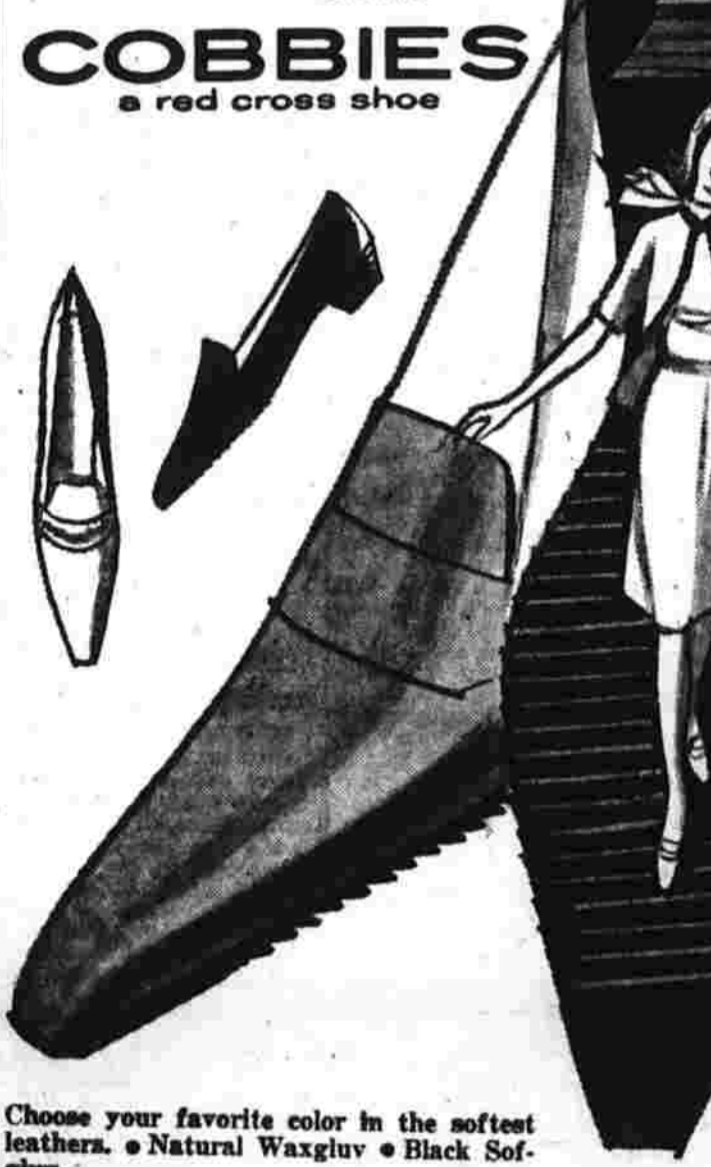

### Rockville-Vernon Burden of Sewerage Favored for District

The complexities of starting a rural sewer project in Vernon's fire district were discussed last night at town city officials who agreed to let the fire district assume responsibility for the sewer project.

Atty. Robert King, town engineer, suggested the district could operate the system, and the town could reimburse the district for sewerage expenses to schools.

Mrs. Pease said, "My firm recommendation is to let the fire district handle it."

While all agreed that the district should assume the responsibility of the sewer project, the fire district commissioners do not have the authority to do so. They will ask district voters to extend that power at a special district meeting Tuesday, April 20.

Question of Payment

The question of how payment for the sewer system would be paid was discussed by officials.

The cost of bringing sewage to the junior high school would be borne by the town. However, Atty. King asked about the possibility of including costs of sewer lines in the budget of the school building committee. This would enable the town to be reimbursed on a per capita basis.

A brief discussion on methods of financing a sewer system was held, but since no estimates of cost are available, a Richard Lombardi, a local engineer, said that in other towns everyone pays a share of the cost, since sewers benefit the population of the town. ### Andover Painting Given to Library Recalls Period of History

Some of the most important events in the colonial history of Connecticut are related to a small water color painting recently given to the Burnside-Bunker Hill Memorial Library and hung there a few days ago.

The painting shows the Parker Stearns house as it appeared in the 1770s. The house is located between Old State Rd. and Rt. 6 near the junction point of these two roads and was burned some years before the fire department was established; only the cellar hole remains.

In revolutionary days it was an inn, a half-way house between Norwich and Hartford for a change of coach horses. George Washington did stop there on his way to confer with "Brother Jonathan" (Trumbull), as Washington called him.

Trumbull was the only elected governor in all 13 colonies. The two confederated numerous times on strategy in the War Office on Lebanon Grove.

The painting was a gift of Mrs. Parker Stearns of Verona about 1920. The Stearns family gave a piece of wood and on and adjacent to Blackman's Brook on Old State Rd. and Lake Rd., a number of years ago.

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### Stop Reading Word by Word Pre-Reading Gives Sense of Direction

Time your reading of this column and compare your speed with that indicated at the end. The expected speed assumes a daily five per cent improvement.

Pre-reading will be the best time-saver in reading you'll ever learn. And it is impossible to compute how much more understanding you'll get from your reading using this technique. You've done a little pre-reading in the columns on concentration, but now we'll go into it fully.

When and when not to pre-read is the first thing to learn. When you read for style appreciation (Dickens, Frost, Shakespeare) forget pre-reading. When you read for information or opinions, pre-read. Here is how it's done.

Take your book in the subject you least like. Let's make it European history this time. Turn to the title page. The title and subtitle should tell you the subject of the book. Most books will have something like this: NINETEENTH-CENTURY EUROPE. That's some help, not much. The subtitle tells you more: CHIEF MILITARY ALLIANCES. Now look under the author's name for his credentials. This may tell you whether he is a real specialist and perhaps whether he has an axe to grind.

Now read the table of contents. You'll learn the steps to be taken to where you're going and the relation of one step to another. You'll learn what emphasis will be placed, and you'll want to know why. One of the steps may be to read some personal like or dislike or something you've always been curious about. This will involve your interest. Know the table of contents and you know the outline of the book.

Now turn to the preface. You may never have read one before. It's what the author writes last. The preface tells you where the author is taking you in his book and will clear up many questions unanswered in the opening two paragraphs. Generally the opening two paragraphs and the closing two will fill the bill.

So far, you know where you are going, the steps to get there, who's taking you. If this little pre-reading has raised as many questions as answers, splendid! Now you'll look for answers. Turn to the first chapter. Read the title and whatever else precedes the main body of type. Now read the first two paragraphs. The opening paragraphs give you an idea where you are going; the divisions are the steps along the way and the

concluding paragraphs sum up this trip. Now do the same with each chapter. If the text has an index, take a quick look through it. A name may strike a familiar chord. Look it up and see where it fits into the pattern. If it's a personality, see how the author treats him. You'll get further involved with the author's plan.

Get into the habit of pre-reading what we call practical prose as opposed to fiction, poetry, drama. It gives you a very N. Y.

acute sense of direction for your thorough reading. You should have completed this reading in 25 seconds. NEXT: No Questions, No Answers.

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### Motto Chosen By Day Camp

"Service is the price you pay for space upon this earth." This motto has been chosen by the Mayor's Day Camp Committee to hang below the Kennedy Day Camp sign at Globe Hollow, this summer.

The committee met last night in the Municipal Building and formulated plans for its camp for retarded children, to be operated with the cooperation of the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation.

The camp will be conducted on a cleared site at Globe Hollow, on a rise, south of the picnic area, and east of the pond. It will be operated from June 29 to Aug. 7, in two 3-week sessions, or three 2-week sessions, depending upon the amount of available supplies, and upon the interest engendered.

The committee plans to have about 40 children at each session, from age 6 up, with no maximum age limit.

The staff will consist of Director Harry F. Smith, long active in this type of work, plus three paid counselors.

There will also be volunteer counselors, age 18 and up, on what is hoped to be a 1 to 1 ratio, one volunteer for each camper. The volunteers will be chosen from students at Manchester High School, East Catholic High School, and Cheney Tech.

Smith said that the call for campers, paid counselors and volunteer workers will not be made until all application forms have been printed. He estimated that an announcement should be forthcoming before the end of the month.

Applications from retarded children will be accepted from Manchester residents first, then from area residents, and finally, from more distant ones.

The camp hours will be from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. five days a week, and will be held rain or shine. The facilities of the East Side Rec will be used on rainy days.

A 15-hour required training session for counselors and volunteers will be conducted at Mansfield State Training School, courtesy of Superintendent Francis Kelly.

The day camp will be entirely free. The children will be required to bring lunches each day, but milk will be supplied by the camp.

Local children will be transported to and from the camp by bus, from designated pickup points about town. Out-of-town children will have to be brought in by their parents. Smith said that he may ask for volunteer adults, to ride the bus with the children.

In addition to many recreational and camping activities, the campers will have regular swimming sessions at Globe Hollow Pool, during designated hours.

Smith named a list of the necessary equipment needed at the camp site, including a 48 by 20 foot shelter, open on three sides; electricity, telephone, refrigeration, water, toilet facilities, a first-aid station, picnic benches, recreation supplies, flagpoles and flags, and cooking utensils.

Several local contractors have offered to supply labor and bulldozers for clearing the camp site, and offers of recreational equipment have been received from many interested townspeople.

Smith said that he welcomes all such offers, since they will help to defray the cost of the camp's operation.

The Kennedy Foundation has granted the town \$3,000, a sum that must be matched locally, by funds, camp site, labor or equipment.

The advisory committee for the Kennedy Day Camp consists of Mayor Francis J. Mahoney, General Manager Richard Martin, Smith, James F. Herdic, superintendent of recreation; Horace F. Murphy, superintendent of parks; William H. Curtis, superintendent of schools; Kenneth L. Weibust, president of the Manchester Association for Retarded Children; and Robert L. Brock, executive vice president of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce.

### Spring Vote Likely On Charter Changes

Mayor Francis J. Mahoney revealed last night that he has bowed to the urgings of the other five Democrats on the board of directors, and that he will recommend a spring referendum of the multitudinous proposed charter revisions.

The board, when it meets next Tuesday, will be asked to set a referendum date on the questions, and is expected to vote to place them on the voting machines along with the question of Robertson School additions, and possibly North End Renewal.

Mahoney has said on several occasions that he prefers a referendum in October or November, to insure a greater turnout of voters, but has now decided not to buck his own party.

Passage of the charter revisions at a special spring referendum will require a majority vote equal to at least 15 per cent of the town's registered voters, which means that at least 3,263 of the town's 21,751 electors will have to vote "yes."

A referendum in October or November would require only a majority vote of those voting to insure passage.

Before setting the referendum date, the board will vote on acceptance or rejection of the more than 30 proposed charter changes.

Since all of the March 25th recommendations of the Charter Revision Commission have already been approved or suggested by the board at its March 2 meeting, passage appears to be only a formality.

However, it is anticipated that the Republican minority of three will make one last effort

### Columbia 'Seven Year Plan' Okayed For Future School Needs

The Board of Education has unanimously approved a detailed outline of the seven year plan for the town's schools. The plan will be included in a discussion of school building problems at the special town meeting tonight when Dr. George Sanborn presents the results of his recent survey. The projected plan of elementary school needs was presented by Myron Collette, superintendent of schools, and George Patros, Porter School principal. It includes the addition of a kindergarten within three years, a full time nurse, full time art and music supervisor, physical education teacher, foreign language instruction, social guidance director and the inclusion in the curriculum of homemaking and industrial arts. The plan recommends adding a library, an art and music room, multi-purpose room, laboratory for the homemaking and industrial art program and a special service room. Some of these proposals are not included in Dr. Sanborn's report. General needs, although not set in time were indicated, including enlarging the kitchen, science lab in the classrooms, compact administrative offices, better parking facilities and more playground area. Windham has offered to include Columbia's Grades 7 and 8 in a proposed junior high school, although this will not be until about 1967, but the local board took no action on the offer. The opening meeting will be at Yonkers Hall at 8 p.m. tonight.
