Generosity Will Be Controlled

With great disasters, the first instinct everywhere with everybody is to tear down the red tape, tear down precedent, and go straight and generous and direct to the business of helping the victims restore their property and their

And so it was with Alaska. For few days, everybody was for giving everything possible to anybody. The thing to do was to be fast, to be generous, to use our great wealth and resource to prove that we could turn this earth-shaking disaster into a bright and handsome renewal project.

Now the second, and the soberer con siderations, have begun to poke their inquisitive, bothersome little questions into the situation. What troubles and complications do

you run into if you begin really helping people, that is by making good to them for the damage and loss they suffered in the great natural catastrophe?

Have we done the same thing in other disasters? Actually, in most disasters, the usual limit on any official generosity from government sources consists of making it possible for individuals and interests who have suffered loss to borrow money

at long term low rates. This is a help, but it is not real generosity. The individual or the concern still pay the cost blameless. But suppose you do try to figure out some way to be really generous, and set up, instead of a system of loans, some

formula for outright grants to those who have suffered damage. How do you know they will use the money, when they get it, to rebuild and thus help rebuild Alaska? How, if you are giving away money, do you keep the sharpies from chiseling their way in and making off with some of the public generosity? Or think this over. If the good people of Alaska should be handed nice outright packages of money, no strings attached, or even with rebuilding strings attached, to help them set their own living up again better than it was be-

fore, how about all the victims of the Connecticut hurricane floods who had to borrow the money for their rebuilding, pay interest on it, and pay it back? These are just surface scratchings among the considerations which probably moved Senator Clinton Anderson, chairman of the new Federal Commission on Alaska, to declare, after the very first White House conference on the Alaskan problem, that he doubted

Time And The Stars

Without trying either to ask or answer the question "What is time?" we should all be aware that something happened to it the other night. Tuesday night at 7 o'clock Eastern standard to be precise.

What happened to it amounted to onetenth of a second. That was the way clocks that really count were set back on that date. The clocks being set back were the clocks of the astronomers, and the very

finest and most reliable timekeepers ever made. But the time these perfect timekeepers keep is their own, not the earth's

The earth's time is, after all, the time it takes the earth itself to complete one Real time, then, is not on any clock, but something measured in accordance with the apparent passage of stars over-

head as the earth turns on its axis. And what has been happening, to make a change in the setting of the clocks necessary, is that the earth itself has been slowing down. It doesn't twirl past those stars overhead as swiftly as it used to. In fact, unless the clocks had been set back that tenth of a second Tuesday night, we wouldn't know where to look for a given star at a given time—not within a tenth of a

second, that is. This knowledge of an earth slowing down is not new. It has been slowing for almost 18 months now, and nobody knows why. That earthquake up in Alaska may have given it just enough of a shove impetus to speed it up so that, next adjustment, we may have to go forward two tenths of a second. Who

knows, since nobody knows? The main idea is not to let it go to our heads, either way, not to go either giddy or drowsy, and try to remember that, whatever time is and however it may be measured, one of the best things overhead. We find it more peaceful to indulge in the conceit that they are the ones who are moving.

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

Body of General MacArthur Reposes in New York Chapel

To Lie in State In U.S. Capitol

NEW YORK (AP)-Flags flew at half staff today as the body of General of the Army MacArthur reposed in a funeral chapel attired in a simple khaki tropical uniform without any of the medals and ribbons earned in his military lifetime.

At the general's coffin was an honor guard of all the military services. Twenty policemen stood outside while many men and women, on their way to work, paused briefly in front of the funeral home where they knew the body of the Old Soldier reposed.

It was part of the nation's homage to the 84-year-old warrior who died Sunday at 2:39 p.m. at Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington, D.C., after a gallant struggle to survive three operations.

At the chapel today, only the family and close associates could view the body. The casket, the upper portion open half-way, rested on a blackdraped catafalque. Tuesday, at the 7th Regiment
