His Best Formula

There is one principal reason why Governor Scranton's latest mixture of yes and no, with the no a little strengthened but the yes still present, will be regarded as no great change in his situation or in that of the Republican party. Holding to the position he has established, in which he repeatedly does not seek the nomination, remains his best formula for obtaining the nomination and the best formula for making the nomination worth more if he gets it.

If he were to become an active candidate, or if he were to seem more willing than he seems, he would be in the roughhouse stage of the pre-convention campaign without enjoying any particular position above it, and his chances in the convention itself would actually be less than they are right now. It may be his sincere conviction, but

it is also his top strategy, to turn a deaf ear to those of his would-be supporters who warn him that, if he doesn't move out into the open now, right now, he will lose what chance he has of gaining the nomination. That is the game within the game as

it has now been refined in our cynical age. You must thrust the nomination uside as many times as you can and as cefully as you can so that when it does come you are the boss, and others make the concessions.

Then you run for high office wearing no man's collar, and, providing the man gainst you isn't some Dwight Eisenhower, or a Franklin Delano Roosevelt, you run well precisely because the nomination did seek you out in spite of your reluctance, in spite of the lack of enthusiasm of the practical politicians As Arthur Krock analyzed it, "Scranton is no less likely to be drafted after today's statement than before." And to play to be drafted, in an "hon-

est and sincere" draft, is the only way for Governor Scranton to seek the Meanwhile, one more press conference,

in which he repeated his public stand without altering it, gave him one more spotlight opportunity to announce, with touching modesty, his "growing concern about the numbers of persons all over the country who have indicated in one way or another their support for me to become the Republican nominee." It gave him opportunity to refer, still modestly and regretfully, to the fact

that "support . . . has grown until now there are many persons spending time, effort and money in my behalf and there are others who say they wish to




