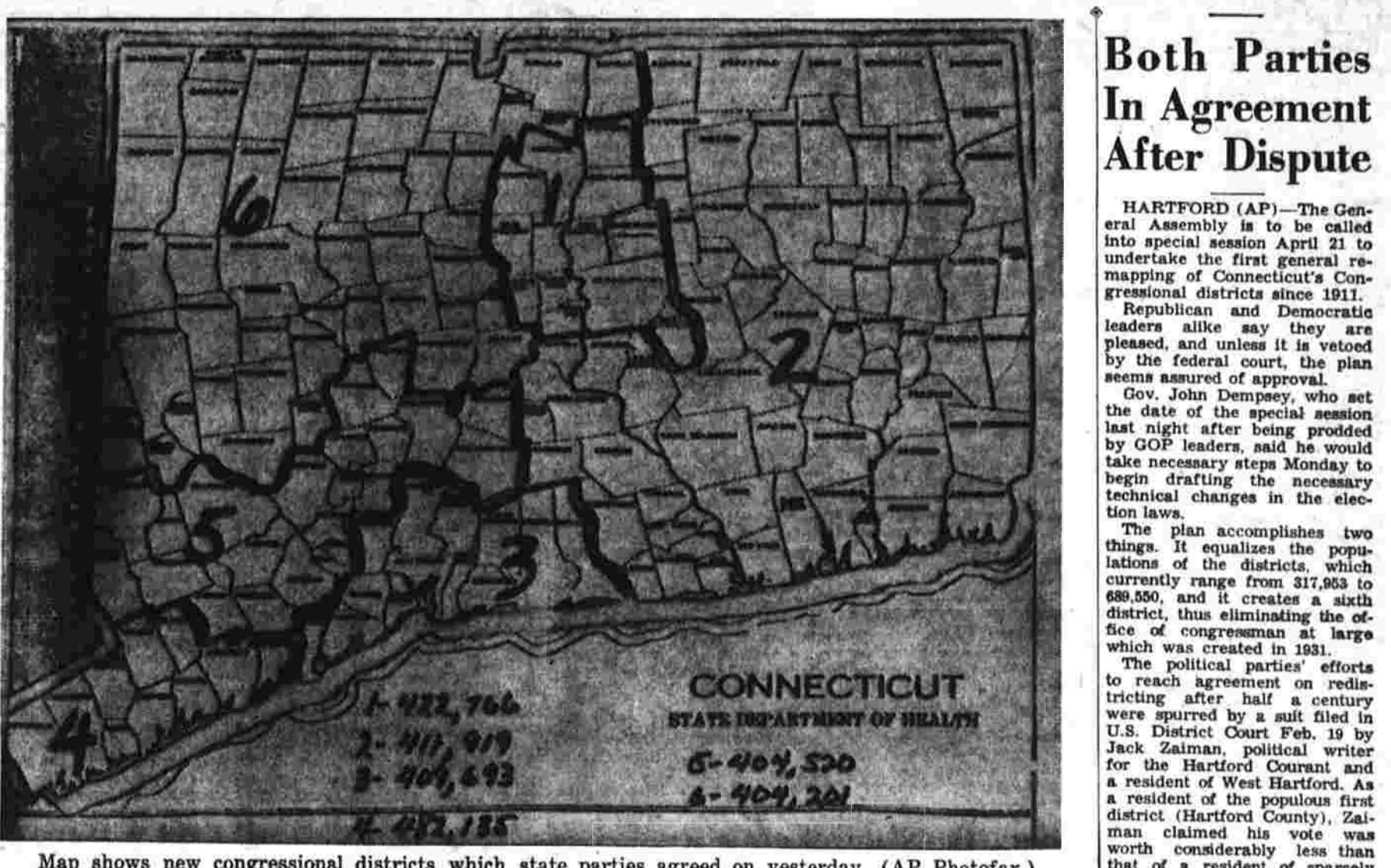

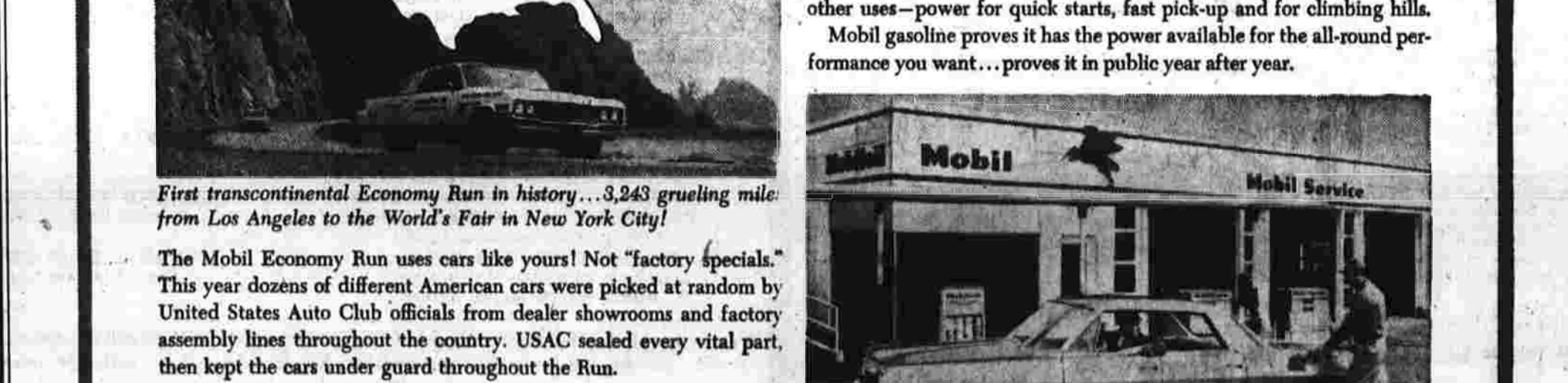

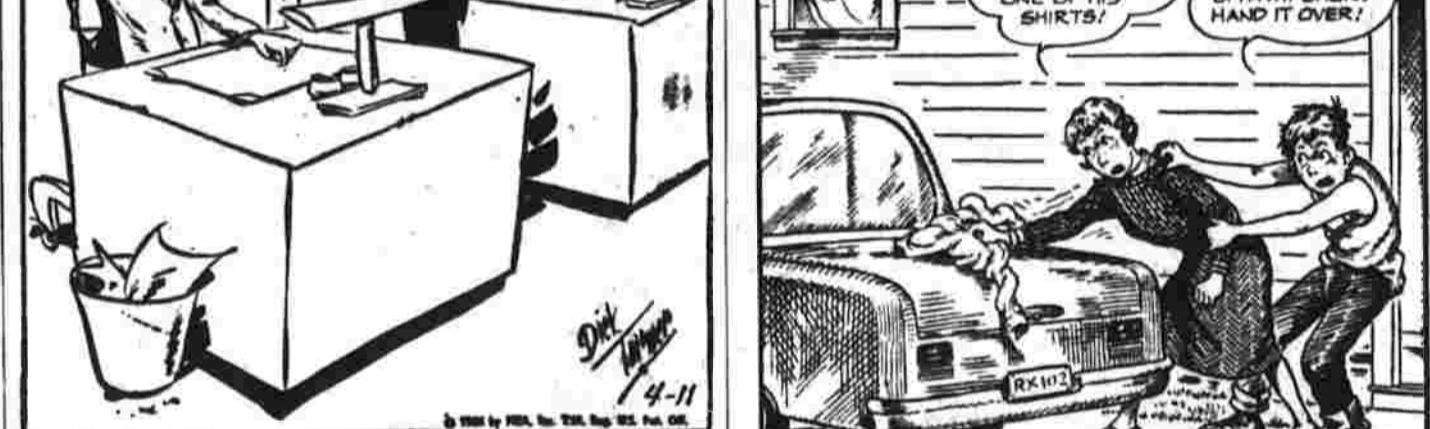

By DICK KLEINER NEW YORK (NEA) — The secret of success — get yourself kicked out of school, fall at everything you attempt, be awkward and then try acting. That is the road to the top which has been taken by Sarah Miles. She has become a big star in England and is on the way to that status here, on the wings of her chillingly sexy portrayal in "The Servant."



SARAH MILES I never thought about acting. Actually, I was never good at anything. Whatever I tried I failed. When I was 14, after all these schools, I thought perhaps I could be a ballet dancer. But I was awkward — my feet were mishaped or something. "The ballet school also had a drama school, so I tried that. Nobody else was any good, so I won the medals. And that's how I became an actress." Her lithe figure and saucy provocative face propelled her into sexy parts. Now she would like to drop them, at least for a time. "I don't want to be typecast," she says. "But I don't want to play a lady or an ingenue — that would be dracky." (She uses English slang, such as "dracky," which means "duller than dull," and words like "poofy" and "camp," which she won't define and could very easily be nasty.) TV Women Are Pretty But Dumb

By CYNTHIA LOWRY NEW YORK (AP) — "Women are being made to look like absolute idiots by television," said Betty Furness, "and I think it is a very serious situation." Miss Furness, who quit her position as TV's top saleswoman a few seasons back to return to other performing areas and now has a daily CBS radio network show, points sadly to the situation comedies and to the commercials.

"The situation comedies show wives who are constantly trying to outsmart their husbands — and of course, the big joke of 'Father Knows Best' was that he never did know what was best. "It's like a battle of the sexes, with nothing to gain for the women. I have never caught a television show in which a woman was trying to be darling to her husband except 'The Dick Van Dyke Show.' It is almost as if the people at the top of the pyramid had decided to degrade women and never to let them be seen as real people. "Miss Furness says that she is "deeply offended" by commercials showing attractive girls "who can't even keep their houses clean." "They constantly suggest that the American woman is totally incapable of doing the simplest household chores and they have them learning from men — repairmen and even delivery boys. Calvin has cleaned just about every sink in America and it is ridiculous. Imagine a grocery delivery boy teaching a middle-aged woman how to clean her kitchen floor." What network television really needs, she insists, are some intelligent programs dealing realistically with women, shows directed to women and dealing with what women are really doing — "moving out and meeting the needs of a world that demands so much of them." "That's an area to be filled — and I'd like a chance to do it," she confessed.

Cigarettes — The Conflict

In Third Season, 'Mr. Ed' Is One Bet That Paid Off

Probably the greatest bet ever placed on a horse is one that has never been recorded in turf archives, possibly for the reason that the site of this particular gamble was about as off-track as you can get.

The bettor was (still is) a Hollywood and television producer-director named Arthur Lubin who took a chance on a beautiful piece of horseflesh and came up with a winner that has paid off as a yearling, a two-year-old and a three-year-old, with the odds in favor of this going on ad infinitum.

Lubin placed his bet without venturing anywhere near a racetrack. For that matter, the horse on which he placed it hasn't ever been anywhere near a racetrack himself.

This equine phenomenon is the loquacious title character of the comedy series "Mister Ed," now rounding the turn in to the homestretch of its third season on CBS-TV on Sundays and beginning already to champ at the bit for the starting gun of the fourth race next September.

Lubin, the man behind the very vocal Mister Ed as producer and director, is naturally gratified by the success of the show and the vindication of his once-questioned judgment that Walter Brooks' series of magazine stories about a talking horse would make great televi-

sion comedy. But it's also put him in sort of a directorial bind with Hollywood film producers.

"Not long ago I was after a choice directing plum on a feature picture," Lubin says. "My agent followed through on it, only to come back and report failure. I asked him what reason had been given by the producer for my being turned down. 'Simple,' my agent quoted the producer. 'This picture has no animals in it.' That's the sort of thing I get all the time now."

Lubin's spotlighted connection with a garrulous palomino isn't the only thing that evokes this slightly goofball thinking. He's got two strikes against him with those movie men who remember that he was the director of four of the seven Universal pictures that starred Francis, the talking mule, between 1949 and 1954.

"I've directed 64 motion pictures in the 26 years I've worked in Hollywood, and 59 of them did not have animals in them, or at least only incidentally," Lubin declares. "And as for 'Mister Ed,' before that came into being I did episodes for such television series as '77 Sunset Strip,' 'Bonanza,' 'Maverick' and 'The Deputy.'"

"There may have been a lot of horses in those last three, but none of them was the star."

Viewer in Numbers Game When Hunting for a Show

NEW YORK (AP)—Commercial television is often accused of playing a "numbers game" when it comes to keeping or killing shows. It seems that a large segment of the viewing audience quietly plays a little numbers game of its own.

This is a game the major networks and the independent stations alike deplore. In spite of all the promotion designed to establish a station or network identity—the CBS eye, the NBC Peacock, the call letters flashed on the screens at every station break time—a large percentage of the audience persists in identifying a station merely by its channel number on the dial.

A television chain recently confirmed this through an au-

dience research project. Almost any viewer could have predicted the outcome of the study.

"This is distressing to the industry for several reasons. Individual stations and networks work hard to establish attractive images in the minds of viewers. One New York station always announces its call letters and adds "your community-minded station." Others are "station of the stars," "The news-minded station" and so on.

The networks are particularly eager to create vivid and pleasing identities. A viewer who isn't exactly sure where his favorite show can be seen is likely to sample shows on all working channels in his hunt for it. Sometimes he likes what he samples—and never reaches the program he set out to find.
