





Plans Drawn On Restoring Ford Theater

WARHINGTON (AP)—Ninety-nine years ago Tuesday, the curtain went down at Ford's Theatre with an awful finality. That was the night it became the most famous—or most in-famous—theater in America. building was never again used as a theater. It was stained for-

as a theater. It was stained forever that night with the blood
of President Abraham Lincoln,
assassinated while he sat in its
presidential box and watched
its last play.

But now, there is a strong
and possibly winning campaign
well under way, with considerable support in Congress, to restore the building to what it
was the night John Wilkes Booth
shot Lincoln.

There is no hope that it can There is no hope that it can be restored by the time of the centennial of the assassination, April 14, 1965. That had been a target date until a few years

target date until a few years ago.

But Col. Randle B. Truett, Mational Park Service historian, a dedicated and enthusiastic supporter of the restoration dream; says "We don't have the money—about \$2 million—but we will.

It's worth doing and worth doing right.

"We're ready to go, once Congress gives us the money. Plans have been drawn. We now have a most detailed historial report on the theatre.

"The restoration will be to a complete theater, not just the presidential box, but all the seats, in the orchestra, in the dress circles, everything. Even the box office."

There is some difference of opinion as to whether the building should be turned into an active playhouse, in view of the tragedy it symbolizes.

As Truett put it:

"We view it as a national memorial to Lincoln and as such, the use of it would call for a certain restraint."

A fantastically detailed and complete description of the theater has been put together in a book by Dr. George J. Olezewski, park service historian.

The site was originally occu-

Ian.

The site was originally occupied by a Baptist church built in 1833. Its physical properties—it could accommodate musical concerts as well as sermons—attracted John T. Ford, a theater man from Baltimore, when he came here in the fall of 1861 seeking a location for theatrical purposes.

Ford leased the building for five years, beginning Dec. 10, 1861.

Just before 1862 ended, a disastrous fire left only the blackened walls standing. A more elaborate building was built, called "Ford's New Theatre," on the same spot, and opened for business Aug. 27,

Soon, the government took over the building first by lease and then by purchase.

Tragedy came again in 1893 when a 40-foot section of the third floor front collapsed killing 22 Quartermaster Corps clerks and injuring 65 others. The building was never again used for much more than storage purposes. age purposes.





Again, The Theory Collapses

Once again, in Illinois as in New Hampshire, the basic premise of the campaign of those favoring Senator Barry Goldwater for the Republican nomination for President has suffered a

That basic premise has been, from the start, the argument that if only Republicans ever got a chance to vote for a 'real Republican," a "real choice" like Goldwater, they would find the opportunity irresistible. They would come out of the woodwork, and everybody would se astounded to see how many Republicans there really were. And even the insependents would prove unable to resist the appeal of a "really conservative"

In New Hampshire the Republican voters of the state proved completely ble to resist the Goldwater appeal. And in Illinois yesterday, they did the same. To the candidate they supposedly could not resist they gave a low total turnout, they gave a lower percentage of the vote than had seemed possible for him when he was running virtually unopposed. A surprising substantial numer of them chose to waste their votes on Senator Margaret Chase Smith rather han give them to Goldwater or not cast them at all. Another still untabulated total went to the trouble of writing in others, principally Henry Cabot Lodge, and also Richard Nixon, in spite of warnings their write-in votes might not even be counted.

If Goldwater supporters, in answer to such an assessment of the lack of enthusiasm for their man in Illinois yesin earnest, since the primary was rated nothing more than a popularity contest anyway, the answer lies in the other race which was going on in Illinois yesterday. This was the race for the gubernatorial nomination. It was a race which was serious and for keeps.

And it happened to be a race in which the Goldwater issue was involved, by name and by principle. State Treasurer William Scott, seeking the nomination pronounced himself to be a Goldwater man, and talked like one.

Charles H. Percy, the business executive who served as chairman of the Republican national platform committee in 1960, talked a little bit out of the right side of his mouth this time but still maintained his reputation as a Republican of the moderate middle.

This was the contest where the real fight was in Illinois yesterday. This was where the voting really counted. People voted in this one who did not bother to east presidential preference votes.

And at the last statistic available. Percy was taking the nomination by a margin somewhere between three to two and two to one.

If a majority of Republicans anywhere really believed that only a Republican of the conservative wing can possibly units and revive the party and lead it to an election victory, surely they would come out and say so. 

Dr. Huebner, in such connection, told the story of the laboratory detective work which found that even an antipolio vaccine, for a time, contained viruses that could produce cancer in laboratory animals, which found a virus used in a smallpox vaccine causing cancer in mice, and a vaccine once used against respiratory infections which was capable of producing malignant tumors in animals. Apparently, in this latter instance, laboratories still have to find out why one batch of the vaccine in question will contain the danger, but the next one from the same formula and the same materials be free of it.

Even while the physicians at Atlantic City were hearing how dangerous the ounterattacks of the viruses and the irus-vaccines can be, they were, just like students of any other warfare, being offered hope of a super weapon which might hold the promise of total

Dr. Igor Tamm of the Rockefeller Intitute brought the super weapon meswhich might go into battle against the viruses without the disruptive side effects which make vaccines so troubleome. And he even held out the hope that some of these new compounds might be able to take on as many as 10 riruses at a time, which would be a little like taking a machine gun for the first time into the jungle against poison

Despite such hopeful news, however, it can still be expected, to be on the safe, prepared side, that our troubles will not fail, and that, if they ever did, we would be bored to death. There's nothing like an unfinished detective story to produce sound sleep of nights, and this, in the age of the virus, is the greatest detective story of all time.
