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Rockville-Vernon State Hikes Portion Of Cost of Renewal

A \$38,770 increase in the state's share of the cost of the Rockville-Vernon renewal project was voted yesterday by the Connecticut Development Commission.

The increase brings the state's share of the financing to \$24,260, one eighth of the latest estimated total. The city also pays one eighth, and the remaining three quarters will come from a grant by the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government.

The city will eventually repay the state from whatever increase in revenue results from the renewal.

The increase voted yesterday results from a revision of the total cost estimate from \$1,063,771 to \$1,874,078.

In other developments yesterday, it was announced that the city has signed the preliminary agreement to purchase private property in the renewal area and taken steps toward acquiring the New Haven Railroad property.

Atty. Donald Caldwell, attorney for the Rockville-Vernon project, said that a formal request has been submitted by the railroad to Judge Robert Anderson of the U.S. District Court in New Haven for approval of the abandonment of railroad property within the redevelopment area in the heart of downtown Rockville.

The court's approval is required because the New Haven is in bankruptcy. There is no indication if the judge has acted on the request.

An option signed yesterday for the Bonan property in W. Main St. marked the first agreement between property owners and the agency for sale of private property slated for the renewal project.

The option indicates an agreement regarding price paid for the property. Prices will not be made public until all property is acquired by the agency, Agency Chairman Lester Baum indicated he expects several more options will be signed soon.

Until the railroad property is acquired, no acquisition of land is permitted under federal rules. The signing of options is the most the agency can do at this time.

Two representatives from the Cahin Engineering Co. of New Britain discussed the first stage of the redevelopment construction with members last night.

The firm won a bid calling for the covering of a portion of the Hocknam River which flows through the renewal area. Work on the project is expected to begin immediately, due in part to a recent agreement by the city council to guarantee costs in the event

Only The Flag Is Really Different

Over in Manila, the Council of Ministers of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization has disbanded after adopting a resolution which reads as follows: "The Council agreed that defeat of the Communist campaign is essential not only to the security of the Republic of Vietnam but to the security of Southeast Asia. It will assist in convincing proof that Communist expansion by such tactics will not be permitted."
The French foreign minister abstained from this declaration. The approval came from Australia, Britain, New Zealand, Pakistan, the Philippines, Thailand and the United States. It is actually participating in the armed conflict going on in South Vietnam.

While this declaration was being made on the diplomatic level over in Manila, military news from South Vietnam was making the objective the communist agreed upon apparently more and more difficult to achieve. The Communist guerrillas were intensifying their operations, adopting new and more threatening military tactics, including new guerrilla tactics. The Communist military success, and if one can trust the headlines, raising new doubt whether the campaign in Vietnam can be won without massive support from the United States has hitherto considered appropriate to what most of its own military experts habitually called the wrong place for any major direct military involvement on its part.

This military situation in South Vietnam seems to bring American policy to a point of decision quite similar to a point of decision which was reached once before in 1954. Then, as now, there was a war on in Southeast Asia, and then, as now, the United States faced the question of whether it wanted to try to make the all-out direct military effort which would amount to full United States waging of a war on the Asian mainland.

The decision then, by the Eisenhower administration, was not to try to make that kind of commitment.
That decision has to be made over again today.
There is one big difference between the two decisions.
In 1954, France was the sovereign power in the front lines facing Communism.
Today, France is out of Southeast Asia, militarily speaking, and we have taken France's place, still in limited fashion.
In 1954, we helped tell France it might as well get out and accept a solution of truce and neutralization.
Today, by President de Gaulle's open avowal, and by its diplomatic conduct at Manila, France is telling us essentially what we told France in 1954—that the solution in Southeast Asia has to be political, and cannot be obtained through any conclusive battlefield victory for anybody. France tells us to stay on in Vietnam and to resist the communist guerrillas, but not with the hope of knocking them out. France thinks the best we should try for, in the field, is to hold a stalemate which will persuade the Communists to accept neutralization solutions.

Just as there were elements in French leadership, and in the French army, which resented our advice in 1954, so there are elements in American policy-making circles which resent France's advice to us today. For this time, of course, it is our prestige and our vanity which happen to be involved, and it would be our flag which would be the one which would have to retire.
But perhaps a truly level-headed view of what American policy ought to be in South Vietnam would say that we are indeed compelled to try to stand firm, at least maintain a stalemate and that we should at the same time be privately grateful France is standing by with us. We are still not quite sure we could have heard people crying "jump" to anybody on a 12th story ledge without turning cold and curled inside. But we can admit now, after the amount of searching, some possibility that, if we had been there, we might have felt the impulse to shout the same thing, partly to save our own terror, partly because we might think it psychologically the smart thing to do.

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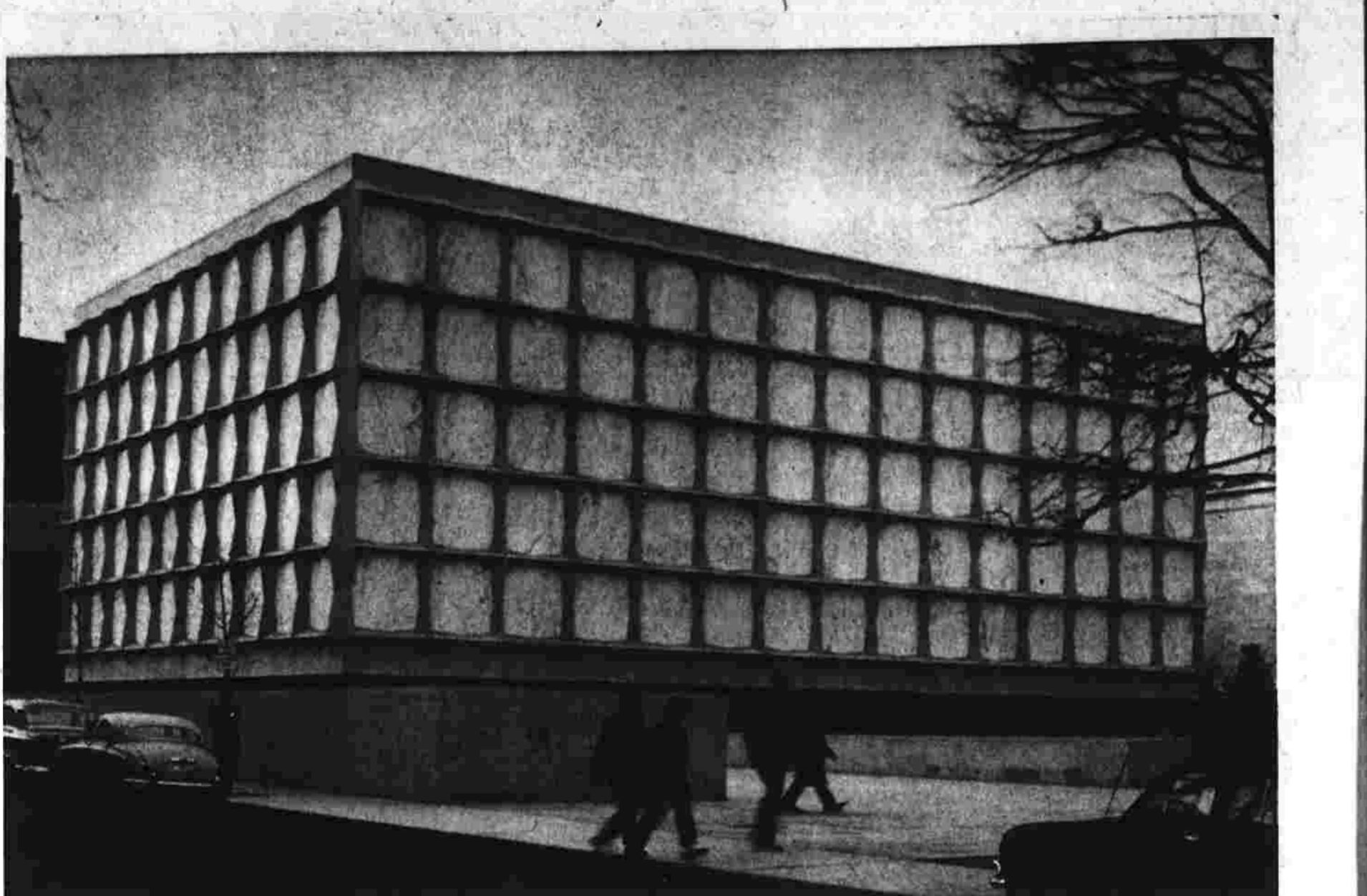

Union Official Answers Editorial
To the Editor,
Your editorial of April 10, 1964 entitled "Delaying Redirection," in which you explain the reasons for the recent threatened railroad strikes, contained certain misrepresentations of fact. I realize it is unreasonable to presume that a journalist would be an expert on such a complex problem just as it would be unreasonable to presume that a railroad union representative would be qualified in the field of journalism and therefore it has always been my policy to turn the other side of the coin when other newspapers have made similar attacks on railroad brotherhoods.
However, I feel a little differently in this particular instance. I am a resident of our fair city of Manchester and also I am privileged to be General Chairman of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and in this capacity I represent all the men on the New Haven Railroad. I am sure you will grant me the opportunity to set the record straight on this issue so I can withdraw the attack on my brotherhood without having to shrink in shame from the accusations of my friends and neighbors.

"That is the extent to which television is complicating matters for all media."

The committee noted that the New York County Lawyers' Association has declared that television makes new measures necessary to protect the rights of accused persons to a fair trial.

The lawyers said they were convinced that "any reliance on voluntary restraints by the television industry are largely doomed to failure."

Emphasis on television "is not to suggest that the newspapers of America are blameless," the editors report went on.

It said: "Indeed, the necessity to re-examine our own shortcomings and our own sense of responsibility becomes all the more urgent if we are to head off measures which—although aimed primarily at television—could affect us all and invite greater abuses in the administration of justice than those they supposedly are designed to correct."

Judge Frees Four Youths In Wrecking

RIVERHEAD, N.Y. (AP)—A judge has acquitted the last four youths being tried on charges lodged after a mansion-wrecking party for Fernanda Wassanaker Wednesday that the evidence was insufficient to sustain a criminal charge. He heard the cases without a jury.

Before the four acquittals, the charges against six youths had been dismissed for lack of evidence, three defendants were granted treatment as youthful offenders, and one was granted a separate trial.

Acquitted Wednesday were Samuel Shipley III, 23, Granville Township, 21, and Thomas Holmquist, 19, all of Philadelphia, and Eaton Brooks, 21, of Dartmouth, Conn.

After the acquittals, Shipley accused the authorities of "ruthlessness, incompetence and irresponsibility in pressing the charges."

Asst. Dist. Atty. Theodore R. Jaffe, asked to comment, called Shipley a "snotty kid."

Brooks said in a courthouse corridor that he was not ashamed of swinging from a chandelier that finally broke.

Governor Guest Speaker Chamber M Award Goes to Moriarty

Matthew M. Moriarty, Manchester automobile dealer and civic, educational and parochial leader, last night became the sixth recipient of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce's annual "M" award—the highest honor the chamber can bestow upon an individual.

The award was presented to the amazed Moriarty—the identity of the recipient was a close secret until the actual presentation—at the chamber's 83rd annual dinner, at Flannery's Restaurant in Bolton, by outgoing chamber president Atty. Eugene Kelly.

"My folks came to this town because they were denied the opportunity to make a living in their own country. This town has given me everything. What an inexpressible joy it would be to return in kind what I have received," Moriarty said.

Atty. Kelly also read a telegram from Sen. Dodd, which said: "Only the most urgent Senate business requires my presence. My sincere congratulations to you on this richly deserved tribute to your life and your community."

The evening's featured speaker, Gov. Dempsey, asked the chamber to take a broad view of its role, to support community as well as business programs and to back regional as well as local industrial development.

The evening also saw the presentation of plaques to Atty. Kelly as outgoing chamber president and to Dr. Douglas Smith and Clinton Hendrickson for the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Boy Scouts for the two organizations' efforts toward community betterment.

The "M" award, "in recognition of dedicated service, outstanding leadership and selfless devotion to the community," was given Moriarty after Atty. Kelly had, without revealing Moriarty's name—some of his life and his accomplishments.

The intended recipient of the award, he said, was born in Manchester, but left in 1921 to work his way through Pratt Institute in New York City, where he lived in a rent-in-upstairs room and worked in a bakery.

After earning an engineering degree, he worked and studied for about 12 years in New York and Wisconsin, returning to Manchester in 1933 to aid his brother in establishing a new business. He never left.

On June 22, 1932, Atty. Kelly said, he married his grammar school sweetheart from Manchester, the former Miss Julia Sheridan. They have five children and six grandchildren.

Atty. Kelly said — Moriarty later corrected to eight the number of grandchildren.

After Atty. Kelly had read a

should take a broad view of community responsibility rather than his own concern for business or industrial interests.

And he asked chamber officials to back regional development, rather than promoting strictly local interests.

"A Chamber of Commerce that is interested only in commerce, in the narrow sense," he said, "contributes much less to its community and to the well-being of its members than does an organization that takes the broad view."

"The best Chambers of Commerce are led by men with vision who can see that what is good for all the people is also good for business and industry."

"I like to see chambers, taking a positive stand on matters such as educational programs, recreational programs

and all things that effect the people of the community."

He warned against becoming known as the organization with the voice that is against.

"People look to the Chamber of Commerce to initiate programs for community well-being."

"One of the obvious, but by no means the only, things that a chamber can and is expected to do is take the lead in business and industrial development."

"Two years ago, in Detroit, I talked with representative of Burroughs Corporation, which already was looking into the possibility of finding a suitable location in Connecticut where it might consolidate the operations of its Todd Division."

"The story behind the recent dedication of that plant in Tolland is a long one. The Chamber of Commerce in Rockville broke a good deal of that story."

One of the interesting parts of the story is that the Todd Plant is not in Rockville or in Tolland, but in the neighboring town of Tolland.

"The Rockville Chamber wisely realized that in a small and compact state like Connecticut, development must often be viewed as a regional rather than community matter."

"The day is long past, if indeed it ever existed, when Connecticut could be regarded as a collection of 169 separate, individual towns each concerned solely with its own affairs and unmindful of its neighbors."

"It is imperative that every effort, both at the community and state level, be made continuously to attract the industry that will provide additional jobs which will be needed to keep our growing number of workers employed."

The Governor's talk also touched upon the recently created Connecticut Industrial Building Commission, on urban renewal and on the New York World's Fair.

The Building Commission, authorized to disburse as much as \$25 million in loans to finance new industry in Connecticut, has approved 14 applications for a total of almost \$15 million, and is working on four more for more than \$5 million.

Urban renewal, Gov. Dempsey said, "benefits the economy of the entire state, and I feel that your chamber is serving the interest not only of Manchester but of the State of Connecticut" in backing the town's renewal projects.

"The World's Fair, he said, 'offers... an educational opportunity that should be made available to every young person. He suggested that the chamber sponsor fair trips for Manchester students.'

"The Chamber of Commerce, new president, Alfred F. Wertner, speaking before the Governor, pledged the chamber would 'meet the demands of 1964 with a firm resolve to work for a better Manchester.'

The chamber, he said, is all things to all people, with Main St., retail contractors and many other groups represented.

"It is necessary to understand the composition of the chamber," he said, "and its diversity,

to become aware of the goal of community service."

Although the chamber has been called "political," he said, it is not politically aligned, nor set to serve any one person or group." Rather, it sometimes must take a strong stand to perform a necessary community service.

Wertner also presented a plaque to Atty. Kelly, outgoing 83rd president, in recognition of "outstanding service and... countless hours devoted to the community through the Chamber of Commerce."

Atty. William Fitzgerald, chairman of the chamber's meetings committee, and Mrs. Francis J. Mahoney, and Mrs. Helen Wind, who offered the invocation and the

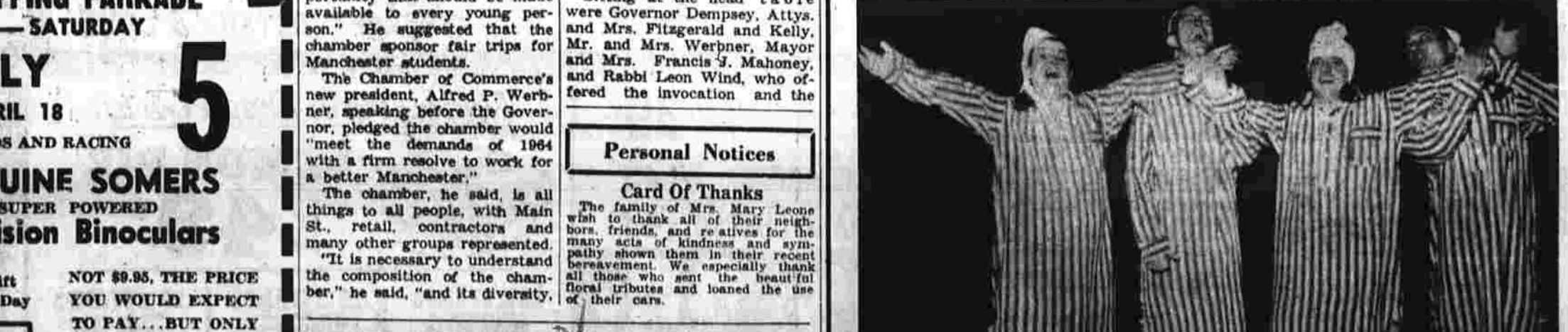

- 1 cup shortening
 - 1/2 cup salt
 - 1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 - 3 cups flour
 - 1 cup brown sugar
 - 1 cup white sugar
 - 2 eggs
 - 2 cups rolled oats
 - 1/4 cup raisins
 - 1/4 cup coconut
 - 1/2 cup milk, chopped
 - 1/2 cup undrained crushed pineapple
 - 1/2 cup dates (optional)
- Cream shortening and sugar and well beaten eggs. Beat until smooth. Sift flour, salt and soda, and add to batter. Mix well. Add pineapple, fruit and chopped nuts. Drop by teaspoon on a greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate, 350-degree oven

10 to 12 minutes. This makes about five or six dozen cookies.
Jiffy Apple Cake
 2 1/2 to 3 cups chopped apples
 1 cup sugar
 1/4 cup butter or margarine
 1 egg, well beaten
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 1/2 cup whipping cream.
 Cream shortening and sugar and add eggs. Sift to get 1 1/2 cups flour, salt, cinnamon, baking powder and baking soda, and add to creamed mixture. Beat well. Add chopped apples. Bake in 8x12x2 inch oblong pan, which has been greased, and floured on the bottom. Bake in 350-degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Cool and serve with whipped cream.

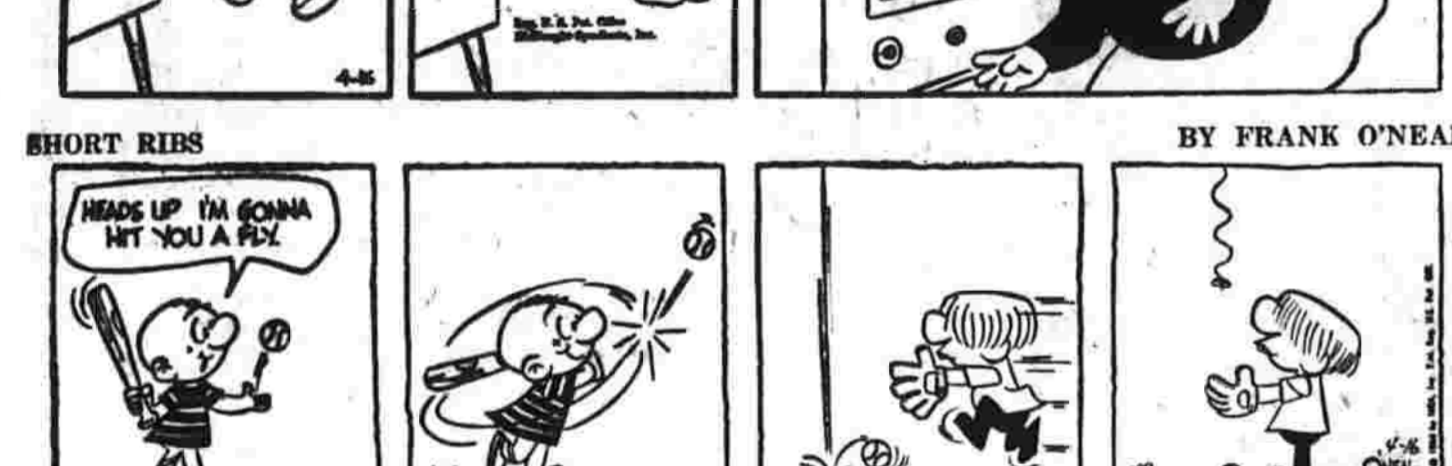

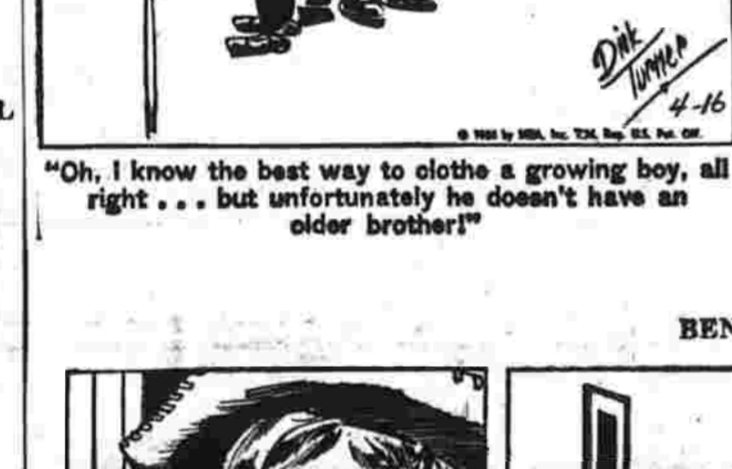
