They specialize in promising you what you want to hear. They specialize in inventing the slogans and catch phrases they think may hit your fancy. Sometimes, a politician or a political party makes promises that have to be kept to a certain degree. Having made them so often and so prominently, the politician or party can't deliberately and totally renege when the time for performance arrives.

Sometimes, in such campaigning, the way the people reach for something they want helps establish it as the beginning of some reality, however unscrupulously the politicians may have reached for it in the first place.

Sometimes the politician whets appetites he himself has to try to feed, later

Sometimes, in summary, political campaigning is the way change and progress are thought of, proclaimed, and set on the road to some eventual arrival. Transfer all these political aphorisms from the context in which they may

seem normal to the somewhat more unusual and surprising context of Premier Khrushchev of Russia fighting off the rival Communist party of Peiping, and they still hold a portion of relevance and truth. It is amazing how, in the past fev

waeks. Premier Khrushchev has been sharpening his campaign wits. He is in favor of goulash. He is in favor of 'equality" among the various Communist parties of the various nations. He renounces Stalin with more fervor than ever, making him a villain comparable only to the villains still alive and operating out of Peiping. This Khrushchev on the campaign trail is full, too, of the sentiment of survival. He believes in peace and progress. He is a veritable lamb of a fellow. One almost doubts that he would ever do such a violent thing as use guns or tanks to keep people from following their own individual senti-

One can surmise a certain amount of hypocrisy in all this wonderful campaign promising. One can figure it out that if Khrushchev didn't have the Chinese Communists on his back his speeches might not be quite so eager and pretty, and that if he were rid of the Chinese heresy and rivalry tomorrow. he wouldn't be quite so enthusiastic about national equality and freedom for

But one can also calculate that, whatever the sincerity content, it is something to have Khrushchev out on the stump talking like this. For there is every political promise; one hopes the Communist parties of the world rally to Khrushchev in his campaign battle with Peiping, and then begin holding him to some of his campaign promises.
