Belgian Doctors End Strike Meeting Set Over Dispute

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP)—Belgium's 12,000 doctors and dentists ended their 18-day strike today, but the dispute over the new socialized medicine law remains unresolved. The doctors agreed to meet with government officials next Wednesday in an attempt to settle their differences over the controversial legislation. Belgium's medical profession agreed to call off the strike after 8 1/2 hours of intensive negotiations during which the Cabinet has asked them to let the plan function for a year of trial. If it is found that patients are being abused, the doctors would be charged for all as under the British system. An overwhelming parliamentary vote last December. It was to have been effective Jan. 1, but a three-month delay was ordered because of strong opposition from the doctor.

Events In State Cell Revisited: Poet Is Back

NEW HAVEN (AP)—Nighthawk, a burglar with a literary bent, is back today where his poetic fancy first took wing—Connecticut State Prison. Frederick Siebold, 27, a six-footer who walked into a police station Feb. 20, was sentenced Friday to a 15-year term in State Prison. He had been convicted on 12 counts of burglary. For police, the capture ended weeks of frustration as Nighthawk, as he signed the mocking verses he left behind, pulled one burglary after another in downtown New Haven. After Siebold had been caught, he told a reporter he developed his literary style during an earlier stretch in State Prison. In four years, Siebold said, he had worked up from apocryphal to editor of the prison paper. His poetic output this winter consisted of doggerel such as this, left in an office he ransacked a few nights before his arrest: "Sorry to leave such a mess; just as unfair have you been; to leave not a stalling for me." None of Siebold's robberies netted much more than \$50, police said. The 12th job, his last, involved \$4. Asked why he left his notes, he replied: "Vain-glorious."

Jet Crashes in Arabia, 23 Americans Aboard

BAHRAIN, Persian Gulf (AP)—Groping through a desert sandstorm, a jetliner overshoot the airport at Dharhan, Saudi Arabia, Friday night and crashed into the Persian Gulf. There were no signs of survivors among the 49 persons aboard, including 23 Americans. In Beirut, Lebanon, a spokesman for the East Airlines-Liban said all but one of the Americans apparently were employees or relatives of employees of the big Arabian American Oil Co.—Aramco—whose headquarters are in Dharhan. A U.S. Navy spokesman said helicopter crewmen alighted the wreckage this morning in shallow water close to the coast about 10 miles south-southwest of Dharhan. Divers were reported to have gone down to the wreckage. The fuselage was said to be intact. One wing jettied from the water. Although prospects for survivors looked slim, a Middle East spokesman said a search was being carried out along the coast by helicopter and small boat. The twin-jet, French-built Caravelle went down in the gulf between Dharhan, an oil city near the Arabian coast, and the British-protected Arab sheikhdom 15 miles offshore. The flight had seemed to have been following the normal landing pattern, flying over a series of lagoons and reefs approaching Dharhan airport. The control tower at Dharhan lost contact with the plane about three minutes after the airport. Visibility was near zero when the plane began its approach for the nighttime landing, then overflew the airport near the Persian Gulf coast and went down 10 miles offshore. The plane was found during a massive air, land and sea search launched at dawn by U.S. and British Air Force jets and helicopters, private planes, desert vehicles and ships. Passengers were reported to include 23 Americans: 11 Saudis, four Lebanese, one Syrian, one Bahraini, one Jordanian and one Palestinian. The crew consisted of five Lebanese, one French and one American. Dharhan, a comparatively modern desert city in the heart of Saudi Arabia's multimillion-dollar oil operations and the headquarters of the Arabian American Oil Co. There is a large American colony in Dharhan connected with ARAMCO. Most employees live in the company complex of air-conditioned apartments and single dwellings with company stores and entertainment facilities nearby.

Tricky Boxes Made to Lick Shoplifters

Why do they deliberately use different size packages for products that aren't different sizes? The answer, says Julian Barkadale, vice president of the Whitman's Chocolates division of P. M. M. Co. and an expert on packaging, is shoplifters. Supermarket managers have found that some thieves will slip small objects—tubes of toothpaste or shampoo, for instance—into the hollow rolls of wrapping paper and thereby get them past the check-out. Also, says Barkadale, an attempt to standardize line of frozen foods in convenient same-size packages raised problems. They found that some shoppers would switch products and, for instance, take home a 1 1/2 lb lobster in a macaroni-and-cheese carton with a 38-cent tag. Barkadale said that efforts to thwart shoplifting also account for some of the hard-to-open tops—lid switching is common—and the bulky sheets of cardboard on which small items are mounted—harder to pocket. Culled from AP Wires BURN BOYCOTTED SCHOOL NOSTALGIA, Ala. (AP)—The Mason County High School, which has been boycotted by white pupils since the school board voted to integrate, burned Friday night. At least 20 state public safety officers, including a state police director, say the newly integrated school is a total loss. There were no injuries. The cause of the blaze was not immediately determined. Anti-integration signs were painted on the school Friday for the second time since it has been attended only by six Negroes. The Negroes were ordered transferred there in February by a federal court after Tuskegee High School was closed. A boycott also is in effect at the high school at Shorter, where six other Negroes were sent from Tuskegee. Tuskegee High was closed after a white boycott left the 12 Negroes as the only pupils. There were 13 teachers. The burned wing housed the high school section. Another wing, connected by a covered walkway, contains the grammar school. It still is segregated. PICKETS POLED NEW YORK (AP)—About 35 pickets from Brooklyn, Queens and Bronx chapters of the Congress of Racial Equality were felled by police today in their attempt to stall work on the World's Fair. The pickets, who came by subway and car, had planned to halt workers from entering the fair grounds and completing work for Wednesday's opening. The pickets were led by the Rev. Milton A. Galambos, who headed two recent school boycotts in New York. When Galambos saw all the policemen outside the fair gates, he said: "This place is an armed camp. They must have been tipped off. The same ORIE pickets are playing a sabotage of buses on parkways leading to the fair on opening day. Designed to cause a massive traffic tie-up."

They very nearly steal the picture, and yet neither had had professional experience. Both, however, are convinced they are now actresses forever, although they had other ambitions before the movie. "I wanted to be a writer or a painter," Tippy says. "I still do some writing and painting, as well as acting. When I was a 5th grader, I sold a painting

of a fish to a neighbor for \$5." "I wanted to be a doctor like my father, my grandfather and my uncle," Marrie says. "I've got all kinds of microscopes and chemistry sets around the house." Marrie was picked for the movie first, when her drama teacher in Germantown, Pa., sent in her name, with several others, to a talent scout looking for teen-age actresses for "Orient." Tippy, from Rye, N. Y., had been doing some modeling, and got the part when a photographer introduced her to the producer. Despite their differences, the two girls got along famously. They do share a love of practical jokes. They took great delight in rehearsing a fainting scene on Park Avenue, for example. Their success—they walked away with most of the reviews—has not materially altered their lives. They still go to school, still live the same kind of life they did before, still have kid brothers to contend

with. Marrie says her 11-year-old brother "every once in a while is overcome by brotherly love—but not often." To Tippy (the name comes from the middle of her three names, Elizabeth Tipton Walker), "all success has meant is that my school work is incomplete and I have to work hard to catch up." While both of them plan to continue in acting, it will be some time yet before they are full-fledged actresses. Both sets of parents are insistent that their daughters finish school first. And they don't have agents yet. Marrie explains: "My mother says that agents get jobs for people. So I have no agent."

During Jiras' student days his interest in the theater had brought him an apprenticeship in the make-up department at the CBS Television Network. During this time he also worked on a number of motion pictures, in New York, Maine, Florida, Wyoming, Montana and Hollywood.

"The work was interesting, and the money was great," he says, "so I naturally continued in make-up after getting out of law school."
