Down To Twice Our Need

Nobody associated with yesterday's anouncements of big nation cutbacks in he production of the raw materials for nuclear explosions made any pretense that this was based on much more than a demonstrable surplus of such ma-

Both we and Russia have been stockpiling it for nearly 20 years. The assumption is that we have much more of it than either of us could ever live long enough to use if anybody started using any of it against anybody else.

We are running over with the stuff. It is economically foolish, then, to keep on producing it at the rate of four times as much as we could possibly need or use. So we will cut down production, so it is only twice our possible need or use.

What makes this joint announcement of production cutback news, then, is really something fairly subtle. It is primarily a question of attitude, mood and

Up to this point, neither Russia nor we could allow the fact that we might be grotesquely overproduced with the raw materials of nuclear explosion to interfere with our continued overproduction. Up to this point, neither of us has been capable of thinking of anything but racing the other on the theory that it would be unspeakable self-treachery for shead, even when the forging ahead was into the realm of fantastic oversupply.

Now, somehow, we have found ourselves in the mood where we feel able to reduce our mutual surplus and unusable production at least in half, so we aren't making quite so much stuff we never can use.

This doesn't seem like very much to be making speeches about. But it has to be contrasted with the memory of how impossible even this much has been in the

This leaves us as capable as ever of blasting each other off the face of the earth. But if we can trust ourselves to one simple piece of joint common sense. perhaps we can progress to others. Let us respect whatever mutual goodwill may be involved, and not dwell too cynically upon the fact that nobody is giving up a thing in terms of capacity to kill.

# The Supposed Idealists

Reading news to the effect that there are some people not only in South Korea but also in Japan who object to the effort of the two governments to reach some kind of normal, friendly relations with one another, it might be a natural thing to conclude that this would be the sentiment of the ultra-nationalists.

On the South Korean side, it would be those patriots so offended by Japan's conquest and long domination of their country that they could never forgive it. On the Japanese side, one might asstime there would be the patriots of su per-empire who would resent any kind of acknowledgment that the day of Japan in Korea was ended forever.

All this, however, is misconception. The opposition to normalcy and peace between Japan and South Korea comes, in both countries, from groups who are described as either Communist or Leftist. The kind of people who can be openly labeled either Communist or Leftist are historically supposed to be friendly to certain idealistic concepts.

They are supposed to believe in peace They are supposed to believe in the brotherhood of man. They are supposed to believe in the internationalist way of

But that is merely the fancy dust they scatter in the eyes of the naive. Keeping alive the ancient, classic en-

mity between Japan and Korea, inflaming the purely nationalistic spirit on both sides, acting as if Koreans and Japanese were not really members of the same human family of man-these are the activities which occupy the supposed idealists when the opportunity offers.

The peace, brotherhood, internationalism they are supposed to be for all have to have the adjective Communist or some totalitarian equivalent in front of them before they are really for them. Meanwhile, to speed the day when total chaos may make everybody want to erswl to the Communist solution, they promote and prolong such hatred, strife,

Last Friday President Charles Gaulle auddenly became mortal. The man who only a few hours before had pontificated to his nation and to the world from that atmosphere of snobbish but benevolent grandeur which makes him the only true ruler, in the classic sense, in the world today suddenly became, last Friday a man in a hospital under a surgeon's knife for an operation which was natural enough for a human being of his age, but quite a comedown for a semi-deity.
