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Germany Has Myths Too

orced by the necessity for waging political campaigns and establishing the atnosphere for recurrent elections, nobody, not even the United States at Senator Fulbright's most adventurous description of it, tops Western Germany.

There the reality is that any good and sensible German naturally has to hope for the day when the Russians and the Americans finally agree between themselves to get out of Germany and let the Germans have their own country to themselves again.

But what the country lives and talks by and perhaps votes by is not this reality, but the myth that any such move n any such direction by the United States and Russia would be a treacherous betrayal of the German people.

Why this myth was raised and exalted again just the other day, by a prominent official of the West German Cabinet, is not too much of a mystery. The egime of Chancellor Erhard has some elections approaching; his party historically does best when the cold war seems nost threatening and the partition of Germany most rigid. His party, in fact, would probably lose an election in which the Germans of East Germany could

who heads the socialist opposition to the Erhard regime, has a front line hero's role right next to the infamous Berlin

But Mayor Brandt has also usually been more fervent about wanting the reunification of Germany than Erhard or Adenauer have been, possibly because he knows that such reunification might be just the thing that would make him the first chancellor of a new reunited

It is healthy for Mayor Brandt's campaigning, and for his purposes, then, to have the cold war seem to be simmering down. Presumably, if Russia and the United States are themselves conspiring, quietly, to improve relations with one another, perhaps to the point where they might someday even stop holding Germany in their teeth between themselves. Mayor Brandt might be secretly pleased, just as his political rivals of the Christian Democratic Union Party now seem to be openly alarmed.

So if, occasionally, we Americans find that one party or another becomes especially warlike in the months just preceding an election, we can judge that somebody has decided that an atmosphere of threat and tension gives one party or the other its best chance of victory, and we can comfort ourselves not only by remembering how it has happened here before, but also by noticing that it happens in other countries too.

Americans Don't Legislate Piety

The proposed new amendment to the ederal Constitution which has been floated in the House at Washington, with the purpose of establishing beyond all doubt the legality of formal prayers in the schools, has one big thing in its fa-

No politician likes to cast a formal vote against religion. The backers of the resolution make no sones about their intention of having this issue seem to be a public witnessing

time, separating those members of Congress who are believers in some organised religion from those who are not. And, if they can maneuver their way to such a vote on the issue, there seems little doubt the amendment would win, easily. Similarly, if such an amendment were ever submitted for ratification to state legislatures, one can also forecast that state legislators, too, would be found overwhelmingly in favor of religion, not against it. The issue is not, of course, that sim-

Nor is the situation which follows the Supreme Court decision forbidding state preparation of prayers for use in chools one which can be turned back to some previous normal just by amending the hitherto treasured First Amendment

If there is going to be law definitely to affirm the right of an American arm

of government to prescribe some form of religious observance from our schools, it is going to have to designate and empower somebody to do the prescribing But the form of prayer which might natisfy one neighborhood could offend another; a school board might have a majority of adherents of one religion one year, another the next; inevitably, governmental authority would be managing and selecting the precise kind of religion there would be in our schools.

There are, we suppose, those who would argue that this could be good. But there is little doubt that, good or had, it would represent complete departure from the principles upon which this nation was founded. These principles were selected and

enunciated and written into the Constitution by men who, having all been born into a tradition of seeking and claiming their own religious freedom, had no great fear that they would soon be denying that freedom to each other. Their concern was for the day when new dissent of doctrine, or new variety of population might arise. They wanted to make sure that there could never be such a thing as legal heresy-or governmental pressures toward belief-in this free

One Big Fume

One more of the reverse miracles of our age is now coming into widespread recognition. We have, with the fumes of our industrialization, of our heating processes, and of our motorization, begun to do away with all the once mighty and formidable attributes of stone.

Stone is the material which used to be durable, and lasting, and for the ages, and strong, and indestructible, and the first choice for buildings or monuments or art which were intended to en-

But that was before we began to guarantee that even the rains that used to keep stone clean and long-lived should themselves be laden with grime and acid and smudge.

buildings and monuments and works of art is happening with the same steepcurved escalation that has also been noted in our pollution of our land and our streams. There we have been doing more damage in the last 20 years than in all previous recorded time. And now the estimate is that damage

to stone surfaces has, in the past 20 years, amounted to more than was observed in the previous 80. This is mainly stone which is located in the world's big busy cities, or in the

industrial belts. There is some indication the kind of air modern big city stone has to take is not too good for humans either. Even while we were reading about the modern deterioration of stone surfaces, and the various theories about how to halt it-the only really effective thing to do, apparently, is to turn the stone indoors and air condition it-our attention was attracted to another kind of survey, which showed that the death rate from cancer was substantially higher in New York City than in the nation as a whole. One assumes that for realistic purposes that is, for calculation of peril to stone or to lung, essentially the same big fume hangs over the Eastern Seaboard, from
