be permanent? How is it likely to de-The Guardian's answers to its own uestions take considerable space, and we therefore, with some apologies, renort to excerpts. "Let us start," says the Guardian, "from the American corner. The line to

the Soviet Union was the original cold war. We are now told that this hostile relationship is weakening; among the reasons given are the balance of terror. the embourgeoisement of Mr. Khrushchev (who is praised for prefering goulash to revolution), President Kennedy's educational achievement in the United States, and above all the Sino-Soviet rift. The significant point, however, is that for these or other reasons the frontiers of the conflict are becoming fixed. This is in accordance with historical precedent; the Graeco-Roman world eventually reached an equilibrium with the Persian Empire, Christendom with Islam.

"We have," the Guardian continues, seen the line hardening before our eyes. the Hungarian revolution; the Soviet Union is reproached by Chinese Communists for not having exploited favourable situations in Iraq and Algeria, When Soviet armed might did experi-mentally cross the line—into Cuba—it was withdrawn . . . changed governments may for a time attempt changed policies; either side may look out for s cheap or easy advance. But the frontiers already drawn look fairly stable."

The relationship between the United States and China, as the Guardian editorial summarizes it, contains 'no such

"For one reason, China as a potential rival came later on the scene; East Asia is still in the unstable condition that Europe was in at the end of the war. American and Chinese interests conflict in Japan, in Korea, in Formona, in the Indo-Chinese peninsula, and farther afield. We can foresee the end of some of these disputes; Japan will decide for itself; Chinese on both sides of the Formosa Strait will reach their own accommodation. Indo-China is unpredictable. But there is no inherent reason why what happened in Europe should not eventually happen in Asia too, and why a dividing line should not be accepted (however tacitly) by both sides. The Chinese, after all, are used to this; they built the Great Wall over 2,000 years ago. The Americans are in South-east Asia to defend a frontier; their interests are fulfilled when one has become fixed. . . . Chinese and Americans are not condemned, either by geography or strategy, to be always at war by proxy. A modus vivendi is both possible and, in the long run, probable."

It is when the Guardian editorial gets to examining the third side of the great power triangle that it finds itself unable to reassure itself very convincingly. It finds that China and the Soviet Union have contiguous borders-"they cannot withdraw from one another physically as can the United States and its rivals. . . . China has a huge population; Soviet Asia a thin population . . . there is no lack of eccasions

"And once the cold war has started, the tendency may be for the temperature to go on dropping; in that it differe from the other two cold wars. We used to be told that, since the floviet and Chiness Governments were both Communist, they had the same interests, which would prevent their ultimate severance. In so far as this is true it only proves the violence of the political explosion that has driven them apart. The tighter the mulacule, the greater the evidence of ivisive force when it is split . . . Of the



The Supreme Court, by refusing to hear a case brought from Gary, Ind., has compulsion upon school boards to remedy, by arbitrary transportation of pupils hither and yon, any racial imbalance in schools which obviously results from exsting residential patterns.

Some civil rights groups have been asking, and some school boards have been willing to try, such an artificial and arbitrary means of achieving more racial balance, more integration, in schools where existing residential patterns happen to decree almost complete segrega-And surely, all solution-minded ob-

servers must regret the fact of such complete segregation where it exists, and wish for the speedlest possible moves toward an end of it. But the question is one of how artificial and arbitrary you can get, and one of how much right you have to disrupt and inconvenience the lives of the innocent in order to accomplish a desirable social aim. And, beyond that, the eventual question is that of who is to decide where such a procees of creating an arbitrary racial balance in the nation's schools is to end, if

Shall there be a percentage solution? Shall the readjustment of school populations be repeated each attendance year? There is no good answer to such questions, no answer which is good either in principle or in possible practice.

But there is the good alternative, and the necessary alternative, which commends itself to any Americans who want this country to be a surviving country, capable of meeting the most serious soelal and moral test ever posed to any nation. It is the alternative of being willing to work hard and long and boldly at the task of building a social structure so new and so healthy there will no longer be any total residential segregation to reflect itself in the natural population of naturally drawn school districts. We need speed and seal with fundamentals; we must indeed rip up much of our national substructure; we must accomplish all kinds of drastic changes in the way we feel, think, and live. Shuffling school children about by bus is like gilding the cupola before the foundation has been jacked up for new timbers.
