Half A Million Americans

The somewhat ghastly spectacle out to the good state of Indiana Tuesday was that approximately 450,000 people, nearly half a million Americans in one State, went to the polls in a primary and found it possible to vote for America's two leading symbols of political extremiam. In the Republican primary that day, Senator Goldwater got over 260,000 votes. In the Democratic primary that day, Governor Wallace got ever 170,000 votes.

There were some slightly ameliorating circumstances. On the Democratic side, lovernor Welsh, who wound up with some 200,000 more votes than his rival from Alabama, and who therefore won the actual prize at stake—the delegation to the Democratic National Convention which he will hold for President nson - was the special target for some voters who were dissatisfied with him because of state issues. Also, as in the previous Wallace showing in Wisconsin, there was some minor business of Republicans coming out to vote in the Democratic primary just to make

But, in the main, Governor Wallace of Alabama got his votes in Indiana because there were people there who wanted to declare themselves on his side in civil rights issues.

The reason why some Indiana Republicans could think of nothing better to do on primary day than to go out and create a little trouble among the Democrats was obvious enough. If they voted in their own primary, they had to vote either for Senator Goldwater or for Barold Stassen, the pitiful tailender of all Republican primaries who had hitherto been able to garner only a few

hundred votes anywhere. No write-in votes were permitted Quite clearly, then, Indiana's Republi-

Those Republicans who felt strongly nough about this to be willing to take lmost any instrument to show their atiment had just one option—Stassen. Mo, while Goldwater was raking in is more than 260,000 votes, Stassen, who had up to this time been lucky to get a few hundred votes out of each primary held, had the amazing good fortune to soom up beyond a total of 104,000 votes.

These obviously were desperation Reblicans - Republicans who probably would rather not have their party run at all than have it run with Goldwater. But again, like Wallace, Goldwater got his votes in Indiana because there were enough people in Indiana who could not only stand voting for him, but actually do so with fervor and enthusi-

This is not America, 1964. But it is a good big part-too big a part-of America, 1964.

This is the way some Americans just much entitled to their views and pinions and votes as any of the rest of us do turn when they are faced with the great historic issues of our day. In a free democracy, you always have to consider it a lucky and fortunate thing if sanity maintains a 51 per cent control of the big main decisions.

Senator And Archbishop

Cyprus is proving, we suspect, a sort of touchstone with the miraculous but perhaps bothersome property of turning theory into reality—for two individuals. First, there is Archbishop Makarios, one of those elergymen for the ages whose special uniform should fool no one. He seems to have had his own private theory that he could perhaps use the presence of the UN in Cyprus as a cover-up for continued aggression. He is a little shocked and dismayed, the dissatches say, over the stern way the UN. critain and the United States, and even he government of Greece itself, reacted to his rather gay violation of the cease fire the UN hoped it had arranged. The lesson in realism he has to learn is that he UN went into Cyprus to keep the seace, not to win the war for Makarios. Becond, there is Senator Fulbright, the ery valuable and stimulating maker of pseches about myths and about our eed to stop trying to live by them. here are some, of course, who have sinintained that Senator Fulbright himself is the one who spreads the myth and refuses to recognize the harsh reali-ties of international life.

We suspect President Johnson, a highsheeling, playful character of late, likes Senator Fulbright, and did not have too much real quarrel with his celebrated speech about myths and the need for all to dare to begin to think some un-

But we think President Johnson also found it impossible to resist a sudden impulse to take Senator Fulbright down out of his realm of theory and let him try to deal, first hand, on the ground level, with one real, tangible world problem. Just how will the intelligent theorist, the legislator who normally doesn't have to execute the policies he helps legislate or advises, make out on this little venture into the action arena it-

If Senator Fulbright succeeds in perminding President Makarios to spend more time either in church or in his executive office, and less time out directing the fire against St. Hilarion Castle, he will have done realistically

Next Tuesday Senator Clifford Case of New Jersey will finally have the privilege of appearing before the Senate Rules Committee to ask that it require all members of the United States Senate to declare, on the public record, their answers to certain questions concerning possible relationships with the famous

It has taken quite a campaign, quite an exertion of public sentiment and pressure, to get the Senate Committee even to consent to a discussion of Senator Case's proposal.

It is rated quite impossible for Senator Case to get anywhere with his pro-But how far it is likely to get has noth-

ing to do with its merits. On its merits, the proposal should be adopted. The United States Senate should, as Senator Case contends, be given an opportunity to "cleanse itself of the stain which this affair has placed

The Senate Rules Committee has spent four months presuming to investigate the affairs of young Baker, the smart young darling of the Senate. But it has, in all this time, studiously avoided focusing its attention on the possible relationship between Baker and individual members of the United States

That some of them were his patrons, that others were his cronies, that he did favors for many of them, that he brokered exchanges of senatorial influence for campaign contributions or for propositions to his own benefit—all this can

But the Senate and not merely because President Johnson may once have been a patron and a friend of the famous Bobby-has so far been determined that no Senatorial reputation shall be involved, not, at least, through any investigation being done by the Senate it-

Bobby Baker was a fixer, for sure; the Senate has its fixers, too; ethics for those elected should he at least as high and strict as those for an appointed clerk.


Majority Rule Is Not Enough

Democratic government is more than ajority rule. A government that rules strictly and solely in the interests of the majority of the voters or the citizer can be one of the worst kinds yranny. There's a lot more to running a democracy than simply finding out wha most of the people want, and then

If majority rule were all that's needed it would be simple enough to settle the trouble in Cyprus. Here 80 per cent of the people are of Greek origin and sym pathies, and probably most of then would like to see the island taken over by the Greek nation. But 18 per cent are Turkish, and want desperately to preserve the island's independence of partition it with a chance of a tie with Turkey. And those Turkish Cypri-ots believe devotedly, and with some reason, that they haven't much chance for a good life, or indeed for any life at all. if the simple rule of the majority

Much nearer to home, we can se what could happen in the state of Con-necticut if both houses of the legislature given over to representation b towns or the surrounding countryside, and who are numerically in the minority, would find themselves without effective sentation. If the system by which the House is filled with representatives of town and city units is abandoned en-tirely, the will of the city-oriented majority could prevail without modification Of course minority rights can be carried to extreme or abused, as is happening in the United States Senate during the civil rights debate. When a minority group has the absolute power to thwart or veto the will of the ma-jority indefinitely, that is wrong too. In an effective government, the minority roups will have power to slow down, to modify or to force compromise an



Test Offered For Diplomas

Examinations for those wish ing to earn a high school di-ploma will be offered May 28 at the U.S. Army Reserve Training Center, 700 So. Quaker Lane, West Hartford. Applications are available from the State Department of Edu-eation in Hartford and must be submitted one week in advance of the examinations. To qualify for the tests, applicant must be at least 19 years old, must have been out of high school at least one year, a Connecticut resident for at least six months before the date of application, and the class with which the applicant entered high school must have graduated. There is a three dollar fee for first applicants. The fee for retake tests is two dollars. No fee is required of veterans or mem-bers of the armed forces or their auxiliaries.

In general, the fields covered by the tests include English, mathematics, natural sciences and social studies. The tests will be held from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. with one hour for lunch.


