Nonetheless, there is an interesting and significant parallelism between the

two projects. In each instance, the authorities conserned with our school system and those concerned with the possibilities of urban renewal have come to the same conelusion—that this is the proper location for the center of things for the big and growing community of the North End. One could forget Robertson School, and could forget Depot Square, and just leave it there as a traffic light for people on the way to other centers to go

Nobody chose that kind of solution. The choice was for a new improved center at the center of things for the North End community. To modernize and expand Robertson. And, instead of leaving Depot Square there as a sentimental reminder of what was bright and new and handsome back in the flourishing nineteenth century, to rip it out and build something blessedly new and dif-

for vice president By contrast to the reported attitude of President Johnson, the Democrats of New York, like Mayor Wagner and other prominent party figures, are supposed to be completely friendly to the possibility that Mr. Kennedy might choose to run in their state.

Apparently, since the Federal Constitution merely specifies that a Senator shall be living in the state from which he is elected at the time of his election, Mr. Kennedy could move into New York on the first Monday of November and be qualified, residentially,

Machines We Could Whip?

Ambassador to the United Nations Adlai Stevenson, addressing some educators down in New York the other day fulfilled his own classical heritage by coming up with a new view on the modern phenomenon of automation.

Automation, Adlai said in a few hun dred more cultivated words than we shall use, may help us recreate among ourselves the glory of classical Greece. How? By giving us, with its services to us, that same sense of mastery, and that same huge dividend of leisure. which made it possible for the free men of Athens to live lives full of beauty and inspiration because they were so completely free of drudgery.

The fact that the beautiful civilization of Athens was based on the institution of slavery has been the big deep blot nobody has ever been able to eradicate from all that splendid marble.

But what Ambassador Stevenson visunlises as a possibility for us need carry no such guilt with it. When we can have automatic machines to do it for us, we no longer have any need to keep any human beings anywhere in any state of subjugation or inferiority. Leisure built on automation can be leisure which is conscience-free, or can be as soon as we root out that last tincture of Puritan in

So, perhaps, the age of Pericles is upon us-or at least open to us if we care and dare to reach for it. One cynical afterthought bothers us.

What if, after all, part of the exquisite beauty and refinement and delicacy of the world of Athens had its roots in the aristocratic feeling of justified dominance over other human beings? What if it does take a little savagery to fertilize a tender blossom? What if, somehow, all the elements of that fatogether, so that the institution of slavery was as integral and vital a part of the whole as the curve on some Venus? Will there really be quite as much sat-

lafaction, and inspiration, in dominating a mere machine? In any case, Ambassador Stevenson thinks we better make sure it is we, rather than the machine, who winds up doing the dominating. We are, as ie pictured us, walking "the narrow and nervous border between automation's promise of either plenty or misery." But automation, as he saw it, is about to become the most single important fact in modern life, wherefore we, in our educational processes, should be about the



Disarmament would produce a great many headaches, but they need not prove unmanageable if adequate study is undertaken beforehand. President Johnson's study of the draft system might well have been decided on even if there were no prospect of disarmament; and its results will be of value to the Inited States even if no disarmament takes place. But from the point of view outside world, the chief moral to be drawn from it is that more and more objective studies of this kind will be ecesary if disarmament is ever to be more than an aspiration.
