





Laos For Laos

Whatever our assessment of the conlinuing and fundamental blame for unstable conditions in the Kingdom of Laos,-the real trouble may be that the people themselves aren't particularly interested in being ruled by anybody— the surface responsibility for crisis has kept alternating back and forth.

There was a time when, under the E mhower administration, we conducted an experiment in trying to take over the country as a full zone of influence for ourselves, in quite obvious violation of the agreement for neutralisation of Laos which had been reached at Geneva in 1954. Before it left office, the Eisenhower administration had come to an admission of the failure of this attempt on our part; native indifference, plus the single-minded dedication of the Communist Pathet Lao factions, were too much for us to try to overcome. What was bequeathed to the incoming Kennedy administration was a policy of seeking a true neutralisation of the sountry once again, with us getting out, and with the country itself going under

a neutralist regime. This was finally achieved, on paper, at Geneva in 1962, and ever since there has been a painfully insecure, onagain-off-again neutralist regime in Laos, under Prince Souvanna Phouma. It is a regime which has been continually buffeted by alarms, plots, and its own incapacities.

Yet a faltering, flustered, incapable neutralist regime was something possible, whereas nobody could consider either outright Western or outright Communist domination of Laos possi-
