He again explained that the curtailment of water for lawnwatering use is not due to any critical shortage of water in town, but is necessary because ige tank as fast as it is being up with peak hours of water consumption in the area. Wittkofske said that a fourth

pump, to be installed within three or four weeks, will bring the pumping capacity to 800 gallons per minute, which, he said, should be sufficient. As for the water situation i general, Wittkofske said that, although it is getting serious, it is not yet critical.

He said that people should use water with the thought that conditions may get worse before they get better.

We do not know how-except per haps by some federal law creating same-time voting hours throughout the nation in all federal elections-to carry through to the last consistency in the proposition we are about to make. But the proposition can, at the least, be applied rather easily to any voting process inside any single state, in either of two ways.

The simplest way, again, would be to have uniform voting hours within the state, so that no polling places closed earlier than any others. But if that solution to the problem

were not available, then, we think, we would have a law forbidding proclamation of voting results in any section of a state until such time as all the polls in the state had been closed.

What concerns us, it must be obvious by this time, is what happened out in California the other night, when commentators and computers, with devilish accuracy, proceeded to announce the result of the California primary not only many long hours before the votes had been counted, but at least a half hour before many thousands of voters had even cast their votes.

One doubts, in point of fact, that the announcement of the California result half an hour before many of the state's polls had even closed had much of an influence on the final result. But if Goldwater had finally lost by a few thousand votes after being proclaimed a landslide winner he might have felt he had a case against somebody for lulling his supporters into such a sense of security and victory they had not bothered to go to the polls. Or if the margin by which Rockefeller finally lost had been equally small, he might have felt he had something of a case against an announcement of landslide for Goldwater, which might have persuaded some of his supporters a trip to the polls was wasted and use-

The point is, either way, that the computers and the analysts who operate them are now so frighteningly accurate that they seem about to pronounce resuits before anybody has voted, and that it should be a matter of elemental fairness for them to do the voters themselves the courtesy of waiting until the voters have voted before the result is announced.

Beyond that elemental courtesy to voters themselves, there would obviously be growing possibility, as the computer processes are perfected, that there might indeed be influence upon some uncast votes from the factual news and the analysis of votes already cast. 


