The Rec Audit

If Tuesday's meeting of the board of firectors accomplished nothing else, it did bring at long last some sense of reality to the mysterious and long-awaited audit report of the town recreation

Until the report was given the directors a week or so ago, it had been shrouded at intervals in a whole wardrobe of cloaks of secrecy, designed unsuccessfully to protect recreation officials from undue suspicion.

And, even after a reading, the auditwith its bits and pieces of information taken from the context that some knowledge of the way recreation programs are run might provide-offered the concerned but hazed reader little re-

It was a considerable service that was endered those interested enough to attend the meeting by one director, who took the time and the effort to wade through the audit's details with recreation superintendent James Herdic and the auditor, in an effort to assemble all the available information into a coherent picture of the rec department's prob-

It was a service because it put the bits and pieces of audit back into some kind of context that had been lacking since the first whisperings of trouble. The recreation department came out dressed in its new perspective looking neither clean as a hound's tooth nor as soiled as rumors would have had us be-

It came out with problems born of ear-Her years which earlier auditors had not criticised, with misjudgments allowed to continue because of slipshod supervision, with a variety of human failings which system had not had an opportunity to

It came out with a raft of difficulties that could have, but need not have produced serious dishonesty, the same kind of difficulties which were not uncommon in a good many town departments not too many years ago. And it came out of director Robert

Stone's questioning much the better for the experience. It looked better not only for Superin-

tendent Herdic's bluntly honest answers, but more importantly because the department's problems were no longer mysterious infractions of the accountant's mystique, with all sorts of dark implications, but instead were failings that could be understood and comprehended and whose causes could be re-

More direct efforts to protect the recreation department from suspicions of guilt were advanced by Francis Delia-Fera, but his efforts to show that the lack of a time sheet did not necessarily imply intentional overpayment of rec personnel, while valid, was not nearly so convincing a defense of the department as was the simple sense of reality that Merdic's explanations, or occasional admitted inability to explain, created.

Chinese Work For Peace

The conference on disarmament has resumed in Geneva with the Chinese Communists, strangely, working its favor, or as Moscow radio sees it, with Peking on the side of the Western pow-

As the conference opens it seems that the Soviet delegate, the flery Valerin Zorin, is more interested in taking backhand slaps at the Peking line on the inevitability of war than he is in embarking on tirades against the United States. To put it in the language of the Mossow propaganda machine, "the most frenzied militaristic circles in the West are now in effect being joined by certain figures calling themselves Commu-

To be sure it cannot be assumed that Eorin will continue to concentrate on the Chinese as his sole target, but in any case the talks this time begin in an atmosphere that is more cordial. It was not Zorin alone who set the tone as the conferees met. William Foster, the chief delegates for the United States, brought with him a message from President Johnson in which the President referred to progress already

made toward lessening tensions and saking for redoubled efforts. Those small measures already con-cluded are the partial ban on nuclear eting and the direct link between the White House and the Kremlin. Those the lent would like to see pursued now

at Geneva are a halt in producing fissionable materials for nuclear weapons and the destruction of obsolete bombers. Zorin picked up the cue by citing the limited gains made by Moscow and Washington as proof that the Chinese are wrong and that there is no inevitability of war and no inescapable competition in the production of arms. While the influence of the Peking-Moscow feud might be considered a rather negative benefit in an effort toward peace, it does give the Russians a plausible rationale for reaching with the

Whether such concessions will really convince the Russians of anything or whether they will even win enough endorsement in the United States is doubtful. But the effort is worthwhile and the conference opens in an atmosphere of hope that some limited further accord might be achieved toward lightening the danger of nuclear war.

Fight Age Of Jets

MORRISTOWN, N. J. It has been a lush spring this year and the plant life of a prosaic piece of real estate called the Great Swamp near here Eighty species of plants from bladder

wort, joe-pye weed, and pipsissewa to pond lilies, orchids, and fragrant sweet flag grow in the marshland and forest of the swamp. Deer, mink, fox, shrews, and other animals roam unmolested. Overhead, 165 varieties of waterfowl and gnatcatcher, thirp merrily. Their presence symbolizes victory for conservationists in a fiveyear fight to preserve the swamp. The victory was over a proposal by the Port of New York Authority to build a multimillion-dollar international jetport in the 8,000-acre swamp only 30 miles

from New York. The jetport would re-lieve some of the crowded air traffic conditions around New York City. But New Jersey conservationists were per sistently against the jetport plan. Their efforts paid off last week when Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall dedicated part of the Great Swamp as a national wildlife refuge.

The Federalization of the land puts the swamp out of reach of the powerful Port of New York Authority. It has abandoned the swamp-site plan and now has its eye on two other northern New Jersey tracts for a jetport to take the pressure off Kennedy, LaGuardia, and fewark airports, which now handle oad of 20,000,000 passengers a year and can expect 32,000,000 in 1970. As proponents argue, a jetport in New

Jersey would boost the state's economy by \$700,000,000 and provide 130,000 new jobs. But, when the bi-state port authority in 1959 tagged the Great Swamp as the site it wanted for the jetport. well-financed battle against it was immediately begun by residents, officials, a Great Swamp Committee, and an antijetport association.


Plans to preserve the swamp, which was formed 100 centuries ago when a glacier receded, had been under way about a decade before 1959, but it took the jet threat to give the conservation project the push it needed. "The jetpor did help us, there's no doubt about that,' said a spokesman for the Great Swamp Committee, whose first headquarter was a volunteer's kitchen and which now is sought out for advice by other conservation groups in the United States

The committee became a unit of the North American Wildlife Foundation and intensified and widened the drive, mailing more than 10,000 letters to solicit funds to buy swampland so it could be deeded to the Federal Government. It's aim was public ownership to prevent the swamp's "obliteration by destructive commercial development." The fight started in the immediate

terest of not wanting jets in their backyards. Many small home-owners in the area pooled funds to buy an acre, at about \$200. Most contributors gave this amount or less. But there were hig con-tributors, too, including the late M. Hartley Dodge, conservationist and Arms Co., Inc., who was active in the swamp-preservation project and gave more than \$325,000 before his death last year. It was on Mr Dodge's estate, over-looking the swamp, that last week's dedication was held. Two-thirds of the refuge was named for him.

This most dramatic day? I ever spent in my life."
This says much—for few men living have witnessed as many dramatic and historic days.
In his time, Taylor has slipped alone into Nazi-held Rome to negotiate with the Italians, confronted the Russians as U.S. commander in Berlin, led in some of the most desperate fighting in Korea, sat at Presi-dent John F. Kennedy's right hand during the Cuban missile

crisis.

Recently, the slender, gray-haired soldier of 62 sat in his Pentagon office and chatted with a reporter about D-Day, Now Taylor wears four stars the 6th of June, 1944. as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He also wears 60 decorations, many for valor.

At the time of Normandy, he had only recently pinned on his second star and taken command of the 101st Airborne Division in ngland. ... The assault on Nazi Germanys The assault on Nasi Germanys
"Fortress Europe" was the
101st's haptism in battle. It also
was Taylor's first combat jump.
Here, after refreshing his recollection, is the way Taylor
described that day:
"This was the first action of
the 101st—it had to go right. I
wanted to be sure that the spirit
and confidence of the men were
high. I visited all units in their
17 departure areas and talked

17 departure areas and talked to the men in groups from 1,000 down to 24.

"We had an early heavy dinner about 6 o'clock. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower accompanied us to the departure airfield. About 11 o'clock at night—it was still daylight there. Gen. Eisenhower went from group to group talking to the men as they got into their parachutes.

"As we get into the air dark." ness had just begun to fall. We circled around over southern England and waited for the transport fleets to fall into formation. It was a beautiful sight as we fell into line, straightened out and headed for "As we got closer we saw our

"As we got closer we saw our greatest enemy — fog. This weather was a surprise. We thought we had a clear night and yet there was a great bank of fog. The planes flew in a formation of Vs—almost touching wings—in very tight formation as we crossed the Channel. "The fog was not continuous—hers it was cloudy and there it opened up with the bright quarter moon shining through. We could see the ground from time to time.

"While we were still in the fog, on came the red light, which means — Stand up and check equipment. We lined up tight against the door. The fog lifted just as we got the red light showing four minutes to go—and then cleared complete-ly.

"The plane slowed down to 100 miles an hour —the green light meaning 'jump' came on. The sky was red with rockets—flak of all descriptions—a few burning planes on the ground.

"It was all so fascinating there was no time to be scared. It was the greatest show ever put on for a soldier's eye. There was plenty going on—everybody shooting at something.

"It was a great thrill to get sut of the airplane—we jumped from a height of 500 feet, leaving little time to adjust oneself before hitting the ground. I hit the ground with a crash and it took an appreciable length of time to recover.

"The next problem was to get out of the 'chute and it was a battle. I finally had to use my trench knife to cut myself out.

"After I got loose and looked around, there was not an American to be found. The next question was—Where was my division? I sneaked around hedgerow corners looking to find somebody—there was indiscriminate shooting going on every-where.

"I thought I would stumble on

where.

"I thought I would stumble on a German position any minute. I listened hard for the sound of a cricket—in the division we all carried a little cricket like a child's toy that we used for identification, and it turned out to be very useful that morning.

"After about 20 minutes I found new trenches and felt sure I would run into a German unit. I heard somebody move behind one of the hedgerows and then that somebody cricketed.

"It was the sound I had been listening for—and it was a most

"It was the sound I had been listening for—and it was a most beautiful one to hear, to be followed by the appearance of an American soldier. I thought he was the best sight I have ever seen. There he was, looking just as tough as could be—and just as tough as I hoped he was.

"Thereafter, assembling went set slowly. It was nearly daylight before we had assembled some 80 to 90 men out of the 800 troops that were supposed to 800 troops that were supposed to be in the area.

"We had the division artillery sommander, Gen. Anthony Mc-Auliffe, the division chief of staff, the division engineer—all
