



Southeast Asia

Out of the weiter of opinions on United States participation in the Southsest Asian conflict there appears virtual unanimity on only one point. We must find a way to avoid an all out war. Beyond the universal American instinct against such an eventuality, there is little consensus and little conclusive formation on which to base any con-

The dominant view among this country's leaders has been that the United States must stand by its commitments and prove to Red China it is not a "paper tiger" which will abandon its friends the face of danger. Most advocates of that course regard Vietnam not as a fringe area in the scheme of communist ansion, but as a central one from which the communists hope to reach out and expel the United States as a deterrent to communism everywhere in the

Such a view, expressed recently by States must also regard Vietnam, Camedia, and Laos as central in its efforts to thwart the advance of communism. And behind that reasoning is the assumption that the spread of any kind of munism anywhere constitutes a threat to democracy everywhere.

It is perhaps as the "Republican" editorial says, dangerous to assume that because there are different brands of communism according to national and regional stamp, that each or all together do not pose a threat to the welfare of the United States as varying brands of fascism did a quarter century

This question persists, however. How effective can limited military operation be against the kind of patient communist infiltration which is in progress. What, short of a shooting war, for which there seems to be no sentiment, will preserve South Vietnam.

Perhaps it was always futile to supthat very limited participation would protect the little nation from takeover by Communist guerrillas. Ferhaps it is futile, for that matter, to suppose that any limited military action will long postpone the day of communist domination throughout Southeast



A Big Step

first big step has been taken toward giving to the Negro in the United States statutory recognition of equality and dignity—his first classness as a citizen. This has been one of the major aims of the Negro. The step was taken when the Senate

voted 71 to 29 to end the Southern filibuster which had been in progress for 75 days, the longest filibuster in history. The cloture vote was expected, of course, but the encouraging thing about it was the number of Senators who voted in favor. The regret might be felt by Republicans in the fact that Sen. Goldwater voted against ending the fruitless effort to kill the rights measure. Indeed the man who seems certainly destined to be the GOP presidential candidate, now gives some indication that he may not be able to find it in his conscience to vote for the civil rights bill

The size of the vote indicates there is plenty of power in the Senate to pass the bill substantially as it is, although there is still the possibility that amendments may require new agreements between House and Senate.

While the bill, when passed, is hardly likely to cure all the ills or racial prejudice, deep-rooted and explained by elaborate rationale, it does provide a framework in the law for achieving Negro aims. And it gives a weapon to those within the rights movement who want to see those aims achieved with the minimum of upheaval.

The most important thing about the big cloture vote, however, is that in putting an end to what has been called tyranny by talk, the Senate reaffirmed and confirmed the national moral responsibility to implement the emancipation granted the Negro a century ago. To have permitted the filibuster to succeed would have been tantamount to admitting the inability of the majority to act on fundamental issues which

It gives a nation a queer feeling, it does, to think that some of its very best people just don't seem to care enough.


