

The Voter - The Election

Whether or not a person is physically able to get to the polls on election day does not affect the fact that he has the right to vote.

Secretary of the State Ellis T. Grasso issued this statement in an effort to encourage all qualified citizens to exercise their privilege as voters in the coming Presidential Election.

"Recognizing that their inability may prevent the permanently physically disabled from either becoming voters or exercising their electoral privileges," Mrs. Grasso stated, "Connecticut's election laws make special provisions for these persons."

Mrs. Grasso pointed out that citizens unable to attend sessions of the board for admissions because of permanent disability may apply to the town clerk for a form requesting special session of the board.

The application, accompanied by a certificate of a physician, must be submitted to the town clerk on or before Aug. 3. With-

in a period of two months the board will meet in the place of the applicant's confinement.

The secretary of the state devised a permanent physical disability as described in the statute, as an incapacitation which prevents and will continue to prevent the person from appearing in person at any session held by the Board for the Admission of Electors in his town or residence.

"She explained that this privilege is given to any permanently physically disabled person whose place of confinement is in his town of residence. Permanently physically disabled persons exercise the voting privilege, said Mrs. Grasso.

Presidential Showman: He Keeps Lyndon's Lights Burning Late into Night

NEW YORK — (NYA) — When it comes to one-upmanship in the name-dropping department, Broadway producer Richard Adler is champion.

Within a one-week period Adler, a tall, nervous young man, has entertained such people as President Johnson, President Lyndon B. Johnson, President John F. Kennedy, President Dwight D. Eisenhower, and Prime Minister Levi Eshkol of Israel.

In the process of entertaining President Johnson, Adler has also managed to help raise several million dollars for the Democratic party.

Adler, the composer-lyricist of such Broadway hits as "Damn Yankees" and "Pajama Game," is officially called "talent consultant for the White House."

As such he helps plan the entertainment at state dinners, as well as fund-raising spectacles which he calls "presidential-calls."

"I don't want it to sound as if I decide what goes on at White House state dinners," Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. Abe, her social secretary, and I discuss suggestions and ideas," Adler says.

For the dinner honoring Dr. Valera, Adler recruited George C. Scott and Colleen Dewhurst to read from the works of Irish poets. For Eshkol, he had violinist Mischa Elman playing Bach ("that's tried and proven," he says) and The Swingle Singers, a group Adler says will appear on the hottest in the industry, doing their vocal Bach. When six fan King Hussein was guest at the White House, Dave Brubeck entertained.

Adler, who produces all these shows from a large office furnished to early Sunday, overlooking Broadway ("this decor

is not my taste," he laughs), says to make of protocol or taboos have been set down.

"The only criterion is good entertainment we had under-entertainment. What is good we do, and what is bad we don't. Blue (trique) material is not a problem because I never use blue material to start with."

Everyone who works on one of these shows, except Adler's small staff, donates his services. The major problem, in casting, is to fit the schedules of major entertainers into the show's demands.

"There is always trouble with performers when they are not paid, even if the show is for the President of the United States. The fund-raising shows are given on two separate dates — one in Washington and one in New York — and this takes five days out of a performer's schedule. And the good ones are always booked far in advance.

"Some people do refuse to participate on the grounds that they are Republicans. After all, this is fundraising."

Adler, who is married to lovely Betty Ann Howe, presently starring on Broadway in "What Makes Sammy Run?" never repeats performers from season to season.

"The members of the New York City Ballet are the only ones who have repeated, but ballet."

Because Sally Ann knows the rules, there is no trouble in the Adler household. Her one appearance was before the late President Kennedy when she starred in a version of "Brigadoon" presented at a state dinner.

"Sally was with me at a party after a gala last year, and President Kennedy asked her why I didn't use her more often. She

said, 'Richard and I thought it was best not to raise the family. With all his family around him, President Kennedy feared.'

Adler, who is working on a musical version of "Roman Holiday" for Broadway next season, has now produced his last "presidential-calls."

"I'm not able to do any more," he says. "Not unless I see President Johnson's poverty program."

Price Index Holds Steady

 NEW YORK (AP) — Stability in commodity prices — a rare thing during business expansion — has been a mark of the current upswing. But new pressures may be building up to tip the balance.

Already there have been considerable fluctuations in some commodities. Some prices have risen, particularly for industrial materials, because demand has caught up with supply. Others have been raised as a result of recent wage contracts. And some such negotiations are in the offing.

But so far, weakness in other commodities has kept the overall price index almost level.

The cost of living — has been accommodated. It has held its fairly steady if slow upward course, due mainly to advertising charges for services.

Since the present business upswing started early in 1961 the Bureau of Labor Statistics wholesale price index — based on the 1957-59 average as 100 — has moved between 98.5 and 100.5. It now is right in between, just slightly above 100. The consumer price index in April was 29.5, from the same base.

Individual commodity price changes have been marked during the last three years, however.

Changes ranged from gains of 4.5 per cent for lumber and wood products and 4.5 per cent for tobacco and beverages to losses of 4.5 per cent for chemicals and 4.5 per cent for fuels and power.

More recent price increases have been listed for various materials. Coal prices have risen at many mines after the latest wage increases.

In most previous periods of business expansion price changes have been much smaller and bigger. This was particularly marked in the 1955-57 boom.

Since then, however, capacity to produce has become so large that it acted as a dampener on wholesale price fluctuations. This was true during the last previous expansion period, 1953-54, although industrial wholesale prices did rise 2 per cent in that period. This was offset by a drop of 1.5 per cent in the index of farm products.

In the current expansion, significant capacity to produce commodity prices. This surplus has kept competition keen in many commodity markets.

The problem today is to what extent surplus capacity has now been reduced, to what degree the effects of recent advances in productivity have already been realized, and to how much high industrial demand may rise.

The stabilizing forces of the past few years have now lost their punch, the pressure for price rises may send commodity prices upward once more.

Polly's Pointers

DEAR POLLY: — I am concerned about the published hint for punching a hole in an acetate can to be used as a "time saver" for a Venetian blind cord. These cans are potential bombs and several persons have been killed or maimed by them. I have also read on these cans "Do not puncture or burn in incinerators." — MRS. C. J. B.

MRS. C. J. B. and others — Do read carefully. We made no mention of punching a hole in the top of a spray can. Our hint read, "Drill a hole in the top of a small white plastic top off a spray can." This refers to the lid that is loose and comes off every time the hair spray or whatever is used. No mention was made of puncturing the can and it seems to me you would make a rather unwise "time saver" on the cord of a blind. Spray aerosol cans are VERY, VERY dangerous. — POLLY

DEAR POLLY: — Most mothers will agree there are times when it is absolutely necessary to leave the house to run next door for a cup of sugar, etc. but we are reluctant about leaving the children for even those few minutes. Most children are fascinated by the telephone. I have two phones, but this pointer will work with one phone, too.

Either call the neighbor or someone who will not mind talking to each child in turn. The kids love this chance to talk and are still talking when you return. It works like a charm.

DEAR POLLY: — Cut a circle out of a plastic gallon jug bottom. Use a "dog" for a guard around small plants, move to top, into the ground. — C. B. C.

DEAR POLLY: — A colorful plastic cloth, 24 x 64 inches, is a good investment. It is easily washed, dries dry and is ready for many uses. When ironing large things like table cloths or sheets, I put it on the floor under the ironing board. Use it for carry extra wraps and supplies on a hike or picnic. Put the articles in the center and tie the corners together. When you reach your destination use the cloth as a picnic table cover or sit on it. It folds into a small bundle and there are no extra things to carry home. Ties the corners to spread this cloth on the carpet or floor when color-matching or matching.

Good Opener At Playhouse

 Manchester residents need not go far afield to enjoy an entertaining summer theater. The Nutmeg Playhouse of UConn's Department of Theater raised the curtain last night on the first of a series of comedies which will run through the summer with performances Tuesday through Saturday evenings and new plays each week. The opener—"Take Her, She's Mine"—is well worth the drive to Storrs.

A departure from earlier summer seasons, the playhouse this year is building its shows around a half dozen professional actors and actresses, instead of relying solely on theater students and summer stockers. Last night's consistently competent performance is the proof of the theater's new policy.

The play, currently popular on the show circuit, is a kind of Everyman play about father's difficulties with their daughters and vice versa—when daughters go away to Eastern colleges, it's the kind of show that can be awful; this one, as it turns out, is good—funny dialogue, crisp direction and a smooth delivery all add up.

The father of the story is played by James Duncan, the mother by Mary Roseman, two of the company's pros, while the college bound daughter is Susan Dorlan, a 1961 UConn theater major.

The father is the play's narrator, leaning relaxed against the sofa, watching the action. As scenes are being changed, then working up a head of steam on stage over his daughter's doings. Mother is the stable one, seeing through daughter's "phase" and calming down the household. Both performers fit themselves well to their parts.

Miss Dorlan is just right as the college girl from California getting her first taste of an eastern college (for the Radcliffe-Wellesley ilk), succumbing first to a bad case of sophistication, then to a bout with her social conscience, and winding up—well, go see it yourself if you want to see how she winds up.

Other standouts in the cast are Richard Klepac as one of the young men, and Jack Bell as a negative college student with an engagingly off-hand manner.

NARVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—World War I hero Sgt. Alvin York has been placed on the critical list at Veterans Hospital here as the result of pneumonia in his right lung.

"He has developed pneumonia and his blood pressure has fallen," said a hospital spokesman. "This may be a result of pneumonia in the lung, which he has had before, or a blood stream infection. He is a sick man."

Until pneumonia developed Tuesday, York's doctors were beginning to hint that he might soon return to his home in Tullahoma, Tenn., about 140 miles northeast of here. The 76-year-old medal of honor winner was rushed here June 19 after suffering a recurrence of internal bleeding.

This is the tenth time in less than two years that York has been hospitalized. He has been bedridden since suffering a stroke several years ago.

York etched his name in American history in 1918 when he killed 25 German soldiers and captured 132 others during the battle of the Argonne Forest in France.

Fatal Accident Mars Fireworks Display on River

NEW YORK (AP)—A fireworks-laden barge exploded in a fiery inferno, flames and booming fireballs lit the sky Tuesday night, killing two men. Thousands of spectators lined the banks of the Hudson River to watch the display.

At the 5:30 a.m. start, an explosion destroyed an ammunition barge off 90th Street, still in the process of being loaded. A hull full of thousands of others as news of the blast spread.

John Serpico, president of International Fireworks Co., of North Bergen, N.J., said "a huge burst that apparently ignited shells on the deck of the barge caused the explosion."

Killed were Anthony Amato, 40, of Secaucus, N.J., and Anthony De Francesco, 40, of Spankill, N.Y.

Four other men on the barge were rescued by the tug which was towing it. One was treated at a hospital for burns and released.

Less than an hour earlier, an explosion destroyed an ammunition barge off 100th Street, still in the process of being loaded. A hull full of thousands of others as news of the blast spread.

Nineteen were injured. All but four were released after hospital treatment. Two of the four were in serious condition.

Most of the reserves in the 17 Infantry Regiment Armory, 71st Infantry Regiment Armory, Park Ave. and 3rd St., were two floors above the explosion and heard only a dull thud. The blast shook the building and knocked bricks from the roof, eight stories above the street.

Cause of the blast, which knocked out heavy concrete walls and blew off the steel doors to the room, has not been determined.

Astronomers Not Familiar In This World

LOS ANGELES (AP)—You have probably never met one. They're nocturnal, mostly, and dwell on mountain tops in silvery domes that open only at night.

If you do come down into the cities occasionally, to greet their wives, his kids and pick up food, they're usually, you could, conceivably, bump into one.

Rockville-Vernon Harding Bows Out Of District Primary

There will be no primary for the nomination of Democratic State Senator from the 25th district, Tolland Attorney Preston Harding announced today.

Harding, 31, was defeated 20-15 in a bid for the senatorial nomination at a convention held earlier this month in Stafford Springs.

Winner at the convention was Ed Cormier, 35, of Stafford Springs, owner of a chemical spraying business. Cormier said he would not accept the Democratic seat, which represents all of Tolland County in the General Assembly than now.

Mayor Flaherty replied to Harding's statement and said today that he supported Atty. Harding because "I felt he would make the best candidate."

"I realize he had to make his own decision. Backers cannot make a decision for a candidate," Mayor Flaherty said.

The mayor expressed his feelings that Harding should be proud of and one that will result in victory for the party in Tolland County in November," Harding said.

Harding announced his candidacy for the senatorial nomination about two weeks before the Democratic primary. Cormier had been lining up delegates votes for several months.

According to some party officials, Harding entered the convention with the knowledge that he would be defeated.

The mayor, a Democrat, who feels they are continuing to be primary for the post as they feel it represents the party's strength.

Vernon contains about 25 percent of the registered Democrats in Tolland County.

Harding was supported in his district and their six votes in the primary.

Rockville Mayor Leo B. Flaherty, who is chairman of the Democratic Town Committee, publicly supported Harding for the nomination.

Mayor Flaherty was reported to be disappointed at Harding's withdrawal from the race.

Harding sought out Rockville mayor for his aid. "I wish to thank those who supported me," Harding said, "especially Leo Flaherty, who gave me his endorsement."

"That endorsement has now caused him an embarrassment with those persons he asked to support me," Harding added. "I'm sorry. I take full responsibility for my decision."

Harding was the only chance of defeating Democrat to hold primary. The only persons eligible to call for a primary are those who have received at least 30 percent of delegate votes at a convention. Deadlines for filing papers for a primary is tomorrow.

Harding's withdrawal has shattered the possibility of the first county wide primary in Tolland County.

While there have been several town primaries, no full county split has ever gone to the polls.

In his statement, Harding, now chairman of Tolland, said, "I've spent the last 10 days consulting with my town committee, other town chairmen,
