If The People Could Decide

The states, if such an amendment were adopted, would again be able to create and adopt and district their own legislative systems, including systems in which one house would be based on population and the other on units.

That would be just nonsensical enough to put everything under a microscope that people could begin living again.

WASHINGTON - Partly because of his own discreet efforts and partly because of political maneuvering beyond his control, Sen. Eugene V. McCarthy of Minnesota is becoming a strong possibility to wind up the maladroft step of mailing McCarthy literature, to Democratic National Convention.

There is a trace of irony in this. McCarthy has been the "other" Minnesota Senator, overshadowing the furiously energetic and enormously effective Hubert Humphrey. Yet, precisely at this moment of Humphrey's great triumph as mastermind of the Senate civil rights fight, McCarthy is challenging him for what is almost surely his last chance at the White House.

Actually, reporting the Democratic Vice Presidential race is as precise an act as determining the latest favorite in the court of Louis XIV. The Atlantic City convention will be a delegate convention. Only President Johnson's side will be represented. But it can be reported by McCarthy by his final list.

Moreover, there is a fussy rivalry in Southern and border states. Who would least among the politicians tend toward the man they think might be Johnson's nod. In turn, he might be influenced by their present sentiments.

The current McCarthy boomlet - apparently confined largely to Washington - is gathering momentum with the universal fear that it will take some two years to get it. Tall, suave and handsome at 48, he has been quietly making his name as a Democratic.

South Windsor Schools' Condition Is Good, Maintenance Head Reports

The board of education received a report from Edward Verity, maintenance man, this week. He said that generally he found the schools in good condition.

Very stated several instances where repairs were made under his direction. At Pleasant Valley School there was the problem of hot water backing into the cold water lines. The situation was partially remedied by installing a "swirl" in the check valve on the cold water line. Attempts were also made to improve the heat in several sections of the building. He said that such work was unsuccessful, however. The situation is expected to be remedied with the new addition.

An old ventilator shaft was broken up at the Union School. According to Verity, this was a serious fire hazard. Light fixtures were repaired and reworked at Union School while repairing the fire escape. A new hot water heater was installed at the school. Repairs were also made to the Wapping and Avery Street schools to the heating and plumbing systems.

Very said that at present he is investigating a smoke problem apparently attributed to the incinerators at Avery Street and Pleasant Valley schools.

Very and his men have been handling the hot water on the old busmen in the schools, substantially saving to the town.

With the opening of Orchard Hill School the situation was increased to twelve full-time and eight part-time custodians.

A regular schedule of moving and grounds work will be completed with the acquisition of a new tractor. Hild for the tractor are out now.

Very stressed the fact that custodians had not attended any training programs. Training programs are provided free by some suppliers and the custodians will take advantage of them.

When questioned by the board on the status of the Union School work, Verity said it was "bad". However, there are plans to fix it with MDC water lines by fall.

A lengthy discussion centered around the fire on school property. The question was raised about the status of the Orchard Hill School turf. Verity stated that it takes two years for turf on school grounds to sustain the traffic. Board members were concerned about the amount of money saved and whether or not they are being maintained properly.

A suggestion was made that the town recreation department take over the maintenance of the grounds at the close of school. The school maintenance department would care for the grounds while school is in session.

The board had requested a report from Saul Finestone, president of the South Windsor Education Association on a tax-sheltered annuity program for South Windsor teachers.

Serving on the committee with Finestone were Richard Kelly, chairman of the representative council of BWIA and Joseph Perzanowski, chairman of the insurance study committee.

The FEWA had set up the committee some months ago to study tax-sheltered annuities available to teachers by Congress.

Finestone said the only cost to the board would be a small clerical one in making the deductions from the teachers pay. He said the committee was considering Northwestern Mutual as its agent.

The advantages, as given by the committee to the board, were that it is income tax exempt and carries insurance features.

If a teacher was to join the program he would have to be in the plan for two years before he can take his money out.

Finestone emphasized that probably a great many teachers would not be involved, but it would be possible for any teacher to see the program.

Ten to fifteen teachers are employed who might be interested in the program. It was noted that it is not practical to enter the program for a large amount. A program that likely would have to afford \$300 a year for the program.

Chairman J. P. Cavanaugh asked that the board not make a decision until he was present.

On the matter of donations to the schools by various groups the board decided that the principals should inform the superintendent. The superintendent will then inform the board of education. Board members said that many donations had been received from the PTA's and local organizations which had not received proper recognition. The equipment procurement chairman for the Ed. Terry School was discussed. The board decided to take any action until other items were added to the agenda.

The board decided to invite the assistant to its next meeting. The vacant position of assistant superintendent of schools was tabled until the new superintendent arrives July 1. The possibility of having the superintendent assume the assistant manager position was mentioned.

Merle Woodman was mentioned that he had received three applications for the position of superintendent. The board said that the superintendent should be selected on the west side of Avery St.

JACKSON, Miss. (AP)—"Certainly I am a candidate for president of the United States," Alabama Gov. George Wallace said.

Wallace made the statement at a news conference held Thursday night as he brought his movement for unpledged presidential electors to the grand Mississippi Coliseum here.

"I intend to give the American people a clear choice," he said. "I welcome a fight between our philosophy and the liberal left-wing dogma which now threatens to engulf every man, woman and child in the United States."

"The Alabama is heading a move in the South for presidential electors after pledged

to Wallace or not pledged to anyone. This, Wallace says, will control the presidential election and give the South bargaining power with Republicans and Democrats alike.

"Our hands in the destiny of this nation. People are looking to Southerners to save our country," he said.

Wallace's 42-minute speech was interrupted 48 times by applause as he attacked central government's taking over the civil rights of individuals and states, the U.S. Supreme Court and the pending civil rights bill.

operation set in about four years ago when the growing ideological disputes with the Soviet Union led Moscow to shut off supplies and technical help for China.

One effect of this has been to set back the day when China can explode her first atom bomb.

The Soviet-Chinese split apparently has deepened and the prospect that the Soviet Union will resume arming China is considered remote.

U.S. officials regard as significant Moscow's recent warning to Red China that she should no longer count on Soviet backing in a crisis.

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said it will be "many, many years" before the United States can see a situation where it might be forced to do a "hard line" toward China. He is an avowed view that China could feel the hand.

China's military strength, as she did in Korea, send hordes of men rolling into Southeast Asia.

The latest intelligence reports show no evidence of any Chinese rushing to help North Vietnam. U.S. sources said.

China produces about 300 tanks a year, a variety of howitzers, mortars and artillery, plus a missile with an effective range of about 10,000 yards. Some 40,000 Soviet T-style burp guns a year, plus other small weapons.

A navy of about 132,000 which includes marines. An air arm of about 500 MIG-17s. Some 30 submarines, most half equipped for minelaying. This navy, mainly for coast defense, couldn't stay in the water with the mighty U.S. Fleet.

But the United States has no intention of getting into a ground war with China unless there is no other way out.

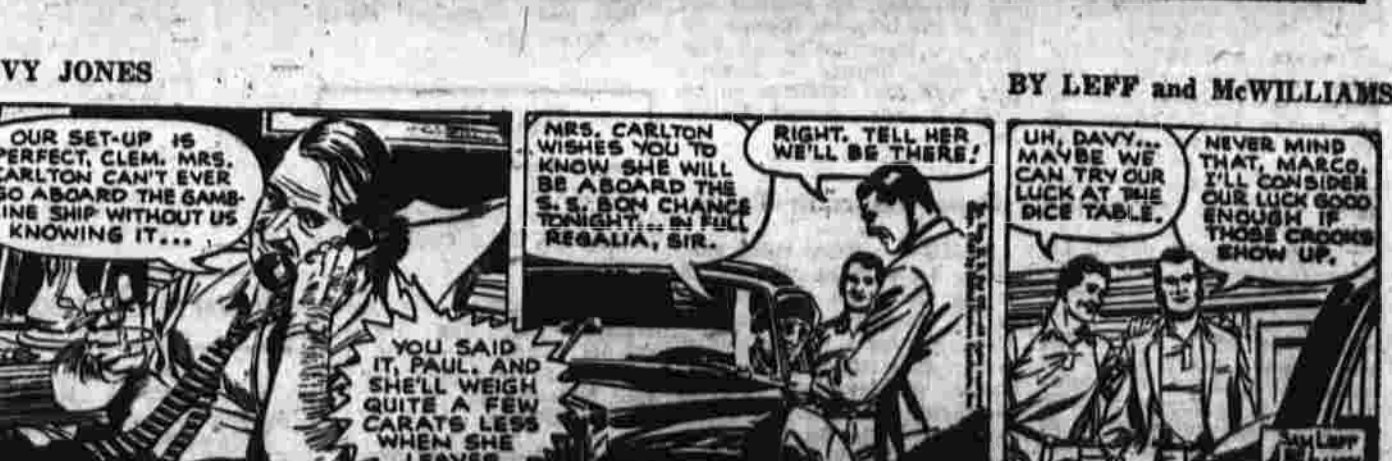
