Faster Than The Joke

write or talk about computer these days is to indulge in the same old mechanical joke about the approaching time when the computers will take over. But when we do check on them, what we discover is that they are moving forward even more swiftly than our weirdest jokes have imagined. They, the computers that is, have now

begun talking to one another, and almost immediately they have developed that same mixture of facility and frustration which has distinguished the age long conversation of people and nations. At one stage, the ability of the computers to talk with one another, and exchange information and knowledge hitherto possessed only by one or the

other, leads to the creation of a new common body of knowledge and wisdom better and greater than either of its individual contributors. But, in a second stage of communication between computers, their ability to talk to and feed one another outstrips

their capacity to understand and evaluate what they are telling one another. Suddenly, there develops the danger that what they think they know, but what is really the result of some jointly mistaken series of assumptions, can produce the discords and savageries of need-All this is, of course, in line with what

we said at the beginning of this piece of thought. The computers are getting more and more human all the time. The more human they become, o course, the less reliable they are, so that is the trend that has to be watched.

So long as they operate on a low, restrained, purely machine level, the comness enterprise on a basis of guaranteed success, since they would mechanically and automatically forbid any company or departmental policy which might have in it any risk of failure. In this stage, the computers can run

a-business or enterprise perfectly. But when they become more sophisticated, and begin to have minds of their own, and can begin to talk to one another and misunderstand and misinterpret one another, then they can make a mess of things just as quickly as humans can, and what then will be the use of us, poor mortals?

characterized as "ill founded and reckless" the criticisms which the Teachers less" the criticisms which the Teachers Union made to the Board of Education, "Hartford still has an outstanding school system, is a leader in curricular experimentation and improvement, and has one of the finest staffs in the coun-try," affirmed Meinke, whose defense of the system and the teachers resulted in an almost unanimous standing ovation, What Kenneth Meinke said in Hartford is of interest in Meriden not merely because he is a native of Meriden, but because Hartford and Meriden are both battlegrounds in the struggle for power between the Connecticut Education As-

sociation and the American Federation of Teachers. This struggle, which prevails on a national scale, has some potential benefit to the teachers themselves and even to public education, but only if it is carried on with reason and responsibility. The National Education Association, which represents the great majority of America's public school teachers, is accused of not being sufficiently vigorous on their behalf, and of being administration-minded to the advantage of the NEA hierarchy and the detriment of the classroom teachers.
