WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Robert F. Kennedy declared today Oswald's diary a conspiracy of omission.
The U.S. attorney general told a Polish questioner in Krakow that there is no question that Harvey Oswald killed President John F. Kennedy and that it was on his own and by himself.
KENNEDY SPOKE AT A NEWS CONFERENCE AT THE POLISH STATE UNIVERSITY IN WARSAW, POLAND, LAST NOV. 27.
Kennedy repeated that Oswald was a "traitor in society" and that Oswald's "professed belief in communism did not prompt him to murder the president."
"I believe in my opinion did not motivate his act," Kennedy said. "It was the single act of an individual protesting against the nature of the company members. More applause, and Sinatra returned to mingling with the group."
"You are also the best group of people I've ever met," Kennedy said. "You work and live together for a period of weeks on a picture and you become like a family. Most companies just break up and everyone goes his own way. I like a party to signal the end, and I like to have the photo taken so everyone has something to remember."
He brought the film to two and a half days under schedule, despite adding 40 minutes of scenes that weren't in the script. "The savings in film stock amounted to \$400,000," he reported proudly.

WASHINGTON (AP)—In the news from Washington: LEWIS TRAVELER: After two busy months traveling and speaking, President Johnson is expected to spend most of July at the White House. There are no travel plans on his announced schedule for the month, and aides said only two or three out-of-town engagements are being discussed. The President may make a brief trip to his Texas ranch for the July 4 weekend.
One factor that may be influencing the President's travel plans is the Republican National Convention, which opens in San Francisco July 13 and will likely dominate the news for at least one week. Associates say it is only a coincidence that Kennedy has his speaking dates during this period.
DEPT: President Johnson's signature has put the temporary national debt limit at \$284 billion—until a year from today.
Johnson had not signed the bill Monday, the limit would have expired automatically. The old temporary limit of \$200 billion today and its permanent limit of \$282 billion at mid-night today.
These include the federal debt now stands at \$212 billion.
PAY ROLL: Total federal employment dropped 3,888 in May compared with April, a Senate House committee report today.
The initial number of civilian employees was listed as 2,476,791 in May by the Committee on Reduction of Nonessential Federal Expenditures. The biggest cut was in the civilian pay roll of the Defense Department.
PASAPORTS: Sen. Karl Mundt, R-Iowa, said today he is preparing new legislation to prevent Communists from obtaining passports.
He sponsored a recent Supreme Court decision striking down a provision of the 1950 Internal Security Act banning the issuance of passports to members of organizations required to register as Communist groups. Mundt said he had introduced a bill for new legislation he plans to introduce.
WINTER ROAD SAVING: WETHERFIELD (AP)—The State Highway Department says that it saved more than \$500,000 in maintenance because the past winter was a comparatively mild one.
Commissioner Howard S. Ives said yesterday that snow and ice removal during the 1963-64 winter cost an estimated \$8.3 million. The Highway Department had budgeted \$8.9 million for it.
The previous winter, maintenance cost an estimated \$9 million, in overtime pay to the contractors and the cost of repairing snow removal equipment.

much as a goodbye from any Congolese official or soldier.
At one time its size numbered 20,000 men, it achieved a major objective 18 months ago when it crushed Katanga's secession. Since then the size of the force has shrunk steadily. The unit finally was decided upon when the United Nations ran out of funds to maintain it.
Now the government must train and is reluctant to face the militant rebels in the eastern Congo.
These rebels have the support of Congolese dissidents in Brazzaville, in the adjacent former French Congo—the Congo Republic. The dissidents also have been calling for Glazenka's release.
With Glazenka's return, all surviving political leaders at the outset of the Congo's independence, will be back in the political arena.
Glazenka claimed to be Patrice Lumumba's successor when he set up his regime in the north-east Congo after Lumumba, the Congo's first premier, was murdered in Katanga.
Also back in the picture is Albert Kongo, self-styled god-son of the South Kasai Province, who came out of exile the day after Lumumba returned to the Congo.
Kongo said he was willing to reconcile with all leaders except Joseph Ngalumula, who supplanted him in South Kasai. Ngalumula said he also had been promised support by American leaders. Ngalumula, former provincial president of Kasai, Lubaya was sent across the Congo River to Brazzaville by exiled extreme left politicians who call themselves the "National Liberation Committee" and have been trying to overthrow the Leopoldville regime of Premier Cyrille Adoula.
Thombe said Lubaya told him the Brazzaville committee was "prepared to back all its actions without putting forward conditions."
Thombe succeeds in his peace-making role, he is given a good chance to succeed Adoula as prime minister, which has been his failure to stem the rising tide of tribal war and rebellion in the eastern and southern Congo.

U.S.-made T-28 fighter-bombers have driven the fanatical Bulwer warriors back into the jungle, hitting the immediate threat to the Kivu Province capital in the Ruwenzori valley.
The Bulwer support Pierre Mulle, Kivu Province chief, is in chief leading a revolt in Kivu Province southeast of Leopoldville.
Other tribes are also hitting the warpath in the eastern Congo, where the U.N. force has not been operating for nine months.
The U.N. ended its military role in the former Belgian colony today for lack of money. There were no parades or ceremonies to mark either the departure of the U.N. troops or the independence anniversary.
A Canadian air force transport took off with 38 members of a Canadian army signal unit. A French presidential guard detachment left with 88 men of the Nigerian army's 1st Battalion.

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP)—Record-breaking temperatures continued in Connecticut again today as hot air streamed in from the central portion of the country. Moisture is on the increase over the area, the U.S. Weather Bureau said. By late this afternoon scattered thundershowers will be developing to the west. They will spread over the state during the evening and nighttime hours. The leading edge of cooler and drier air was approaching the northern New England area this morning and will continue southward over southern New England during the night, the Bureau said. This condition will continue the threat of scattered thundershowers through most of 18-night and return temperatures to more seasonal levels tomorrow.

National Outlook Thundershowers brought some relief today to portions of the country beset several days by searing, high temperatures. Rain fell in the lower Ohio Valley, the southeast states, northern Great Lakes and most of the Great Plains. One and one-third inch of rain fell in the Wichita, Kan., area, and more than one inch was reported at Panama City, Fla. In the East, New York farmers asked federal aid in five counties where the May-June rainfall was the lowest on record.

Goldwater Camp Jubilant After Victory in Illinois

CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater's smashing success with the Illinois delegation prompted his backers today to renew predictions of an early ballot victory for the Republican Presidential nomination. Goldwater was jubilant after winning 48 of the 58 Illinois delegates to the Republican National Convention while Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton failed to pick up a single vote. "This is the biggest boost for Goldwater's campaign since the California primary," said Hayes Robertson, a staunch Goldwater delegate and former Cook County GOP chairman. Robertson and other Goldwater supporters said the strong Illinois vote for the Arizona senator would have national impact and "should result in an easy first-ballot victory" for him. The poll of delegates was taken after Goldwater and Scranton made separate appearances before the group at closed-door sessions Tuesday. Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, who had been uncommitted, started the momentum for Goldwater by casting the first vote for him. Before the meeting, Goldwater's Illinois strength had been listed at 29 votes in surveys by The Associated Press. The 10 delegates who did not support Goldwater in Tuesday's session declined to back any candidate. Scranton, although obviously disappointed, contended his poor showing did not deal a fatal blow to his candidacy. He said his decision to address the Illinois delegation was intended to "arouse the public" and not to gain delegates at this time. He said the overwhelming Goldwater support in the Illinois delegation "did not surprise me or shock me. Although elated over the outcome, would not claim the nomination was wrapped up. Goldwater said he thought he has "maybe, 600" delegates, or 35 more than required for the nomination, but added he would like a bigger insurance margin. "I'd like a few more and then I might say, 'I'm over the hump' he said. An Associated Press survey showed Tuesday that Goldwater now has 705 committed, instructed, pledged or favorable delegates, which is 50 more than needed for the nomination—if none of the delegates stray. Goldwater's closest pursuer, the survey showed, is Scranton with 141 delegates. Leaders of the Goldwater movement in Illinois said they thought Scranton made a tactical blunder in deciding to make a personal appeal to the delegates. Charles H. Percy, party nominee for governor also joined the delegates behind Goldwater, keeping a promise to abide by the majority sentiment of the delegation.

Lodge Has Confidence On Viet Nam Outlook

WASHINGTON (AP)—Henry Cabot Lodge declared today that the "downward spiral" in the anti-Communist war in South Viet Nam has been stopped. He said "we will win" if the United States and the South Vietnamese persist in carrying out realistic political and military policies. In his first major speech since returning from Saigon Monday, after resigning as ambassador, Lodge pictured the greatest threat to this confident outlook as an increase in "hostile outside pressures" from the Communist side. If those pressures grow too great, he said in an address prepared for the National Press Club, then "we may be forced" to take other actions to deal with the new threat. Lodge did not spell out what additional steps might be employed against Communist forces in Southeast Asia. There has been considerable talk from U.S. officials in recent weeks about possibly carrying the war to North Viet Nam by air strikes, but he did not mention that. He did say, however, that one kind of "outside pressures" can come from neighboring land areas as a "sanctuary" from which Viet Nam can be attacked and the Communist Viet Cong forces given assistance "with impunity." Obviously, Lodge said, "when one is engaged in a life-and-death struggle, such a 'sanctuary' must not go on for." (See Page Twenty-Seven)

Attorney General and Family End Polish Visit Poles Offer Tearful Farewell; Cold Shoulder from Communists

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy's visit to Poland ended today with a noisy, tearful farewell from hundreds of Poles and a cold shoulder from the Communist government. Before leaving for London, en route to the United States, he issued a statement to newsmen urging "the reconciliation of Eastern and Western Europe in association with the United States" as "the only sure guarantee against nuclear war, whether by design or accident." Except for low-ranking aides and security people, no Polish officials saw Kennedy, his wife and three of their children off at the airport. Although Kennedy's visit was private, he had been met on his arrival last Saturday by Ambassador Eugeniusz Minkiewicz of the Foreign Ministry. The government was understood to be irritated at Kennedy's series of stump-style speeches to street crowds and his visit to Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński, the Roman Catholic primate of Poland, against the advice of government officials. Several hundred Poles outside Kennedy's hotel repeated the ovations he has received the past few days. They screamed him with a chorus of "may you live 100 years" as he climbed again to the roof of his sedan. At the airport, Kennedy got out of his car to shake hands with almost everyone standing in a crowd of 150 outside the entrance. Two old women broke into tears. One kissed his hand and he patted her cheek. Kennedy's departure brought the first appearance of pickets during his visit. Both at the hotel and beside the plane were men with placards in Polish reading "In the name of peace, don't give nuclear weapons to West Germany" and "Why doesn't the government of the United States recognize our frontiers on the Oder and the Neisse?" Kennedy shook hands with the pickets at the airport and gave one of them a rose. In his statement to newsmen Kennedy plugged a theme which is said to have attracted the interest of Foreign Minister Adam Rapacki in a meeting two days ago. It was that "Poland has political ties with the Soviet Union and personal ties with the United States and therefore has a unique opportunity to contribute to European security and the easing of tension between the United States and the Soviet Union." Kennedy said America wants Poland's help "in building those open 'bridges of reconciliation' that President Johnson called for last month." Kennedy said his strongest impression of Poland was the friendliness of the people. He said the Poles were "a strongly religious people devoted to their faith and belief in God." "This was very inspiring to see," Kennedy said. "I don't think it exists with such intensity in many other countries."

Coffee Break Must Be Pure Experts Say

LONDON (AP)—Good news is in store for coffee addicts in this world of substitutes. The International Coffee Organization is trying to make sure they get their brew almost pure. Nearly every cup of coffee hides a substitute, sometimes called an additive. It may be ordinary roasted dried bean or barley or chicory. The executive board of the ICO in a report today called on its member nations to implement legislation requiring coffee roasters and packers as well as manufacturers of instant coffee to see that what they brand as coffee is mainly coffee. They suggested a tolerance of 10 per cent called for in the World Coffee Pact—which means that at least 90 per cent of the stuff marketed as coffee would be coffee. This is one of 18 points the board will consider when it meets Monday to prepare an agenda for a meeting of the ICO Council opening in London July 27. Officials of the organization are worried about the failure of the U.S. Senate so far to pass implementing legislation to make the coffee pact operative. The legislation has been passed by the House of Representatives.

Bulletins Called from AP Wires

NO BEER TODAY PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)—More than 200 truck drivers went on strike today, halting deliveries in Rhode Island of most brands of beer and liquor. The drivers, members of Local 351 of the Teamsters Union, rejected the distributors' latest offer of a new contract last night, 1:17 to 1:31. Only distributors for F. Ballantine and Sons were working today—their drivers being represented by another union. A spokesman for the companies said 25 distributing firms were affected by the strike. The drivers, who now earn \$2.75 an hour, are seeking a 50-cent hourly wage increase plus improved fringe benefits. BOMB EXPLOSION KANSAS CITY (AP)—A bomb exploded early today outside the home of Lawrence F. Gopford, Jackson County prosecutor, but no one was injured. The major portion of Kansas City is in Gopford's jurisdiction. Officers said they were of the opinion the blast was an act of terrorism, but there was no official speculation about the cause.
