The Friendly Image

All those financial institutions which once seemed, as an integral part of their own prestige, to be so cold and austere and dignified and, above all, so fiercely prudent with something sacred like money have, in more recent times, worked hard at the business of creating a new image for themselves.

They now atrive to be the friendly, informal, receptive folksy place where one goes to cultivate all the financial vices, such as getting into debt.

The modern image came close to its final perfection the other day when an assistant manager of a bank down in Manhattan noticed that a holdup man who was patronizing his bank at the moment was having trouble making a nervous woman teller understand what he wanted. The assistant manager promptly walked over, took the hold-up man by the arm, and escorted him to another teller, with whom he finished his business quickly and in good order and with a minimum of misunderstanding. The hold-up man then left the bank with \$1,545.

The assistant manager had perhaps been guilty of one slight departure from his courtesy. On the way over to help the hold-up man, he had managed to step on the bank's silent alarm system. Fortunately for the bank's reputation for friendship, the police did not arrive until the young customer had taken his \$1.545 and his leave.

This was down in New York, with the key contribution to the image of friendliness even to the hold-up kind of customer being made by a bank official himself. But for over-all courtesy to hold-up men, Connecticut, we would judge, still holds the lead. We very seldom interrupt them and we simply hate to spoil everything by catching them afterwards.

Alas, No Scissors

That there have been roads and that there have been bridges as part of man's construction accomplishment on earth for perhaps thousands of years we know; some of these early engineering accom-, plishments are still with us.

What bothers us however, is the ques tion of how in the world these ancient geniuses in the field of public works construction ever got their roads and bridges opened.

The most important implement for the opening of a bridge or a road, after said bridge or road has been built, is a pair of scissora.

But scissors are one of man's latter day inventions, relatively speaking, that Man didn't have scissors until 500 B.C., some time after he had already mastered the sciences of brick-making, stone-cutting, and the construction of the arch.

We have, therefore, a sort of historical nightmare which rises up to bother us now and then. In it, there are hordes of early traffic, by foot and chariot, lined up and held up and paralyzed while somebody tries to figure out some way of dealing with that big ribbon which is stretched across the entrance to the road or bridge.

Always, in our nightmare, up in front of all the traffic waiting to use the new facility, there stands the satrap, or governor, or ambassador, or president, or prince, or king, confronting the ribbon, and waiting for somebody to come forward with the scissors. But the scissors, alas, haven't been in-

vented vet. The whole tableau just stands there waiting.

A Weighted Vote System?

With the redistricting of the General Assembly now virtually a certainty, in creasing attention is being turned to how to best do it.

One theory that has been advanced in many quarters is the idea of the weightd vote system. This would allow each town to have at least one representative, but the vote of the representative would be weighted in accord with th number of people that the individual represented Because the Supreme Court has ruled that both houses of a state legislature

must be apportioned on a population basis which means that all representatives must substantially represent the same number of people the state faces the choice of either forming new election districts or continuing to send a representative from each town. Under the atter system, a representative might be entitled to only a half a vote, (or smaller) but at least he would be a locally elected individual with whom people

could talk and counsel. The system would preserve local accountability A third solution, which nobedy wants to have all representatives run at

The weighted vote system would have disadvantages, it is true, because of the complexities of adding up the various fractional votes. It would also tend to keep the House well above the 200 representative level, which many people have opposed on the grounds of unwieldiness. This would be true because cities such as Hartford would have 13 or 1 representatives, voting a full vote, smaller towns would have one repre sentative, although his vote would count only a part of a vote. In every case, of course, a representative's voting power would reflect the number of people whom

e represented While this is the subject which will require considerable debate, there would appear to be only two value ways to construct the Connecticut House in the uture. The people now have to start getting ready to express a choice. __MIDDLETOWN PRESS
