



Whose Hip Is It Now?

It is to be noted that Senator Goldwater has, in these crucial pre-convention days, been exhibiting much more common sense and expert strategy in dealing with an enemy than he usually exhibits in his talk about how to deal with enemies.

His enemy, in this instance, is Governor Scranton, with his desperate last minute effort to mount some kind of real battle for the Republican presidential nomination. In pursuit of this objective, Governor Scranton has been scurrying around the country, lunging out with a purported offensive here, another one there, trying his best to conduct a war of nerves, stressing his ideological challenges, pouncing on exery conceivable Goldwater weakness with taunting demands that Goldwater come out and fight on this or that ground of Scranton's choosing.

In his current dealing with this political enemy, Senator Goldwater has been anything but rash and impulsive, the qualities most frequently suggested by his off-the-cuff formulas for handling some of the challenges which face America and civilization in the world

Instead of rushing out and mowing Governor Scranton down, Senator Goldwater has been sitting still and quiet, ig-Scranton's importunate challenges, and deliberately refusing to give Scranton the kind of fight Scranton

What happens as Senator Goldwater, the figure supposedly wedded to the idea of going out and smashing your opposis tion, wherever it is, plays it cool as I has been doing the past few days, inacsessible to Scranton, inaccessible to newsmen?

The result is very simple. It begins to seem to be Scranton who is the rash, impulsive one, who seems to be trying to shoot from the hip, who seems not guite in touch with all that balance and maturity it should take to be a national

This is ridiculous. Everybody knows that Barry is the boy who never can grow up, and that Willie is the one who has grown up.

It's one more part of the confusion of our times, that it is Barry who, in the slutch, knows precisely when it is time to be too proud and too busy to notice the insults and aggressions which challenge him to come out and fight. Next thing we know, he may even come out in fawor of coexistence with his enemies.

Outrageous - But Right

The law is the law. If it isn't a good law, it might be repealed, or amended o improve it. But if it remains law, and it is conceded that it is a good law and has a sane and sound purpose, then it has to be enforced.

Such generalizations apply, rather dramatically, to the case of the young secretary, down in New York City, who carried a knife with her for her own protection ever since she read about the murder of another girl in the view and hearing of 38 people, none of whom would intervene. The young secretary in question, carrying her knife for self protection, was

attacked by a sailor, and used the knife to fight him off. Then detectives arrested her for carrying a switch-blade knife, which is against New York state's Sullivan weapons law. She will be given a hearing on the weapons carrying charge next week; presumably, even if she is found guilty, the court will be light and

The controversy, of course, is whether such a young heroine should have been arrested, booked and arraigned at all. It is easy to fashion all the glib arguments in her favor. They go like this: "Since when can it be against the law for a girl to defend her own virtue or

How are we going to take weapons away from some people and not from others? Do we want to have it be legal for everybody to carry any kind of weapon anywhere and everywhere? And do we want to go back to being a nation of vigilantes, or do we want to stick with the idea that the police are primarily responsible for maintaining law and or-

our time, there are two kinds of answer, one which is glib and seems sentimentally right, and the other which is harder to think out, and not pleasant to contemplate, and perhaps not even any colution, either.

But it is usually the unpleasant, unatisfactory answer, the answer which doesn't even promise a solution, which is the answer the civilized, responsible society has to make, no matter how simple, how glamorous, how exciting, how boldly sure of a quick and final solution, the other kind of answer may seem.

With what seems to be the probable nomination coming up at San Francisco, the choice between these two kinds of answers seems likely to prove the big story of our year. For the one kind of answer is Goldwater's answer to everything; on the opposite side is everybody who admits that problems are more complicated and less susceptible to glib slogans or to instant solutions.





A modern, fingertip, records system, implemented three years ago this month at the Manchester Police Department headquarters, 23s E. Middle Tyke, under Chief James M. 


