lke And Trib Discuss Platform

Tuesday, July 14

For one view of the torment in which the Republican party finds itself today, or should find itself, if it has any sense of its own direction left, one can take two differing reactions to the San Francisco party platform.

Former President Eisenhower, the presumed moderate, and the middle-ofthe-road healer of differences who led the party to its first national victory in 20 years, discussed the party platform in San Francisco yesterday. He discussed # with Senator Goldwater and he discussed it with a national press conference. And, at the press conference, aside from a few mild and polite regrets that the platform had not been a little strongor or more explicit on this or that point, the main thing Eisenhower told the press conference was something he had already told Senator Goldwater. He had, he said, told Senator Goldwater to go ahead and run on this platform and stick to it and he could not go far wrong.

In the course of his discussion, Eisenhower rather frankly admitted that his reaction to the platform had shifted according to the identity of the persons reading or explaining it to him, and this undoubtedly added to the public impression that the former President has, of inte, been in some kind of cheerful dotage, in which he belongs, for five minutes at a time, to whatever voice or camp has talked to him last.

But in any case, here was Elsenhower, the greatest moderate Republican leader of his time, taking a position yesterday which headlines this morning quite correctly interpreted as one of general basic natisfaction with the San Francisco platform.

Now for the other view of the same platform. It is contained in the lead editorial in this morning's New York Herald Tribune, the big Republican newspaper which has been most friendly to Eisenhower, and also the big Republican newspaper which originally proposed that Governor Scranton make himself available.

In this morning's editorial, the Herald Tribune asks "What's Wrong With The Platform ?"

This is, one must try to remember as one reads, the same platform former President Eisenhower found basically acseptable.

"The Republican platform, as drafted." begins the Herald Tribune editorial. "has elements of strength in its advocacy of decentralized government, fiscal responsibility and a firm foreign policy, as well as in its sweeping but often effective desunciation of Democratic sins against these principles. Where it has erred sadly is in its spelling out of positive programs and in its patent attempt to garner votes from every segment of the Far

"It is curious that the platform drafted by the Goldwater forces should have been so detailed, since Sen. Goldwater's contempt for platforms is well known. But the result, unless the statement on which the party is to base itself in the forthcoming campaign is drastically altered by the convention itself, would be disastrous.

"Most of the controversy," the Herald Tribune continues, "has swirled aroundthe sections on civil rights. These planks though far from inspiring, might be talerable, against the background of the great contribution made by the Republicans to the enactment of civil rights legislation if it were not for certain vital

"1. Sen. Goldwater's denunciation of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and his vote against it.

"2. The fact that, for the first time since the Civil War, there is not a single Southern Negro delegate seated at the ecovention, and the Northern Negroes. are prepared to bolt.

"3. The refusal of the Goldwater forces to permit the word 'enforcement' to be used in connection with civil rights laws and their substitution of 'implementation' and 'execution.' 'The latter is quite correct legally, but it has connotations apart from legislation which the honest ement' does not possess. "4. The reference to 'inverse discrimi-

ation," which, if not meaningless, is bait the white backlash. The second and station, the platform

It stands would indicate that the Re publican party-dubbed 'Black Republiprocess of scouring itself lily white in the waters of Ban Francisco Bay. This would be a flat denial of the party's past. the gravest handicap for the party's fu-

"On other domestic matters, the platform is less vulnerable-although the romise of a \$5 billion reduction in pending, which coupled with a number of new spending programs (to say nothing of the assignment of tax receipts to the states and tax relief to a number of individual enterprises including oil) does not seem the height of fiscal responsibility. And the curious plank on 'public prayer' makes no sense whatever.

"In foreign affairs," the Herald Tribune continues, "the platform is highly culpable in that it draws blueprints for situations which are highly fluid, and most of these blueprints are either contradictory or wrong. It refuses to disinguish between Russis and Red China, which will doubtless please both of these nations. It promises to subvert Castro's Cuba while threatening dire things to any one subverting territory in which we are interested. It would only trade with Communist countries 'if it would serve to diminish their power.' "The platform wants to strengther

NATO by appointing a commission. It wants to reform the UN by weakening the General Assembly, which the United States spent many years in strengthening. The drafters promise many things which they cannot perform, and which the country would be highly embarrassed f called upon to put in effect.

"If ever a platform was tailored to the candidate who controlled the committee this one was. The end product is a docu ment that not only backs Sen. Goldwate on almost every point he has raised but goes far to justify his contempt for platforms. For this is not a party stand, it is the voice of one man. And the con vention will be untrue to the responsibili ties imposed upon them if they allow this single voice to dominate them and the campaign that is to come."

That's the way it is with the Republ can party, July 14, 1964, Dwight D Eisenhower and the New York Herald Tribune giving their reactions to the San Francisco platform.

Rainy Afternoon

The larger trees weave and sigh in the easy wind, the bended rain. The rain falling whispers on the leaves, and makes little metallic drummings on the eaves. There is a gurgle from a spout, and a midden swirl of mist through an open window. The sound is sleepy. Every part of the sound of rain in the afternoon is sleepy. It is sleepler in the afternoon than it is at night.

Children scamper between the showers. Nowadays most of them scamper into the movies. We see them running fo shelter when the rain gets heavy. Years ago children would run for the house that had the big wide verandah. The rain dripping from the porch would wall off the world; everybody, even the dolls, might wind up being somebody in a book. Getting into a haybarn on a rainy afternoon was even better. There the temptation was not to be somebody in a book, but to be your wicked selves. Rainy afternoons of wishing you knew how to sin in the hav.

Flowers greet the rain with prompt and affectionate good cheer. They arch their leaves upward and outward. They furl and preen their petals. They make myriad cups and holding places for the rain, so that, if it is light, none shall be wasted. The flowers are happy in the rainy afternoon, and they dance. All their receptacles grow full, as the rain continues, and their leaves bend down, and their petals droop heavily, and occasionally a whole rose sags to the ground, and lies there, beaten and dirty

Thoughts come slanting in and fall and disappear as easily as a drop of rain. Sometimes two or more of them will join and form a puddle. There have been puddles which joined together to make a trickle, and trickles to make a brook, and brooks to make creeks, and creeks to make the mighty thunder of big river thoughts in the history of mankind. On - a summer rainy afternoon they come down one by one and make a casual inconsequential spat and disappear without attracting any notice, or joining up with anything, or creating anything, or ever being heard from again. This can be the height of intellect on a rainy afternoon and perhaps enough of all intellect for all of life: to know enough to close the window when the wind changes. If you will pardon us, we believe it just did.

Catching The Careless Driver
